

## Longhorns Cinch District Crown By Defeating Matador

The Lockney High School Longhorns will be champions of District 3-A regardless of the outcome of the Paducah game here Thursday. The Longhorns won that title last Friday night when they defeated Matador 39 to 0 on the local field.

This comes about because of the fact that all other teams of the district have already lost at least one game while the Longhorns are undefeated. The Paducah Dragons have lost three games and therefore have no chance at the title.

The locals had little trouble with the light and injury-plagued Matador team. Two of the Matador stars were out of the game because of injuries and the Matadors have a comparatively light team to start with.

Coch Curtis Kelley played his regulars until they had a 14 to 0 lead in the first half and then started substituting. The reserves played most all of the last half.

The Longhorns scored quickly in the first half. Matador received and ran two plays, then fumbled on their own 29 yard line, with a Longhorn recovering. One play carried to the 14 for the Longhorns and then Jimmy McGowen, that hard running back, carried over from the 14 yard line. McGowen then proceeded to kick the point.

A few minutes later Jack Cole took off from his own 25 yard line, reversed his field and went over standing up for the second score. McGowen again kicked the point.

In the second quarter, little Malcolm Howard, reserve back, pushed the ball over from the one foot line after a drive down the field. The point was missed and the score stood 20-0.

Later in the same quarter Jimmy McGowen passed to Calvin Pyle, left end for 25 yards and another score. The point was missed again and the at the half stood at 26-0.

Jerry McCulloch was responsible for the first score in the second half, rushing over from the 8 yard line on a buck through the center of the line. McCulloch also played for the point.

The last score came in the latter part of the third quarter when reserve back Malcolm Howard passed over the center of the line to reserve end Charles Crouch. Crouch ran 23 yards for the score.

The Longhorns had 14 first downs to 3 for the Matadors. They had two touchdowns called back because of infractions of the rules.

The reserves showed lots of hustle and speed, and cheered the hearts of the local fans with their performance against the Matadors, giving indications of a good team for the Longhorns in the years to come. They are mostly freshmen and sophomores.

Reserves seeing action included: Malcolm Howard, Doyle Sutherland, Charles Dippery, Ray Ferguson, Kenneth Murdock and Sid Thomas in the backfield; Don Matthews, center; Tip Jeffcoat, Barry Thompson, John Wood, guards; Eddie Fortenberry and W. L. Rowell, tackles; Bobbie Baxter and Charles Crouch, ends.

## Plans For Local Blood Pool Are Now Being Made

Plans for a Lockney blood pool set up through the Floyd County Co-operative Hospital here are in the making now. Co-operating in the plans are members of the hospital staff, Drs. D. R. Foster and G. A. McClelland, Joseph H. Holt, M. T., and Miss Hazel Guerry, R. N., who are in charge of the laboratory and other members of the hospital staff. The Lockney Rotary Club and the Lockney Business & Professional Women's Club are aiding in the project.

The plan is to type the blood of at least 250 adults of this area so that when blood is needed or in case of an emergency a record will be available as to who has the kind of blood needed. It will also be of benefit to the person whose blood is typed since if occasion should arise when they would need blood, time would not have to be spent in retyping that person's blood. A small card to fit the billfold will be given each person whose blood is typed showing the type of blood, the Rh factor and other information, Mr. Holt stated.

This will amount to a living blood bank. Mr. Holt pointed out. Only a few drops of blood and about five minutes time will be needed for the test. Blood will not be stored but the person who has the type needed will be called when he can help.

Each person whose blood is typed will be required to pay for the chemicals used in the typing which will amount to about \$1.00, Mr. Holt said. The usual charge for a complete analysis of blood such as is planned here is usually \$10.00. Mr. Holt and Miss Guerry are donating their time without charge. They will do this work two nights each week, Tuesday and Thursday night, starting on Tuesday of next week and extending through Thursday, Dec. 16. The time will be from 7:30 until 10:30 p. m.

"In the event of a tornado, cyclone, explosion or other catastrophe a blood pool will be indispensable," Mr. Holt said. "There are just four types of blood and they never change. Everyone should have their blood typed for their own benefit if for no other reason. Veterans have their blood type on their dog tags, but they should come and have their blood retyped so that the Rh factor can be added. Blood transfusions are not made now without determining the Rh factor."

"Whether you are getting over a cold or illness, makes no difference on getting your blood typed," Mr. Holt continued. "It could save you considerable money as well as time if an accident or sudden illness struck."

The civic clubs will join in the effort to enlist every adult in this area in having their blood typed. It was said. The project is a non-profit move with the thought in mind to benefit the community generally.

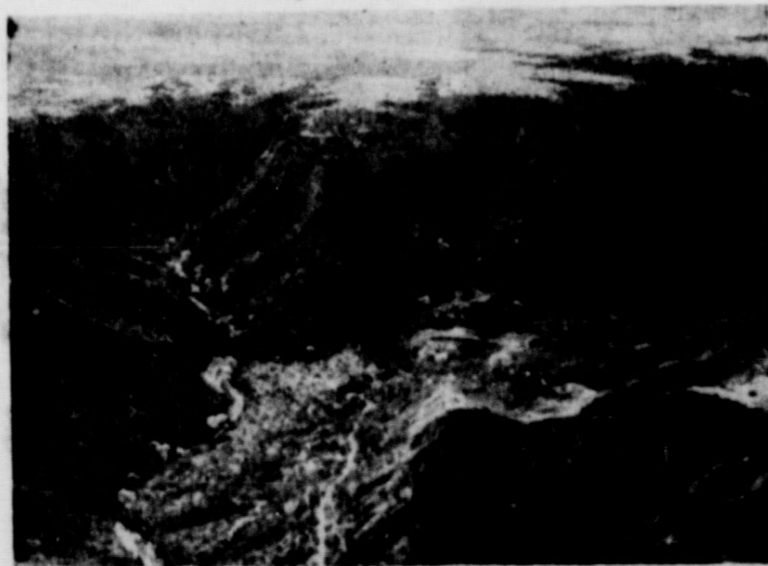
Names of the men will be released as soon as they have been sworn in, Mr. Lockhart said. The call will be made up from men who have already passed a physical examination.

## Cotton Harvest Over Half Done

Harvesting of the 1946 cotton crop in this part of Floyd County is more than half through local ginners estimated Wednesday morning. From 50 to 60% of the crop is harvested and much of the remainder will be gathered with mechanical harvesters.

The local gins reported a total of almost 8,000 bales ginned this season. If the estimates are accurate the total ginnings will approach 14,000 bales, the largest crop ginned here in a number of years.

Some Mexican laborers have already left for their homes in South Texas and others are leaving, due mostly to the cold weather and the fact that they haven't been able to work much more than half of the time. However, weather conditions had improved Wednesday and they were able to spend most of the day in the field.

**Non-Service Pensions, Veterans Of World War I**

The Veterans Administration has made a recent ruling, by which the percentage of disability required to be shown, is reduced.

On attainment of Age 55, the requirement is 60% RATING FOR ONE OR MORE DISABILITIES, with no percentage requirement for any one disability.

The requirement at Age 60 will be a 50% RATING FOR ONE OR MORE DISABILITIES.

At Age 65, there will be NO PERCENTAGE REQUIREMENT, OTHER THAN ONE DISABILITY RATABLE AT 10% OR MORE.

The above rulings will greatly help many deserving Veterans of World War I, who are now unemployable by reason of their disabilities, and whose applications for pension have been denied previously.

**Nation's Cotton Crop 3 Million More**

AUSTIN, Texas—The cotton crop this year is approximately 3,250,000 bales more than last year's. Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas professor of cotton marketing, reported.

The unusually large cotton crop in the United States this year is the result of increased yield per acre. Improved yields per acre account for about 90 per cent of the increase and expanded acreage for only about 10 per cent of the gain.

Exports of United States grown cotton with the help of the Economic Cooperation Administration will probably exceed 4 million bales, and do-

estic consumption is expected to exceed 9 million bales. This should leave a carryover of about 5 million bales on next August, Dr. Cox said.

World supplies of all cotton for 1948-49 will be about the same as for 1947-48 because of the reduced carry-over last August. World production this year is now expected generally to balance world consumption at about 28 million bales.

Texas has 394 entries in the Egg Laying Contest representing nearly 122 thousand birds. If each bird lays 120 eggs during the year of the contest, there will be over 18 and a quarter million eggs produced in the contest.

Texas has about 530 weekly newspapers and many fine small dailies.

far too important a group to overlook in considering one's journalistic future," Miller said. "Texas weeklies have a circulation in excess of 722,000 and are read by more than half of the state's residents. Eighty-five per cent of the Texas population is in towns under 10,000 population.

"It is estimated that readers of American weekly newspapers here spent 3 billion dollars in 1947, or about 41 per cent of all money going into retail trade. This fact, plus the high readership of the small papers, makes the American weekly an unusually stable institution. It has a place which no other medium of communication can fill."

A contract for construction has been left and work is underway. Dr. W. C. Holden, curator, estimates the building will be ready for general use by the opening of school next year, September, 1949.

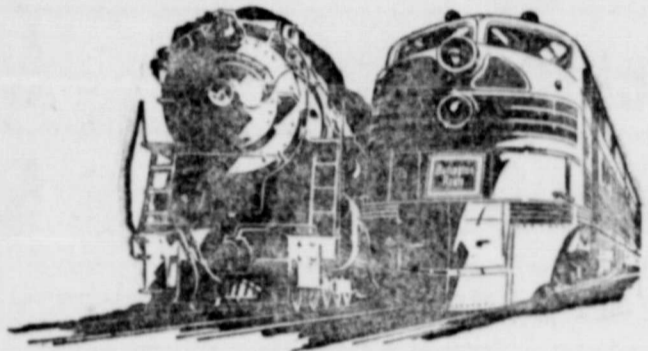
Definite plans for the interior arrangement of the museum include

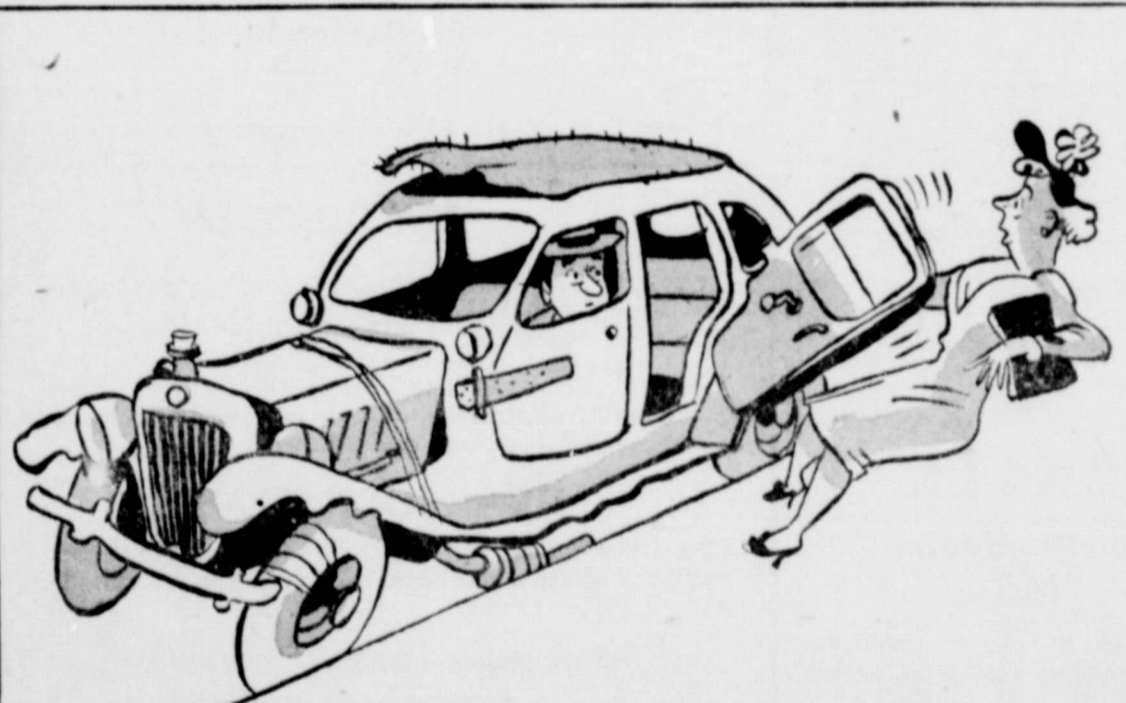

## Experiment On Flour Made From Grain

LUBBOCK—Research on sorghum grains and flour made from sorghum produced in Texas' southplains area is being resumed by the foods and nutrition department at Texas Techological college.

Shallu, which produces a fine grain white flour, and Martin maize, producer of a coarser darker flour, are the two grains which will be tried in the new experiment. Standard recipes for hot breads, yeast breads and pastries will be used in the tests. The experiments are designed specifically to determine allowable proportions of sorghum grain flour substitute for wheat flour to obtain equally satisfying products.

During the texture and taste experiments, a biological assay will be conducted on the grains to determine nutritive properties. Mrs. Johnnie Michie, professor of foods and nutrition, said. A colony of approximately 125 white rats are to be used in this part of the experiment.

"Revived interest in utilizing for human consumption an abundantly grown crop as sorghums in this area prompted extension of grain sorghum experiments done in 1942. During that year some work was done in use of flours from coarser maize in hot breads," Mrs. Michie said.

Since Shallu has been developed, indications are that, because of better milling properties of this grain, it will be possible to make finer textured and more acceptable products from the flour, and also that this flour will be more suitable for use in wider range for flour mixtures.

Extensive investigation into sorghums' possibilities at Texas Tech has been made possible through the co-operation of Mr. R. E. Karpel, agronomist, in charge of sorghum investigations by Texas Experiment station, who has made available sufficient amounts of the grains. The department of milling industry at Kansas State college at Manhattan, Kans., is turning the grains into acceptable flour types.

Dr. Mina Lamb, associate professor of foods and nutrition, and Miss Faye Hattox, instructor, are working with Mrs. Michie in direction of the experiment. A number of graduate assistants are assisting in the tests.

Results of the experiments will be continued, however, two years to substantiate findings.

## Doctor Should Be Consulted When Child Becomes Ill

AUSTIN, TEXAS—In a statement on controlling communicable diseases issued by the Texas State Department of Health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer states that if every case of suspected communicable disease were seen promptly by the family physician and definitely diagnosed, thousands of susceptible persons would be protected from these disabling diseases.

"The theory that it is a good thing for children to have these catching childhood diseases and get them over with, has long since been proven an error which may actually endanger a child's life," says Dr. Cox. "The longer he can avoid having these diseases, the better it is for him. Every child should be protected by immunization against all diseases where an immunity can be established."

Prompt diagnosis, isolation and good medical care give the patient the best chance for a satisfactory recovery without the serious complications that sometimes accompany even the milder forms of communicable diseases. Dr. Cox emphasized that obeying the public health laws regarding isolation, and quarantine protects not only the patient, but helps to prevent the spread of the disease to other persons.

"The State Health Department," Dr. Cox said, "does everything within its power to protect the health of the people of Texas, but the cooperation of every individual in protecting his own health and that of his community will do more than anything else to successfully check the spread of communicable diseases among our people."

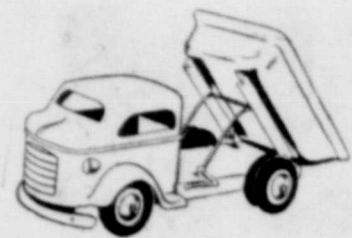

## Specialist Predicts Toes Will Disappear

And then, shoes. Toes were caged. Discontented, they allowed nails to grow in and bunions to grow out. Go to any beach and try to get to the foot of the problem.

For every 1,000 lovely faces, or figures, or nicely shaped ears, it's difficult to locate one pair of decent feet.

Dr. Stickel aired his views in connection with National Foot Health week.

"I have studied the problem carefully," he said, "and have decided there is nothing rational the chiropractist can do to arrest evolution."

## Motorist, 91, Stands on Head to Prove He's Healthy

SALT LAKE CITY.—A 91-year-old motorist here thinks he's in better health than most younger drivers. He has one convincing argument.

Mads M. Christensen stands on his head to silence skeptics.

The enthusiastic motorist drives a 1923 model car. "I'll be nagged if I would want to go back to the old horse-and-buggy days," he smiles. He bought the car 23 years ago.

## Thirteen-Year-Old Mystery Still Puzzles Sheriffs

EL PASO, TEX. — Somewhere in the eroded butte country of eastern New Mexico there are the bones of four people—two men and two women who disappeared 13 years ago while on a trip to the West coast.

Mr. and Mrs. George Lorus of East St. Louis, Ill., and their traveling companions, Mr. and Mrs. George Hebere of DeQuoin, Ill., spent the night of May 21, 1935, in Vaughn, N. M. They apparently reached Albuquerque, N. M., where postcards bearing their handwriting were mailed the next day.

There the trail ended. The Lorus' 1931 model automobile gave authorities their only clue. A nervous young man with a prominent Adams apple abandoned the car in Dallas after passing through El Paso. He left a trail of Lorus' travelers' checks before he disappeared in Dallas.

Texas and New Mexico sheriffs in this sparsely populated country along the Mexican border never have doubted that the party was murdered. Murder, however, can't be proved until the body is found and there has never been a trace of the Illinois couples.

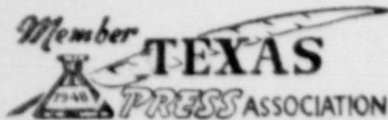

**THE PARTY LINE**

In 1937, in a speech before the University of Washington Luncheon Club, Harry Bridges, the militant head of one of the principal unions of Longshoremen, said: "We take the stand that we, as workers, have nothing in common with the employers. We are all in a class struggle and we subscribe to the belief that if the employer is not in business his products will still be necessary and we will be providing them when there is no employing class."

In 1947, Mr. Bridges was quoted in the official I. W. U. paper as saying: "A country that has a totalitarian government operates like our union."

Last September, when his union was engaged in a strike against employers, Mr. Bridges was quoted by

one of the leading San Francisco daily newspapers as saying: "When this strike is finished, we will be out of business or they will be out of business."

The important issue is just what proportion of labor in this country subscribes to such ideas—and just what it thinks will happen if the "employing class" which Mr. Bridges despises is destroyed.

It should be obvious to a child that if the present "employing class" is sent to the junk heap, another must take its place. And the new employer would be the government, which is precisely what has happened in Russia and the other total states that Mr. Bridges apparently admires. If the government is the dictator of the instruments of production, it must also be the dictator of all labor—the people who run the machines. No one can strike against the government without being guilty of promoting civil war. The result—and here again Russia is the perfect example—is a system of slave labor, where no one dare dissent and everyone does precisely what he is told on pain of the severest penalties.

The fact that labor in this country can strike; that it can wring concessions out of employers, that it can stand up on its own feet and say what it thinks, is the finest possible example of democracy in practice. Under socialism and communism, by contrast, with the government as the only important employer, the working man and the union are nothing but tools of the state.

It is a pleasure to record that many a tough and intelligent labor union chief, knowing this, has fought for the principle of free enterprise. Unless we have free enterprise we cannot have free and independent labor. That is the tremendous issue that will determine the welfare, the future, and the living standards of all the workers of this country.

**THE SIGNIFICANCE OF ARMISTICE DAY**

The significance of Armistice Day goes deep into the heart of this country. It marks our victory in the two most destructive wars the world has ever known. Of comparable importance, it should remind every American of the enormous human and economic wealth we have been forced to spend to maintain our liberties, and to defend those principles upon which the dignity of man depends.

Armistice Day should bring us another thought as well. This nation has never provoked a war. No people on earth is more peaceful in intention. None will do more to achieve a just and lasting peace for all countries. If ever we are forced to engage in war, it will be because we can find no other means of maintaining those rights and freedoms which make up the American tradition.

The United States must build and conserve its strength. That means, on the surface, that we must have a strong military force capable of deal-

ing with aggressors, and a mighty industrial structure to back it up. But these things, vital as they are, represent a reflection of our strength rather than the substance of it. For the core of this nation's strength and power lies in the spirit of its people. That spirit is the spirit of freedom. It is based on the knowledge that every American has inalienable rights

which cannot be abrogated. The right to speak our minds, the right to own property, the right to engage in a business of our choosing, the right to be free of dictation by government—these and other rights constitute our strength. And that too is the significance of Armistice Day.

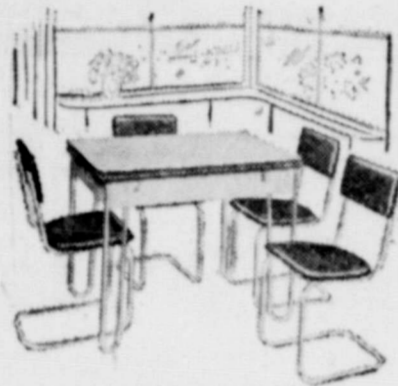
#### "Powder Puff" Bowl Game Set For Nov. 23

**JOHNSTON URGES FARMERS TO VOTE ON COMMITTEES**

"About the easiest way for us farmers to lose the voice we have in the administration of the farm program is for us to neglect to use that voice," says G. B. Johnston, Chairman of the Floyd County Production and Marketing Administration County Committee.

"Under present legislation we can elect the committeemen who administer the farm program locally. We can elect the delegates to the county convention where the county committee is elected. From these community committees comes the leadership for the county committee." Ahead are vital decisions having to do with price support and soil and water conservation, the chairman points out. "That is why it is so important for the committeemen elected in the communities and counties to be the choice of the majority of the farmers in the

communities and counties of the country."

All Floyd County farmers, who are eligible to vote, should participate in the elections, he urges. Failure to vote may mean that the committee elected will represent but a small portion of the farmers in the community. "You are helping to elect a committee whether you vote or not and you may be helping to elect the committeeman you don't want, if you fail to vote," Mr. Johnston said.

"Unless the going is real tough there is a tendency to let such things as elections and similar responsibilities slide. It is when we neglect our rights that we lose them."

All farmers who are participating in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program or who had a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation for this year are eligible to vote in these farmer-committee elections. The elections will be held in Floyd County Monday, Dec. 6.

**Pioneer Applies For Extension Of Flights**

An application to serve 13 new cities in Texas and Oklahoma has been filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board by Pioneer Air Lines.

Gen. Robert J. Smith, Pioneer president, today announced in Houston that the application specifically requested:

1. Extensions from Dallas-Fort Worth to Tulsa, Oklahoma via Sherman-Dension, Texas, McAllister and Okmu'gee, Okla.
2. From Amarillo, Texas to Dallas-Fort Worth via Childress, Vernon and Wichita Falls, Texas.
3. From Amarillo, Texas to Tulsa, Oklahoma via Pampa, Texas Enid, Ponca City and Bartlesville, Okla.
4. From Temple, Texas to San Antonio via Austin, Texas.
5. From Lubbock, Texas to Roswell, New Mexico.
6. From Tucuman, New Mexico to Amarillo, Texas.

If granted, the new routes would cover 1359 miles. Pioneer now operates 2,200 system miles to 25 cities in Texas and New Mexico.

The overall picture of the requests would mean that Pioneer would serve 38 cities over 3559 system miles from Houston and San Antonio on the South to Amarillo and Tulsa on the north; from Dallas-Fort Worth on the East to Albuquerque on the west.

Gen. Smith pointed out that this type of service is not now being provided these cities and that many of them have never had air service.

Pioneer was the nation's first feeder airline, when operations were started on August 1, 1945 over a 638-mile route from Houston to Amarillo via Austin, San Angelo, Abilene and Lub-

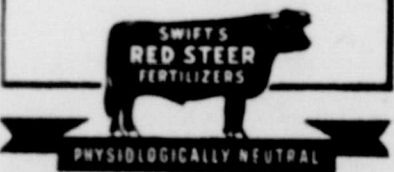

Honey During the Ages Interesting are the stories of symbolic ceremonies associated with weddings among people of Asia, Africa, and Europe. Not the least of these tells of the part played by honey. Honey was respected as an important commodity, as a symbol of sweetness in family relations and of protection against evil spirits, and as a food. History records that in the marriage contracts of ancient Egypt the bridegroom has to promise his bride a definite amount of honey each year. Among the Hindus and certain Central European people honey was used to bless the home or anoint the bridal couple. In Rome and among the Slavs honey or a honey beverage was served to the bride and the bridegroom as a special part of the ceremony. In a few countries some of these and similar customs still persist.

### Owes His Life To CROP Contributions



This little lad, in a German kindergarten, owes his life to American farm folks who are sending gifts to the needy overseas through the Christian Rural Overseas program (CROP). Thousands of such children, without fathers or mothers, cannot exist without volunteer aid.

The CROP food train now being planned in this, and 30 other, states will especially benefit orphans, children who are ill (many with tuberculosis), widows, and the aged.

Most needed are whole grains, meat, milk, and other farm commodities of high food value. Raw cotton and wool are also needed.

CROP is sponsored nationally by Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service, and Lutheran World Relief. Contributions are sent into 43 different nations.

### Baptist Convention At Houston

Ten thousand Texas Baptist are expected to converge upon the city of Houston November 7-11 for their centennial celebration.

The annual convention of the Woman's Missionary Union will be held in the historic First Baptist church of Houston November 7-9. The Brotherhood convention will open on Monday the 8th, with sessions in the city music hall. The closing sessions of these two pre-convention meetings on Tuesday evening will be the opening session of the Baptist convention in the city auditorium.

The feature of the opening session will be a pageant depicting one hundred years of organized Baptist work in Texas. Dr. Wallace Bassett, for thirty years pastor of the Cliff Temple Baptist church in Dallas will deliver the president's message.

Out-of-state speakers include Mrs. W. C. Tyler, Blue Mountain, Miss.; Dr. Arnold Ohrn, Washington, D. C., who is secretary of the Baptist World Alliance; Dr. John Caylor, Atlanta, Georgia, editorial secretary of the Home Mission Board; Er. T. L. Holcomb, secretary of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.; and Dr. R. G. Lee, Memphis, Tenn., president of the Southern Baptist convention.

The annual sermon for the convention will be preached Wednesday noon by Dr. Forrest Fecoz, pastor of the First Baptist church, Waco.

Dr. W. R. White, president of the oldest school in Texas, Baylor university, will bring an address on Wednesday evening on the subject, "Looking Forward 100 Years in Texas." This address will follow the report of the Survey Committee which will recommend to the convention a budget for the coming year of ten million dollars.

The convention, the largest religious gathering in Texas, will come to a close on Thursday evening with the address from the president of the Southern Baptist convention, Dr. Lee.

Discounting the possibility of war and adverse weather conditions, the 1948 prices of most commodities from Texas farms and ranches are expected to average slightly lower than the prices of 1948.

In 294 households where the laundry was done at home, the time spent on the job ranged from less than three and a half hours to more than nine and a half hours. A hundred of these families—or 34 percent—of them reported between five and a half to seven and a half hours spent each week in laundering.


