Quail hunters in most of the state may look forward to improved quail hunting this fall, states the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Com-

The quail hunting season for the state is from December 1 through January 16, both days inclusive, with a bag limit of 12 per day or 36 per week. However, in the twenty-eight county area of the Parhandle, only ten birds per day may be taken with a possession limit of twenty. West of the Pecos the season is open only during December and the daily bag limit is 12, with not more than 24 in possession. There is no open season on Mearn's quail

Assisted in sponsoring the Annual Commercial Club Beef Show in an effort to encourage a more practical method of feeding club beef and to encourage more feeding of commercial beef in the county.

Maintained a year-round labor camp for the farmers of Castro County in an effort to make available more common labor which is so vitally needed in this area...

Has taken an active interest in the formation of a water district in an effort to keep down state controls of irrigation water which is so vital to the agricultural economy of Castro County.




