

The First Baptist Church of Lock ney was virtually demolished about 9:45 Wednesday night when the snow and ice on the roof caused the walls to collapse dropping the roof down into the main auditorium.

Still standing Thursday was the front part of the building including the vestibule and two class rooms, and the rear of the building including the church office, and two Sunday

Church services, including the worship services, Sunday School and Training Union, will be held as usual at the City Auditorium it was announced Thursday by Rev. E. J. Cobb, pastor of the First Baptist Church. The usual time will be observed.

School Departments. The roof fell into the main auditorium crushing the furniture and fixtures of the building. Church officials thought Thursday that some pews may be salvaged and possibly other chairs but most of the furniture including one piano was completely demolished. Damage will amount to at least \$40,000.00.

Plans were already being made for the salvage of the furniture in the basement and the part of the building still intact Thursday. The basement was undamaged except for the cracking of the sidewalls. No one was in the building at the

time of the collapse as far as is known and therefore no injury occurred.





Back to this question many Texas cotton farmers are asking-"What should I do with cotton in 1949" That is a matter for the farmer himself to decide, says Bates. But a few Jerry, what happened to Dowell? decision. Here are some points to

1. The carry-over stocks of cotton next August are expected to be about Dafolette appeal to you? Could Donald three million bales greater than on last August 1.

2. The total cotton used in this country is expected to drop a little during the coming months. However, the foreign shipments are to increase under the European Aid Program.

3. Price prospects through the government loans are a little more favorable than for feed crops due to storage difficulties with grains. 4. Finally, the prospective demand

for livestock and livestock products is relatively stronger than for crops. Bates concludes that this year should be one of fair opportunity for cotton growers if good production and marketing practices are followed. It looks as if cotton "has the edge" on cash grains if it's a toss-up between these two crops.

Certainly where livestock production is handled along with cotton, the output of meat, milk and eggs should not be decreased next year. It's good, common sense, says Bates, to keep up the production schedule on the basis of long-run profits.

During the coming year, farmers must keep up the production system which will maintain the soil and provide permanent gains for better living.







Looking to 1949

We are now looking through winter's snowstorms, mists and fogs into the campaign of 1949 from late April to October. Who will be the star rookie of 1949 to make good on his "second trip around?"

You already have the leaders-Dark, Bearden, Ashburn and Goodman. Doby can be rated, if you figure him a 1948 freshman or a 1949 sophomore.

Doby is as good an all-around outfielder as I've seen besides Musial, Williams, and DiMaggio. And Bearden is the best young pitcher I've seen in some time. He was the pennant and the world's series savior of 1948. But there are always pitfalls ahead. Who can tell where they are?

In 1947, Ewell Blackwell looked to be one of the star pitchers of many years. The & foot 6-inch star from California won 22 games and lost eight with the drooping Reds. With other teams he would have passed the 30 mark. Here was one of the great young pitchers from baseball history to reach the game. But it was a different story in 1948. The tall and willowy Blackwell came along with a sore arm. He was never right through the 1948 season, where the year before he had pitched 17 consecutive nohit innings.

You can't pitch with a sore arm. Blackwell couldn't. You can't pitch with too much fat. Shea couldn't. You can only pitch when you are in shape.

You can only play baseball when you are in shape, and yet last spring I'd say that about 70 per cent of the players who reported were not in nearly as good condition as Ducky Medwick was, and Medwick has been around for more years than most of us can remember.

Medwick has always reported in shape. And then gotten in better shape. Most ballplayers report in soggy shape and spend most of their time trying to work off fat. At least too many do.

I don't believe this will happen to Dark, Ashburn, Bearden, Doby. Goodman, Chesnes and one or two others who can be vital cogs in various pennant machines of 1949. I look to see both Raschi and Porterfield of the Yankees ready to go. SEWING CIRCLE PATTERNS
