In literary events a group from the Speech Class will enter the one-act play contest. The cast will include Mary Louise Manning, Joe Keeter, Beth Kellison, Jack Cole, Ewell Dee Kelley. The title of the play will be "The Darkest Hour" and Mrs. Sid Thomas is the director.

A team of three will enter the typing contest. The team will be selected from this group: Ilene Harris, Mervyn Patterson, Myrtle Lou Newton, Beth Kellison, Norma Vernon and Laverne Dorman.

Engineer Dies From Wreck Injuries

Walter Williams, 65, engineer for the Fort Worth & Denver, who was seriously injured in a truck-train wreck five miles north of Lockney two weeks ago died in a F&W&D hospital at Wichita Falls last Friday night.

Williams suffered a broken leg, cuts and bruises in the wreck. He suffered a heart attack at the Floyd County hospital here after the wreck, according to reports reaching The Beacon but his condition had improved to such an extent by Saturday following the wreck that he was able to be moved to the railway hospital at Wichita Falls.

Reports reaching Lockney did not state the exact cause of his death but it was supposed here that it would be attributed to a heart ailment.

Jimmie McClure, 4-H Club boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McClure of the Lone Star Community showed the grand champion lamb at the Plainview Fair Stock Show held April 1st and 2nd, according to Assistant County Agent, C. J. Murphrey. This was a cross bred lamb that took a 4th place ribbon at the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show at Floydada on March 30th.

Late last fall while hauling feed Jimmy found this lamb in a roadside ditch almost starved to death. He picked the lamb up and took it to its owner who was Jimmy's neighbor. He told Jimmy he could have the lamb if he wanted it. Jimmy took the lamb and immediately it responded to good treatment, so he used it for his 4-H Club demonstration, and he felt he had been well paid for all his work when the judge, Mr. J. A. Gray, announced he had won Grand Champion. Jimmy and his father went to Kansas City to sell the lamb, along with 28 other showmen who were selling their prize animals.

Write-In Campaign Here Enlivens City Election

A surprise write-in campaign, of which no one but the participants was aware, enlivened the city election here Tuesday and brought defeat to one city alderman and almost the same fate to the mayor.

E. R. Harris write-in candidate, nosed out J. B. Seale for alderman by five votes, Harris received 46 to Seale's 41. Mayor G. M. Brunner received 45 votes and Fred Hall, write-in candidate, received 43, according to the tabulation furnished The Beacon by T. B. Mitchell, election judge.

A third write-in candidate, Vernon Daniels, received 28 votes while J. E. Cox, incumbent alderman received 58.

The vote came as a surprise to many people here who did not go vote because they considered the election a non-contested affair. Most local people were unaware of the write-in campaign until the results were announced after the polls closed.

Apparently the campaign came as a result of dissatisfaction with the city council's recent raise in water rates, although The Beacon was not informed as the reason by those backing the write-in candidates.

AUSTIN, Texas—If you want to do special research or write a club paper and have no public library in your home town, write to the University

of Texas Package Loan Library Bureau.

Established in 1914 as part of the Extension Division, the Loan library furnishes information on subjects ranging from Pulitzer prize winners to "Bluebonnets in Texas Poetry."

Women's clubs and schools call on the bureau most often, Miss LeNore Dimmitt, director, says. Literature, the most popular pre-war discussion topic, has shown renewed interest recently, but national and international problems are topics of a large number of programs.

In addition to furnishing "packages" of clippings, pamphlets and other material, Miss Dimmitt and her staff aid clubs in outlining courses of study built around central themes.

Ten years ago, in 1939, a dollar would buy a dozen eggs, (39c), a pound of butter (30c), a sack of 20 oranges (25c) and a tall can of milk (6c). Today, the same dollar will buy one pound of butter (80c) and five eggs (49 cents a dozen).

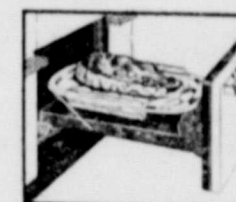

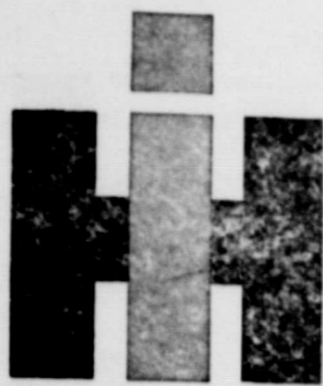

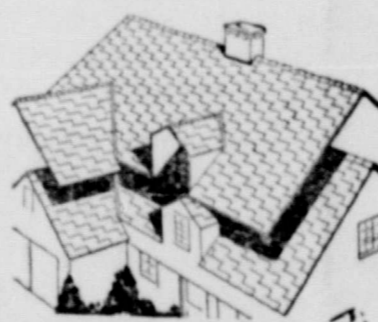

Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show Set To Begin Monday

PLAINVIEW, TEXAS—(Special)—Plans are complete for what promises to be the largest Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show in history when the 22nd such annual event opens in Plainview, Monday, April 11. The show extends through Friday, April 15.

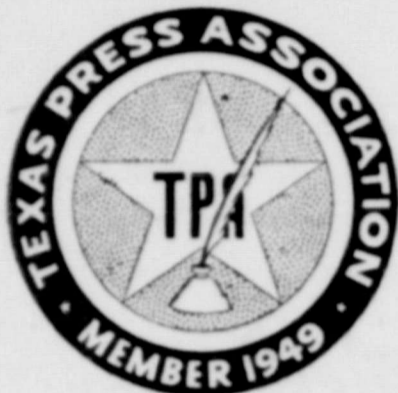

A FAIR BALANCE

Those who believed, following the election, that Congress would enthusiastically repeal the Taft-Hartley law in toto and revert to the old Wagner Act, have been disappointed. Too many influential members of both parties have shown themselves to be against giving labor extremists a blank check.

The Taft-Hartley Act is frequently denounced as a measure which enslaves labor. No evidence can be produced to support this. Since it became the law, numerous labor groups have demanded and received wage increases and other benefits. The legitimate bargaining powers of the unions have not been undermined in the slightest. One of the achievements of the Act has been to place a curb on labor racketeering, and to give the rank and file of members a much stronger voice in the conduct of the unions which they keep alive with their dues.

The Act is not perfect. It undoubtedly can be changed and amended, in the light of experience. But that does not disguise the fact that it marks a great step forward in effect-

ing a fair balance between business on the one hand and organized labor on the other.

POINT OF NO RETURN

The Farm Journal, which has a very large circulation among rural families throughout the United States, recently ran an exceptional editorial, which deserves the widest possible circulation. Here is what the Journal said: "Never has a nation recovered itself, once the leaders have lured the people far into the grip of socialistic power. You call the roll as far back as history reaches. Countries go on down to catastrophe as Germany and Italy have gone, as Rome went, and as Russia will go.

"Americans for a century and a half supported their government, kept it well out of their affairs and so became the earth's richest people. Now more and more we ask the government to support us."

agriculture, housing, education, health and other things. Everybody is encouraged to ask for something. Every government aid means more taxes and more regulation. Each new experiment fastens onto the people a new load, and the load remains."

RUSSIA'S STRENGTH

Just how strong is the Russian economy by comparison with that of the United States? Just how successful have the Communist leaders been in restoring their basic industry after the strains and ravages of a long war?

These are questions of the highest importance. Russia's capacity to fight again, regardless of how large her armies and air forces may be, will be largely determined by her industrial potential—military power burns out swiftly unless there is an unbroken stream of supplies to feed it.

U. S. News & World Report dealt with the Soviet Union's economic situation in a recent article whose first paragraph said: "Russia is continuing to lead from weakness, not from strength in her challenge to nations of the West. This fact is shown by the condition of Russian industry and agriculture at this time."

The magazine backed that up with a series of revealing statistics. First of all, Russia's postwar industrial comeback has been relatively slow. The output of her factories is still 6 per cent below the 1940 level. U. S. production, by contrast, is now 54 per cent above. Britain is also exceeding the prewar figure, though by a much smaller percentage.

When a direct industry-by-industry comparison is made with this country,

Russia's inferiority is striking. She now produces 10 per cent as much oil as we do, 18.5 per cent as much electric power, 23 per cent as much steel, and 31 per cent as much coal—all basic products which have a direct bearing on her entire economy. She produces only 3.2 per cent as many trucks and cars, though she is now making strenuous efforts to build up her motor industry. To take examples of vital consumer goods, she produces 29 per cent as many leather shoes and 35 per cent as many cotton and woolen articles. The advantage in our favor is even more evident when it is remembered that Russia has a considerably larger population.

In its summing up, U. S. News observes: "Russia, today, is not in the same league with the United States. American production, however, is geared to consumers while Russia is concentrating everything on expanding industry. A slowdown in U. S. industrial expansion may enable Russia to narrow the gap..." So, while our industrial advantage over Russia is enormous at present, we are not in a position to believe it can safely be maintained without continued development on our part.

There is some speculation to the effect that Stalin's periodic "peace overtures" may be designed to conciliate public sentiment in the Western world, while Russia strives to bring her industrial output nearer to desired levels.

Spring planting season is just around the corner and farm machinery will be on the move again. Check it over carefully and get it in good shape before the work starts. Look for defects in hitches, seats, clutches, wheels, brakes, fuel lines, steering and unguarded gears or shafts.

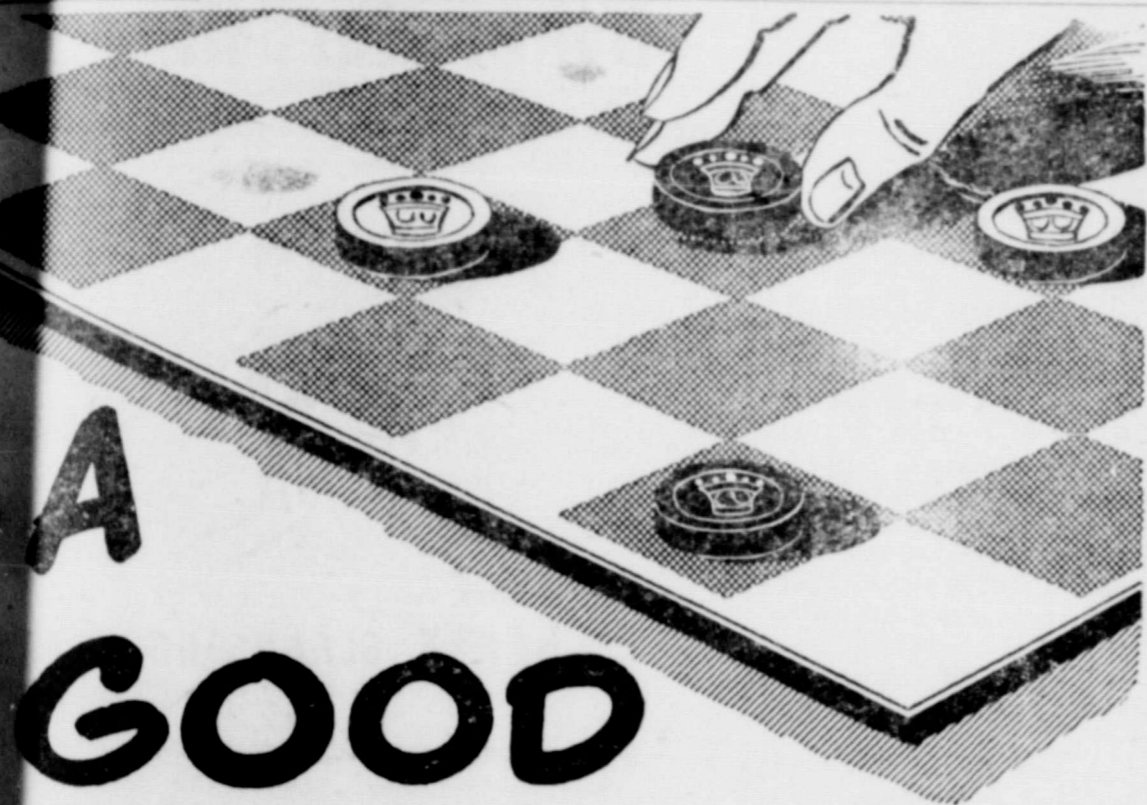

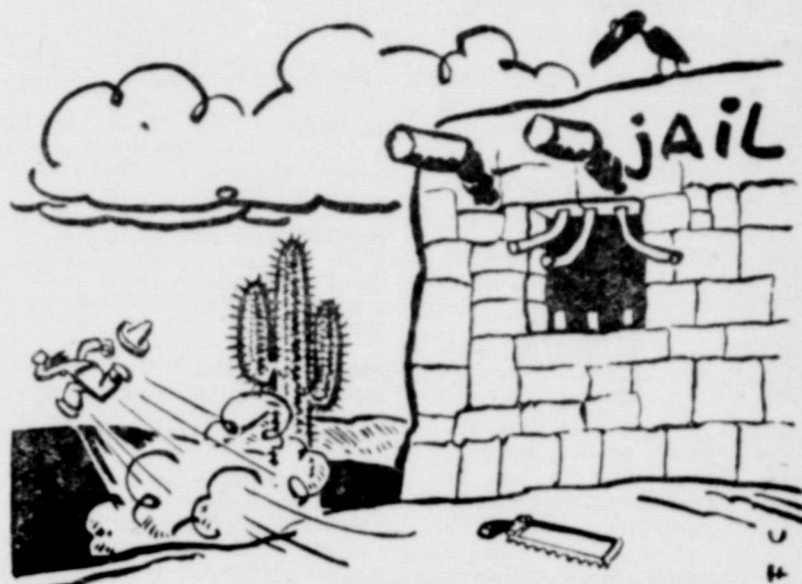
