## ONLY 3% SHOW ABNORMAL ON CHEST X-RAYS

That Floyd County people are well above the average in health was indicated this week by a report from the State Department of Health on the recent county chest x-ray survey made at Floydada. Out of the 1852 people who had a chest x-ray made, only 54 showed abnormal, the state department reported. This amounts to slightly less than 3% of the total. The state average is 10%, it was said.

In writing to Floydada Chamber of Commerce Manager Robert Crowell, Dr. Howard E. Smith, of the State Department of Health commended Floyd County people on their co-operation and turn-out in the drive.

Dr. George Smith of Floydada, county health officer, stated that this chest x-ray was one of the best health measures that could be practiced on a large scale. Clarence Guffee, chairman of the arrangement committee, expressed his thanks to all persons who helped in the drive.

## Building Loans Available For Wheat Storage

Forms from Commodity Credit Corporation for the new government loans to construct grain storage facilities are now available at the Agricultural Conservation Administration office in the Agricultural building, Floydada, Texas. Ray S. McEntire, secretary of the Floyd County PMA, has announced today.

The loans, secured from local lending agencies with a government guarantee, will be given up to 85% of the cost of building the permanent wheat storage bins or 45 cents per bushel of rated capacity, whichever is smaller. The borrower would be allowed five years to pay at 4 percent interest.

### Distress Loans On Wheat

The ACA office has announced an emergency distress loan plan, whereby wheat may be piled on the ground under a 75 per cent loan with the farmer being given 90 days to secure or provide storage. The grain will be graded at the time it is piled, and if the farmer fulfilled his contract, he will be paid on that grade, regardless of deterioration.

Tenants who apply for construction loans for storage should have a five year lease on the farm or on the bin site.

## Barker Named City Secretary To Succeed Watson

FLOYDADA.—B. K. Barke, has been named city secretary of Floydada and comptroller of the municipal light system, succeeding Jake B. Watson, who has accepted a position as secretary-treasurer of the Floydada National Farm Loan association.

Barker will assume his duties with the city within the forthcoming few weeks. He formerly was city secretary until his defeat in a municipal election this spring.

Watson will take the place of A. B. Clark, who recently resigned his position with the farm loan association because of ill health.

## Two Cars Damaged In Wreck Thursday

A new 1949 Dodge and a 1947 model Mercury were both damaged about the front end Thursday at noon when they collided at the intersection of Highway 70 and the Lockney loop in southwest Lockney.

The Mercury was driven by an Amarillo man. It had started to turn off the highway to the left and enter the loop leading into Lockney when the two cars collided. Both drivers skidded their tires for possibly 50 or 60 feet before colliding and had lost much of their momentum.

Neither driver suffered any serious injury, receiving slight bruises about the knees.

Deputy Sheriff Olen Potote investigated the incident.

## New Church Of Christ Minister Arrives Thursday

## Protection Of Farm Stored Wheat Is Urged By Co. Agent

A large percentage of this year's bumper wheat crop is in or will be placed in farm storage. It is important to protect this wheat because the farmers have been fortunate to harvest such a crop stated assistant county agent Edd McLeroy yesterday. Every bushel saved will contribute toward increased farm efficiency and toward helping feed a hungry world.

No. 1: Remove and feed or bury all old infested grain both inside and outside bins from driveways, and from under the bins. The old grain is the source of much insect infestation and too many of the bugs have burrowed into walls, cracks, and crannies.

No. 2: Spray the bin thoroughly with 2 1/4% DDT or chlordane. Use two gallons of spray to each 1,000 square feet of floor space and wall space.

No. 3: If bin is in a poor condition, take special precautions to see that it is in top condition before any grain is put in it.

No. 4: If temporary storage is used, use the best possible. War surplus tents and tarps have proven very satisfactory. Blueprints for temporary storage may be obtained from the County Agent's office.

When placing the wheat in farm storage, if at all possible, have the moisture content down to 12 1/2%. High moisture grain is conducive to insect infestation as well as heating.

After the wheat has been stored it should be fumigated within two to four weeks. The wheat should hold the fumigant for several weeks, and one treatment should last until warm weather next spring. If a commercial fumigant is used, the instructions will be on the label. There are two common types that may be made up. The first mixture is composed of three parts ethylene dichloride and one part carbon tetrachloride. Use this at the rate of four gallons per 1,000 bushels in a steel bin, and six gallons in wooden bins. The second mixture is one part carbon disulfide and four parts of carbon tetrachloride. Use this at the rate of two gallons per thousand bushels in steel bins and four gallons in wooden bins. Keep all fumigants away from fire, be careful not to breathe it, and don't get it on your skin or clothing.

The farm stored grain should be checked once a month for temperature and insects. Those insects may be small but they do a tremendous lot of damage to stored grain. It is estimated that the tiny insects get one out of every eight bushels of Texas farm stored grain.

Let's keep that extra bushel and take care of the wheat that the farmers have been fortunate to make.

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## WORK BEGINS ON NEW WATER LINES

Work began Wednesday on the laying of new water lines and the replacing of some old pipes in the city. The project will afford city water to over 100 families who do not now have it available and will also increase service to some where small pipes limit the service.

The first work being done is the replacing of a four inch line on West Locust with a six inch line. The crew will also take out a dead end on this line and loop it so that water customers will always have fresh water in their pipes. The line will be run practically to the city limits.

Also running off of West Locust a six inch line will loop in the Byars addition, run south on Sixth street to Willow street and from Willow street on Fifth street to the Adams service station on Highway 70.

A line will be run west from the Adams station four blocks in the area south of the highway.

On West 4th street, a new line will be run 1,000 feet and thence 700 feet off Fourth to Boyce avenue.

On East First street, a 1,000 foot line will be run and a dead end will be taken out.

In the Potts addition, 1,400 feet of new line will be run from East Fourth street to East Sixth street. Also from East Fourth a new line will be run east on the south side of the City Auditorium 1,000 feet.

In northeast Lockney, in the T. M. Moore addition, 1,500 feet of new line will be run on East 4th street and in the Brewster addition 1,000 feet of new line will be run on East 3rd street and a dead end taken out.

North of the Denver Depot, a line will be run from Main Street west on Hartman Street, 1,200 feet, and in the Ramsey addition, 700 feet of new line will be run north from Locust street.

Also a short line, 300 feet, will be run south from Locust.

In south Lockney, a 1,000 foot line will be run south from the business highway loop on Commerce Street, and on West 5th street south of the tracks a short line will be run east past the Phillips Service Station.

In addition to the new lines, a number of new fire plugs will be added to give additional fire protection and valves will be put on the lines so that if trouble develops only a small part of the line will be affected, Mr. Brunner said.

Rev. and Mrs. Spence left last fall for Japan to take up their work as missionaries there. They expect to work in Tokyo for two years while learning the language and then go into other parts of the country. In addition to missionary duties Rev. Spence is engaged in teaching English to Japanese boys and girls.

## Clean-Up Campaign Doing Good Job

The clean-up campaign in Lockney is going fine and has achieved magnificent results, Mayor G. M. Brunner said Thursday. Practically everyone is cooperating in cleaning up their premises and the city's mowing machines have been out cutting weeds on lots where they could operate.

The city has been sprayed twice and the latter spraying on Wednesday of this week covered not only the city proper but also the outskirts of the city. The city sprayer has been doing some spraying of farm dwellings also in this area, and if a farmer wants his buildings and premises sprayed he should leave his name at the city office, Mr. Brunner said. The charges have not been worked out as yet but a set charge will be worked out soon.

The city trash truck has been very busy this week hauling away trash from the city alleys and side streets. The city will continue to be sprayed as often as necessary, Mr. Brunner said.

No new polio cases have been reported in this area and the polio scare started here when two cases were reported in one week, has died down although most people are not letting up on the clean-up campaign.

## Dual Completion Sought On Flovd Discovery Well

General American Oil Company has filed an amended application with Texas Railroad Commission, requesting permission to dually complete its No. 2-B-W Carmickle, now producing in the Pennsylvanian, with the Wolfcamp-Permian of the Arick field in Southwest Floyd County.

This project, 650 feet from south and west lines of section 18, block K, TTRR survey, was the discovery well of the Wolfcamp pay in the area and originally was completed as a producer from that formation.

Later, that zone was cased off, and operator deepened the well to the 5,900-foot pay in the Pennsylvanian, primary producing structure of the field. This was done to allow completion in the Wolfcamp of the same company's No. 3-B-W Carmickle, exploration 467 feet to the northwest—too near to meet the spacing requirements of the railroad commission.

The plan now is to produce the No. 2-B-W Carmickle from both pay sections, providing the request is granted and the commission also makes exception to its spacing rules.

## HARVEST IS 70% COMPLETE; YIELD IS 20-25 BUSHEL

According to a survey made Wednesday by County Agent Robert H. Gibson, the wheat harvest in Floyd County is 60 to 70% complete. The county wide average yield is from 20 to 25 bushels.

The survey also showed a total of 256 cars of grain shipped from Floyd County, and that most all elevators in the county were full.

The weather has co-operated with harvest crews for the most part the past week and except for a local shower here Wednesday at noon, no rain has fallen for the past ten days.

Mr. Gibson's survey showed the following county wide conditions:

Dougherty: shipped 2 cars, test 47-56, just started harvesting, making 6 to 20 bushels.

Baker: shipped 7 cars, test 58-60, 15% complete, making 6 to 20 bushels.

Barwise: Edwards elevator, shipped 31 cars, test 60, 75% complete, making 25 to 30 bushels; Les Stringer shipped 10 cars, test 60, 75% complete, making 25-30 bushels.

Floydada: Co-op elevator: shipped 10 cars, test 58-59, 60% complete, average yield 15 bushels; Kimbel elevator, shipped five cars, test 58-59, 60% complete, average yield 15 bushels; Farmers elevator, shipped 100 cars, test 58-59, 60-70% complete, yield 15-20 bushels.

South Plains: shipped 4 cars, test 60, 60% complete, yield 25-30 bushels, some piled on ground.

Sterley: shipped 7 cars, test 60, 60% complete, yield 25-30 bushels, some piled on ground.

Lockney: Baxter-Smith: shipped 6 cars, test 59, 80-85% complete, yield 20-25 bushels; Patterson Grain Co.: shipped 20 cars, test 56-60, 75-85% complete, average yield 20 bushels.

Aiken: shipped 28 cars, test 58-60, 80% complete, average yield 25 bushels.

Cereal: shipped 19 cars, test 59-60, 80% complete, average yield 20 bushels.

## Retail Sales Drop Only 1% From May 1948 To 1949

AUSTIN, Texas.—Texas retail sales slipped 3 per cent from April to an estimated \$413 million in May, a 1-per-cent decline from May 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

May sales by durable goods stores in Texas rose 7 per cent over May 1948 to lead nondurable goods sales which dipped 6 per cent during the same period.

Automotive stores with a 22-per-cent climb presented the only gain over May 1948 among durable goods. Stores and filling stations sales gained 3 per cent for the only May-to-May increase in nondurable goods stores.

Jewelry store sales, down 19 per cent in May from the previous year, showed the heaviest decline in either durable or nondurable goods store sales, hardware stores and lumber

and building materials dealers following with 15-per-cent decreases.

Chalking up a 1-per-cent increase over April, durable goods stores again exceeded nondurable goods store sales which dipped 6 per cent in May.

Advances registered over April were lumber and building materials, 16 per cent; jewelry, 14 per cent; furniture and household and appliance, both 11 per cent; and farm implement dealers and hardware stores, 9 per cent.

Showing the greatest gain over April, May sales by filling stations were up 13 per cent, drug stores and eating and drinking places trailing with gains of 2 and 1 per cent, respectively.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

## Urges Adoption Of "Even Year Sessions" And More Pay

AUSTIN—Texas needs an annual session of the Legislature for budget-making purposes, Representative John L. Crosthwait said here today in urging adoption of a proposed constitutional amendment.

Representative Crosthwait is author and sponsor of the amendment, providing for a legislative session each "even year" to make appropriations and take care of emergency matters. It will be voted on next September 24.

"The State will save millions when we start making annual budgets," declared Representative Crosthwait, who is an accountant by profession. "It is humanly impossible for the Legislature to foresee what conditions and needs will be 30 months in advance. Yet that is the task set before us in January—to prepare a bud-

get and make appropriations for the biennium beginning the following September."

He noted for examples that the 50th Legislature, in 1947, missed the rural aid needs by \$4,000,000; that the Highway Patrol ran \$250,000 short because of unpredictable increases in the cost of gasoline, oil and tires; that other state departments had to ask for emergency appropriations for similar reasons—and yet that state revenues over that period ran some \$50,000,000 more than had been estimated.

"We pass laws requiring counties, school districts, cities and other political subdivisions of the State to make annual budgets," Representative Crosthwait commented, "and then we try to play supermen and guess what the State will need two and half years hence."

Under the Crosthwait plan, the regular "odd-year" session would not be changed except as to the length. In the added "even-year" session, only appropriations, emergency subjects submitted by the Governor and the other matters brought up by four-fifths vote of the members could be consid-

ered.

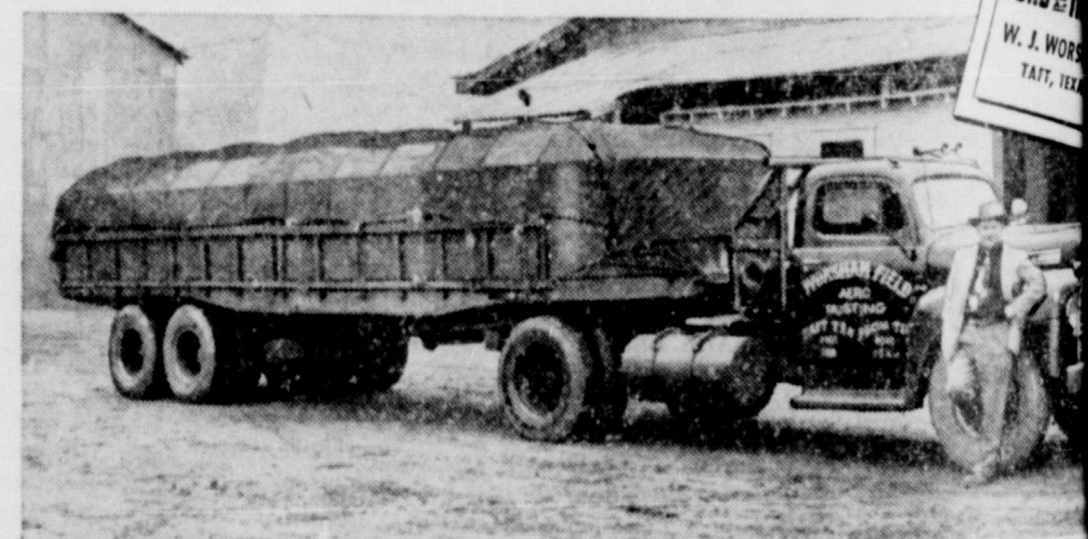

### Dr. Cox Urges Care In Handling And Keeping Milk

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—In view of the fact that June has been proclaimed National Dairy Month, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges that with the more extensive use of milk, both producer and consumer be concerned as to its quality. The use of clean safe milk is a health measure.

Local interest in improved methods of producing wholesome milk has increased greatly in the past two decades and the striking advance in milk control has been responsible for the enormous saving in infant life.

Milk is perishable and especially during hot weather. To insure milk of good quality requires cleanliness, sterile utensils, protection against flies, careful bottling and maintenance at low temperature. The presence in fresh milk of large numbers of bacteria, due to insanitary methods of production is a health hazard.

Dr. Cox added, "Among the diseases which may be transmitted through milk are tuberculosis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, septic sore throat, undulant fever, diarrhea and enteritis. Numerous milk-borne outbreaks of disease occur every year in this country from the use of milk that might have been safe with proper care."

"We should firmly insist that the milk we drink be carefully produced, so that we will have the maximum practicable protection along the line from the cow to the consumer."

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power, by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one back.

of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

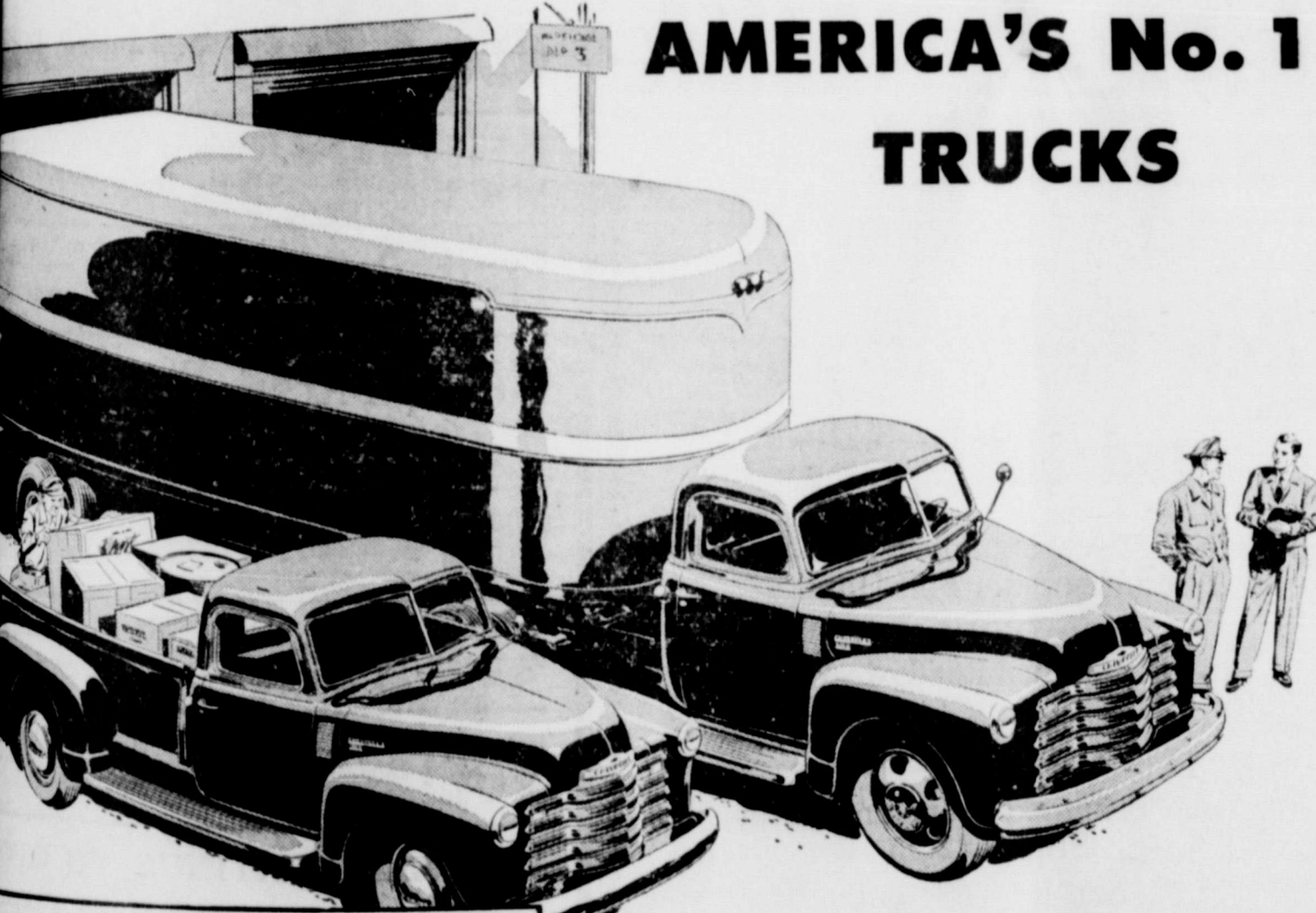

### "WE ARE LIVING BETTER"

"Despite the protests over high living costs, we are living better in 1949," says a feature article in Look.

The magazine uses food for a comparison. In 1929, prices were much lower than they are now. Yet it took the average worker 19 hours and 12 minutes of labor to pay for a week's food bill for his family. Today, in spite of high prices, he needs to work only 13 hours and 40 minutes to earn the week's food supply.

Look lists other items in common use which can be bought more cheaply now in terms of labor—coal, gasoline, silk stockings, and so on. The point is that, in 29 years, there has been a marked improvement in the living standards of the masses of Americans.

What has caused this? For one thing, manufacturing industries are more efficient than ever before. New techniques and better machinery have increased productivity. And that is also true of agricultural production in this mechanized era.

doesn't tell all the story. The average citizen can't buy his goods at a farm or factory—he buys them in a store. So efficiency in distribution is vitally important in bringing our living standards up and holding them there.

PEOPLE WILL SAY WHAT SALARY SHOULD BE PAID LEGISLATORS

In September the people of Texas will be called upon to decide whether or not they will increase the pay of their legislators from \$10 per day for 120 days, and \$5 per day for each additional day; and whether this pay will be \$3600 per year.

There is no question about \$10 per day being wholly inadequate at this time. Some voters may argue that the boost is too much, considering the type of men who seek the office.

The greatest weakness in the amendment is that no limit is placed on the number of days that the legislature may be in session. If passed with no restrictions, the law makers may follow the pattern of Congress and stay in session most of the time. That would not be conducive to good government. It will be up to the voters to decide.

Another weakness in the amendment is that no safeguard is provided restricting the members from serving his corporation while members of the legislature.

In conversation with a certain member of the legislature recently we asked him how he was faring on the \$10 per day. His reply was typical: "Why should I worry. I am employed by \_\_\_\_\_ and get my pay \_\_\_\_\_ of the legislature."

We have noted that this member has been voting against appropriations aimed at measures aimed at anything which might affect his employees.

He is, however, and you might expect him to vote just that way.—The Canyon News.

### WE THE PEOPLE

The beginning of the oldest written constitution of any government in force today is just these little words—"We the people" Gladstone once said that the constitution of the United States is the greatest document ever struck off by a group of men at a given time.

Who were these men? Were they a group of politicians resorting to propaganda by using "We the people" to gain an end? No. They were men

who undoubtedly practiced the law of God that was given to man many centuries ago on a stone tablet. Men who believed in the golden rule as taught by Christ. Men, who could honestly write "we the people." There was Benjamin Franklin, proprietor of a print shop; the surveyor from Virginia, George Washington; the banker, Alexander Hamilton; and all the rest, farmers, lawyers, scholars, etc. They made laws for free men, and they called it a constitution. ### PRIEST CONDUCTS LOBBY

On May 13 the Rev. Dr. Joseph Thornton, Catholic priest, strode into the speaker's lobby of the House of Representatives in Washington. His mission was button-holing Congressmen to ask them to make speeches in favor of recognizing the regime of the bloody butcher of Spain, Francisco Franco.

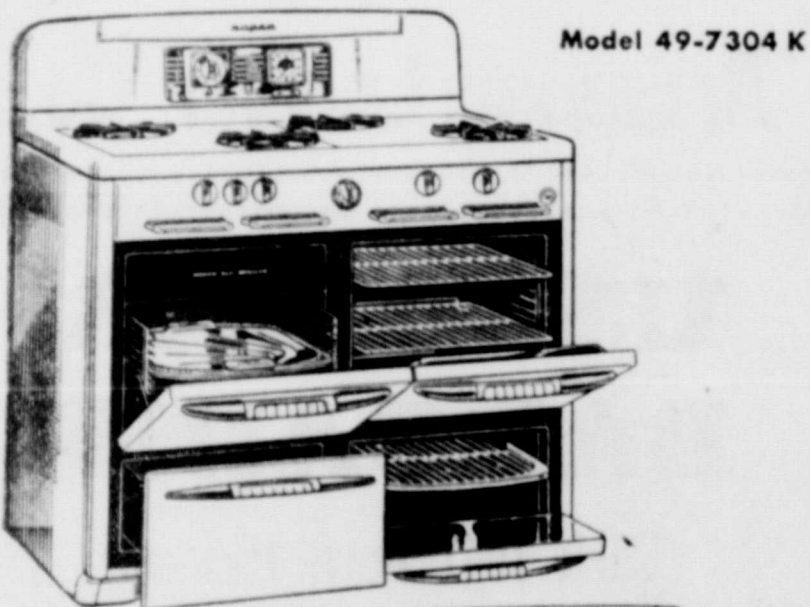

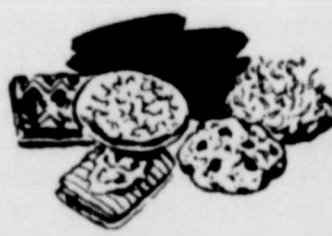

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51F of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51F of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendment thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36**

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published or reprinted by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

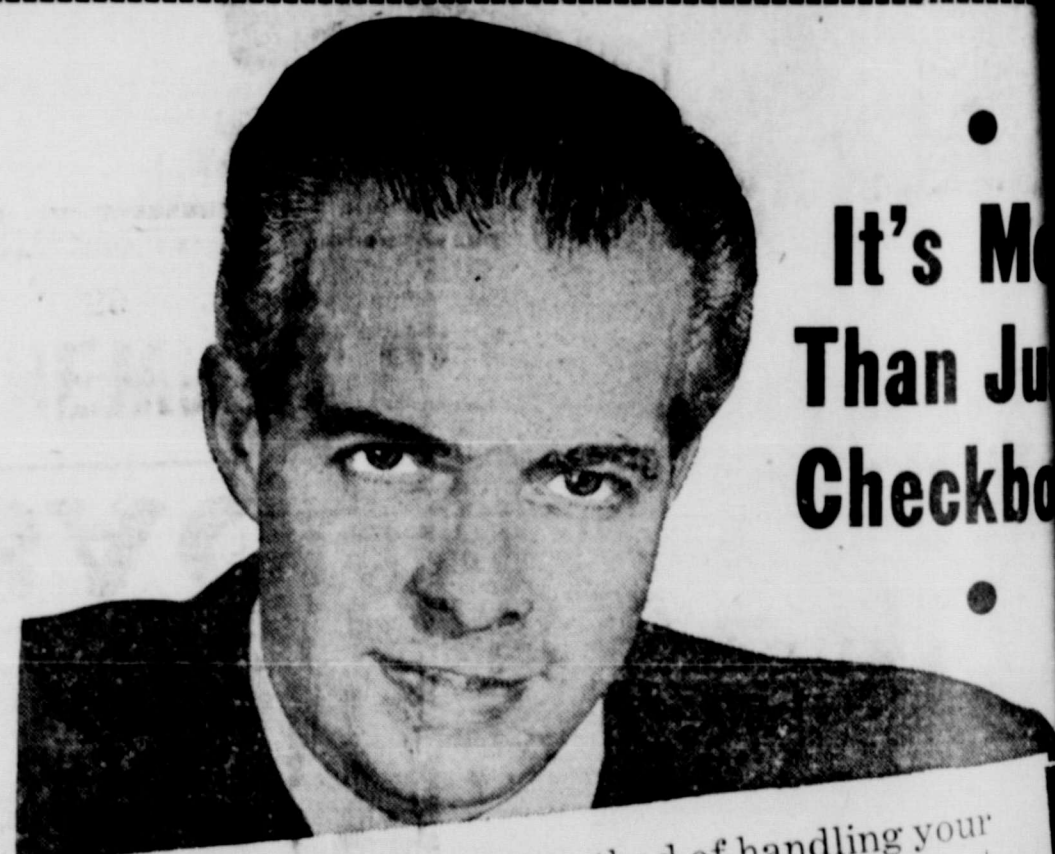
