He knows the line must be shared fairly to be useful to everyone-just as a street is shared by those on it.


He knows he appreciates courtesy from others on the line-such as not interrupting, and recognizing his emergency needs for the line now and then.



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

Section 1. That Article XVI of the constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be Known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:


The Legisla-"Section 62-c ture is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service this Section shall apply to ap pointive offices only, and limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply In temporary buildings in but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the proof such Civil Service visions apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people.

The foregoing Consti-Sec. 2 Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional mendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Ser vice in counties upon a vote of the people therein' ; and

'AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein.

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment



Time To Plant Pasture Grasses Lourvana and Ruth Ann Riv ers are spending this week with

Planting time for improved pasture mixtures or irrigated grasses is almost here. Fall planting is more desirable than spring planting according to the work unit conservationist of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District. The blow hazard and weed competition interfere less in the fall than spring

This past winter, some few farmers had the grass plants to heave out of the ground and die. Earlier planting with favorable moisture conditions should check this as well as reduce the chance of it blowing out

Usually, several grasses planted in a mixture. This prolongs the growing season and a green plant is available for a longer period of time. Smooth brome, perennial rye, orchard grass, alta fescue and meadow fescue are the grasses to plant. In the past, crested wheat grass was recommended but it does not respond to irrigation as well as the others mentioned. However, if plenty of water is not




