Wreck kills 18-year-old

A one-car rollover on US 385 north of Dimmitt last Wednesday night claimed the life of John Fick, 18, of Hereford.

Fick was pronounced dead on arrival at an Amarillo hospital about 2 a.m. Thursday.

IT WAS the second fatal accident on that stretch of US 385 in less than a week, and Fick was Castro County's second 1976 traffic fatality. Dr. C. E. Hicks of Hereford died as the result of a car-truck collision on US 385 about 15 miles north of Dimmitt Feb. 22.

Fick and his wife, Theresa, were passengers in an old model Ford sedan driven by Jeffrey Hall, when it left the highway 6.3 miles north of Dimmitt about 9 p.m. Wednesday, according to Elias Nava,

"BY GIVING the pupils a long weekend we hope to control the outbreak," Supt. Ted Averitt said.

Swifts tie state champs, lose contest in overtime

The Nazareth Swifts fell prey to the Neches Tigers in the state girls' basketball semifinals at Austin last Thursday, but only after an overtime struggle that gave the South Texas team a 50-46 victory.

An Elaine Schulte layup with 13 seconds remaining in regulation play brought about a 44-44 draw and forced the playoff.

Neches controlled the overtime tipoff and converted it into a score, then scored another field goal and two free throws to dominate the three-minute extra period. Nazareth's only tally came from a shot by Schulte when only seven seconds were left.

The Tigers went on to claim the Class B state championship by defeating the defending Texas champs, the Crawford Pirettes, 53-49.

While Neches hit 51 percent from the floor, they held the Swifts to 50 percent mainly through the efforts of 6-3 guard Vanessa Anderson.

Nazareth got off to a slow start the first quarter as almost four minutes elapsed without a Swift score. But the Swifts settled down and gained a 16-10 lead with Schulte scoring eight points in the final two minutes of the

The second quarter was disastrous for Nazareth. The Tigers held the Swifts to only one field goal and a closely by Rosie Schulte's six.

Three offensive fouls within a minute at the beginning of the quarter benched Cheryl Hartman for the remainder of the first half, causing a gap in the Swift offense. The Nazareth girls went to the dressing room trailing 26-22.

In the third period the teams traded two-for-two, but then the Swifts cooled off and failed to score in the last five minutes. Neches racked up 10 while holding the Swifts to eight and took a 36-30 lead into the final

A determined Nazareth team took the floor in the final stanza and outscored the Tigers 14-8 with the aid of 12 points by Schulte, the tying basket coming with just 13 seconds left. With the score tied at 44-all, the Swifts stole Neches' in-bound pass, but a last-second shot from 12 feet by Rachelle Pohlmeier bounced off the rim and sent the game into overtime.

Neches had 16 turnovers which led to 17 of the Nazareth points, while the Swifts turned the ball over 16 times to give the Tigers 10 points.

Anderson pulled down 13 of the Tigers' 25 rebounds and senior Vicki Barrett scored 40 of their 50 points.

Schulte led the Nazareth scoring with 27 points and Hartman contributed 15. Vera Birkenfeld pulled down seven defensive rebounds, followed

Coach Cathy Wilson's Swifts will lose four seniors this year, two of them from the starting lineup. Beverly Heck, Carol Hochstein, E. Schulte and Birkenfeld are the seniors. Schulte has started at forward four years and Birkenfeld has been a starting guard three years.

The 1976 Swifts set a new record in girls' basketball for Nazareth High, coming within a rim-out of whipping the state champions. This was the first year for an NHS girls' team to go to the state tourney, and Coach Wilson and NHS fans feel the 1976 Swifts started a tradition that will carry the Blue and Gold into future state tournaments.






Genealogist will speak at Hereford



On Saturday Nazareth joins the nationwide Long Distance dialing network. This means that all local telephone customers will be able to dial their own station-to-station calls to towns and cities throughout the United States and Canada.

Here's How It Works

To make a One-Plus call, starting Saturday, you should dial the figure "1," plus the three-figure area code, plus the telephone number in the distant city. That's why we call it "One Plus."

However, it will not be necessary to dial the area code on calls to other cities in your home area, 806. In making a call to a city in the 806 area, you simply dial "1," then the telephone number.

Call Distant Operator for Number

When you don't know the number of the telephone in the distant city, dial "1," then the area code for the city, then 555-1212. If the area code is 806, just dial "1" and 555-1212." There's no charge for this service.

If the city you wish to call is not included in the list of cities and area codes in the directory, dial "Operator."

How to Report a Wrong Number

If you reach a wrong number, please dial the operator immediately and tell her so you won't be charged for the call.

In some communities, for certain types of service, an operator will enter the call briefly to obtain your telephone number. This procedure will in no way interfere with your ability to dial direct.






