There is a need right now for 4,000 cotton pullers in the Lockney area, local gin men said Thursday morning. Many fields are open and ready for harvest and no labor is available, it was said.

Although a few Mexican laborers and other transients are coming in the supply does not near fill the demand for workers. In spite of the shortage of labor however, the price for pulling was setting at \$1.75 in the field and \$2.00 delivered in most cases. Local farmers feel that they cannot pay more than that and make any profit on their

crops, it was explained. Local gins had ginned only around 550 bales up to Thursday due primarily to the scarcity of harvest labor. A report from Robert H. Gibson, county agent, showed that the entire county had ginned only 1392 bales up to 6 o'clock Monday. The drive will continue one week, October 20 through the 27 and plans are for community workers to contact every farmer in the county seeking memberships. About 50 workers will be in the drive.



Harvest Cotton With **Care, Specialists Say**

COLLEGE STATION. -- The Texas cotton harvest is now in full swing and the shortage of pickers may cause producers to follow practices that will lead to lower selling prices, says F. E. Lichte, extension cotton gin specialist of Texas A. & M. Colege.


Care in handling cotton at harvest time pays big dividends, Lichte says. Cotton picked green or wet and taken directly to a gin not equipped to handle such cotton may be reduced in value from \$5 to \$35 per bale. Rough preparation at the gin is costly to both farmer and the ginner for they both lose money, he says.

Wet, dirty cotton usually means a poor quality product that brings less money, says Lichte and growers should pick carefully, take their cotton to the gin dry, and then see that it is ginned properly.

Lichte says the cotton producer should not expect the ginner to turn out a quality product at the gin unless aquality product is provided by the farmer. The farmer and ginner both have a stake in the careful preparation of the cotton. It helps the ginner's business and the farmer's income. Two mighty important items, says Lichte.




