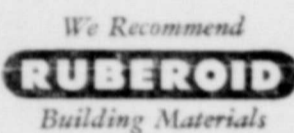

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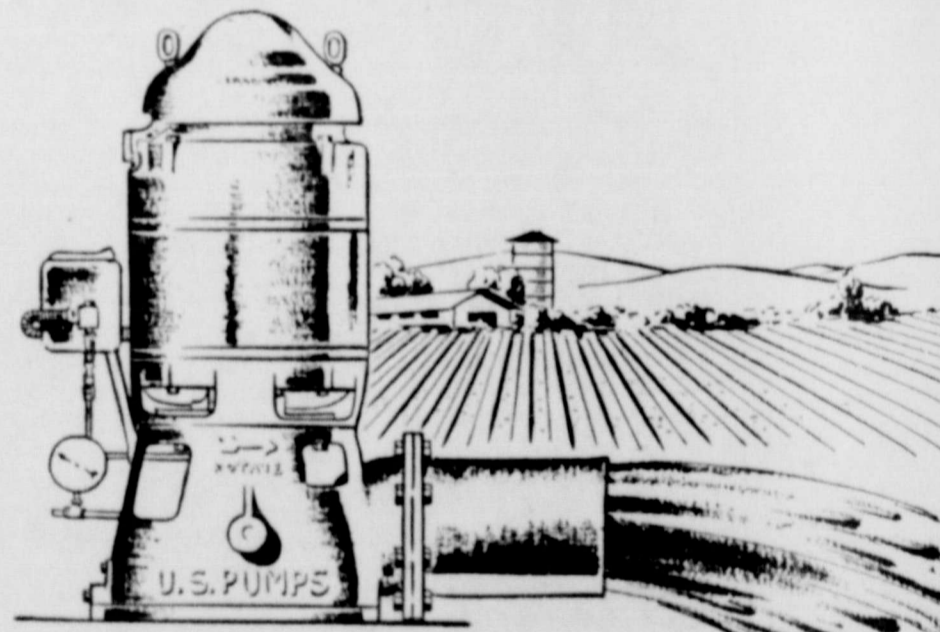

reports that the pop sorghum has been developed by the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station and might catch on with the public. Observers say the texture of pop sorghum is better than pop corn's. Furthermore, it has a good "Expansion coefficient." Simply told, it expands the kernel as well as pop corn. South Plains farmers could grow the cross-bred sorghum without using irrigated lands. Pop corn is ordinarily grown in areas with consistent rainfall or irrigation facilities. Some farmers in West Texas are planning to grow small amounts of pop corn for local consumption because of the "boom," it was pointed out.

Committee Works On Cotton Quotas

Committeemen and personnel of the Floyd County PMA are engaged in listing data for making 1950 cotton acreage allotments according to Ray S. McIntire, Administrative Officer Floyd County PMA.

Public Law No. 272 passed by the Eighty-First Congress and signed into law August 29 provides that cotton acreage allotments and cotton marketing quotas are inseparable; that is, cotton growers will have both or neither, depending on the result of the referendum December 15. If farmers reject the marketing quota law which supports the price of cotton at 90 percent of parity for those planting within their allotted acreages, the price will be supported at only 50 percent of parity. Furthermore, if quotas are in effect a penalty of one-half of the support price will be incurred in case a producer exceeds his allotted acreage.

Early in 1949 the Congress passed a law which provides that cotton planted in 1949 shall not now or hereafter be considered in establishing cotton acreage allotments or marketing quotas. This means of course that the 1949 year is removed from all cotton records as far as cotton allotments and quotas are concerned.

It is expected that allotments will be released about December 1. The important provisions of the law are: "The county acreage allotment, less a small reserve, shall be apportioned to farms on which cotton has been planted or regarded as planted under public law No. 12, in any of the three years, 1946, 1947, and 1948." A limited percentage shall be reserved from the county allotments for small farms (5 acres or less) and for "new growers" (farms with no cotton planted or regarded as planted in 1946, 1947, or 1948).

"The remainder shall be allotted so that the allotments to the farm shall be prescribed percentage (county factor) of the tilled land excluding the wheat allotment. Provided further, that the acreage allotted cannot exceed the highest acreage planted in any of the three years."

Simply stated, this means a farm will be allotted the county factor times tilled acres (crop land minus wheat allotment) or the largest acreage planted in any of the three years, whichever is the smaller.

The distribution of cotton to the farms in the county is in most part by a mathematical formula written into the law. This is in accordance with the cotton grower's wishes. There is, however, a limited reserve to be held out and distributed by county and community committees. This, too, must be on an equitable basis.

Santa Fe Puts On "Cotton Special"

Amarillo, Nov. 23.—The Santa Fe will inaugurate today a "Cotton Special," daily Diesel-powered expedited freight train from Lubbock to the Gulf Coast.

H. C. Vincent, Traffic Manager at Amarillo, revealed that plans have been worked out with the cotton interests in the vast Plains area to operate a daily cotton special leaving Lubbock at midnight for Houston and Galveston ports. Compresses and warehouses are stepping up their operations to feed into the special train service, thereby speeding the Plains crop to market.

The train will run during the cotton shipping season as long as the traffic justifies. It is designed to alleviate the congestion at compresses and interior storage points that is anticipated as a result of this year's record crop, Vincent pointed out.

Mr. Vincent said the Santa Fe had accumulated a good supply of cotton shipping cars in readiness for the expected move-

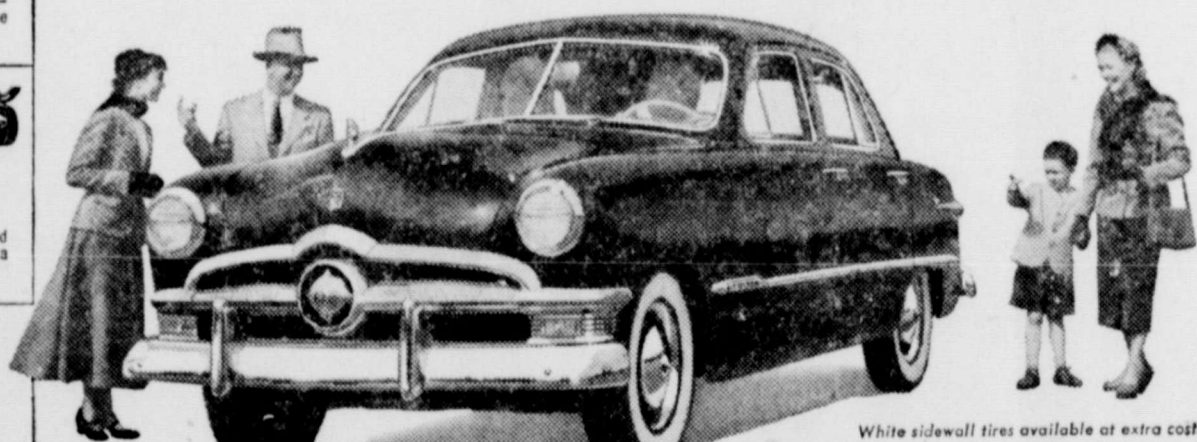

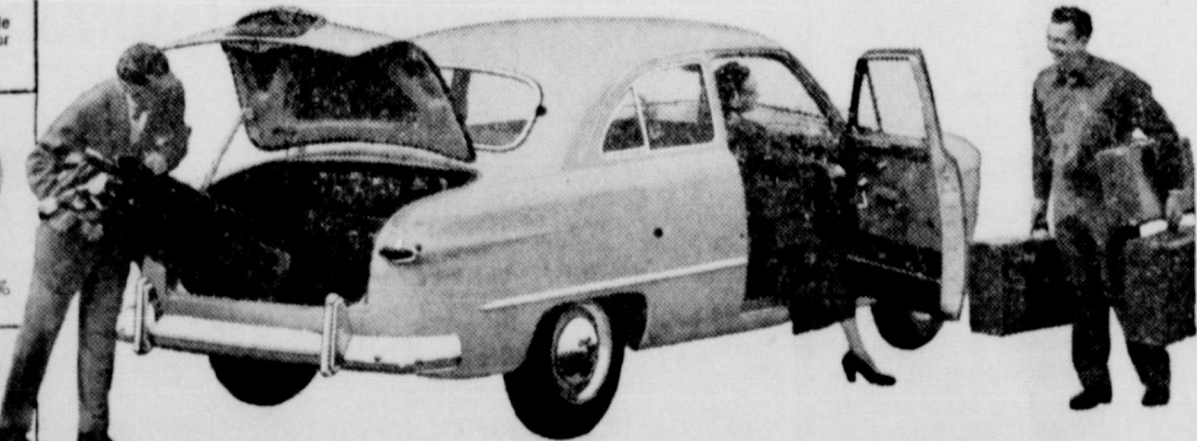

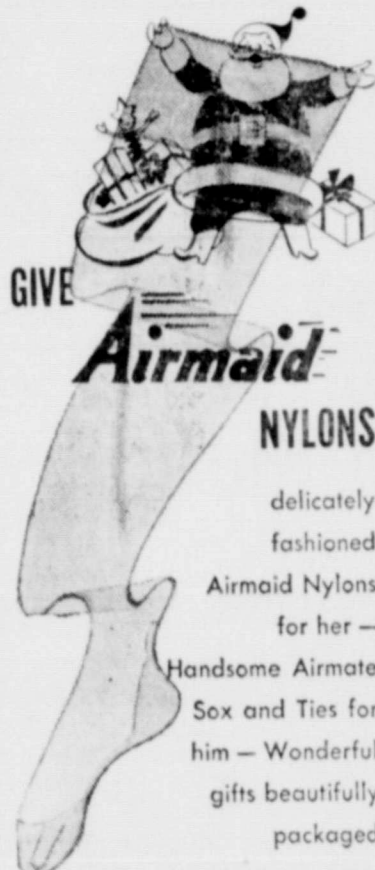

"I like teaching the natives of Africa, and I feel that's where God wants me to be," says Miss May Perry, small, soft-spoken Southern Baptist missionary to Africa for 28 years, now in this country on her sixth furlough. She teaches in a school for girls and is now at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, brushing up on her teaching technique.

A native of Georgia, Miss Perry's African community is a tiny settlement of mud houses and thatched roofs called Abeokuta, 65 miles from civilization, in Nigeria. About the size of Texas and Oklahoma, Nigeria has a population of about 22,000,000 Negroes and 5,000 whites.

Miss Perry looks forward to winter. "Even winter in Georgia will feel cold—and wonderful," she says. "Everybody should have winter at least every few years. It's nice. It re-invigorates you. It gives you a new hold on things."

Tech Geologist Won't Accept British Post

LUBBOCK—A Texas Tech geologist has been queried by Marshall plan officials about a position with the British government in Africa, North Borneo, or the British West Indies.

But Ralph H. Bond, associate professor of geology at Tech, says he isn't interested. He is one of a small group of geologists contacted by a Department of Interior official who seeks 24 mineral experts for the "loan" to Britain. The project is expected to last until 1952 and is aimed at the development of backward areas in Nigeria, Kenya, Gold Coast, Jamaica and other British possessions.

"I've got a large family to think about—and more important—I like Texas and Lubbock and would like to get settled," Bond said.

He joined the Tech faculty this fall after holding summer teaching posts here in 1948 and 1949.
