The superphosphate can be put in the spreader at the rate of 20 25 pounds per load.







Glass Walls For A. New Mode Of Living



NEW CANAAN, CONN.—Here's a house designed to bring the outdoors indoors. It sits on the edge of a grassy plateau overlooking the gently rolling hills of Connecticut and was designed by Philip C. Johnson, Director, Dept. of Architecture, Museum of Modern Art. The four walls are polished Pittsburgh plate glass supported by thin steel beams, the floor is polished brick, it has an accoustical ceiling and is warmed by radiant heating. As you're used to thinking of it, this house is not a complete dwelling, just a single unit of an entire living space. Other units are a large lawn or "floor", a contrasting brick guest house and a display of sculpture outside. The entire tree-bordered grass-covered piece of ground binds them together. Also, it's not a house in the conventional manner, but rather a single large room. Except for the bathroom it has no inner partitions. The bathroom and fireplace are back-to-back in a large floor-matching brick cylinder. Furniture is positioned to create the illusion of different parts of the house. For privacy, and to keep the sun's rays out, pandanus drape-like letch. house. 

built in 1942 and made more feet in diameter, and about 10 feet thick. They have no protruding surfaces of any kind. They are powered by jet engines using a secret fuel. The power is exerted through a series of jet nozzles around the saucer's rim.

Their performances, according to the magazine, is next to unbelievable. They can stand still in the air, like a helicopter, and rise almost vertically. Their cruising speed may be as high as 600 miles an hour. Due to the helicopter feature, they do not need conventional airfields for landing or take-off—a very small space is adequate. Control is achieved by tilting the jet nozzles to desired angles, and by turning certain nozzles off and on. Maximum forward speed is attained by turning the nozzles to the rear and applying full
