

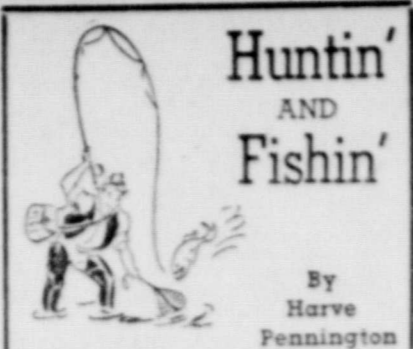


TO TENNESSEE

Huntin' AND Fishin'

Fly rods are the oldest form of casting rods. The ancient Greeks fished with a long rod and "false flies" as they were called. Fly casting is one of the finer arts of outdoor life. It can be learned by any one willing to follow a few simple principles. Fly casting does, however, require considerable practice to be able to lay a fly upon the water with the skill necessary to take fish.

To cast a fly successfully requires some knowledge of insect life and the kinds of insects fish feed upon. Casting skill must develop to a point where you can handle and place the fly in a natural and life-like manner. The power to put the fly out is developed through wrist action and fly rod action.

There is greater variety in fly rods than in casting rods. Fly rods vary from the so called fairy rods of 4 to 6 feet, 2 1/2 ounces to large rods of 10 feet, 6 1/2 ounces or more. For average fly fishing, the rod will perhaps vary from 8 feet, 4 ounces to 9 1/2 feet, 6 ounces. For bass fishing where spinners, bucktails and popping bugs are used, rods of 9 feet, 5 1/2 ounces to 9 1/2 feet, 6 ounces are used. For trout fishing rods of 7 1/2 feet, 3 ounces to 8 1/2 feet, 4 ounces are used. In the case of steelhead fishing, the rod may be as heavy as the bass rod. The small trout rod is used for broom, goggle eye and blue gill fishing.

Rods are of two general types, wet fly rods and dry fly rods. The wet fly rod is not so stiff and is slower in action than the dry fly rod, which has a stiff middle section with a lively, fast responding tip. The wet fly rod may, and often does, weigh more than the dry fly rod. Fly rods of more than 8 feet are made in three sections. Shorter rods are usually made in two section.

In bait casting, the lure is cast. In fly casting, the line is cast. For this reason, fly lines are heavier and of greater diameter than bait casting lines. There are

two general types, enamel and oil treated. The first is a stiffer, and harder line. The latter is soft and pliable, easier to handle as it is less likely to kink and corkscrew. Lines are level, tapered or torpedo. Level lines, as the name suggests, are the same diameter all the way. The tapered line is tapered at both ends from a large size to a smaller size. This gives the caster a heavy line to make his cast with, yet that part of the line nearest the fish is small so that its visibility is less and alights with less disturbance. The torpedo line is what is known as a spliced line. Several different sizes are spliced-together to make one line. This line is used for heavier lures and to make casting into the wind easier.

The State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission established a new turkey and deer hunting

season for the Panhandle which will run from November 17 to November 26 in all counties except Armstrong, Randall and Briscoe. A limit of two gobblers and one buck deer will be permitted.

The quail season will have the same hunting days—Dec. 1 to Jan. 16 as the rest of the state.

But, hunters in this area will not be allowed to kill as many birds. While the general state law allows 12 birds per day and 36 per week in possession, those in the Panhandle can only legally kill 10 birds per day and have 20 in possession.

Other changes for the Panhandle fishing are limiting the crappie and channel cat bag limit to 15 per day or 30 in possession. Formerly, the limit on crappie and channel cat was 25 per day. The limit on black bass was set at 6 per day and 12 in possession, while it formerly was 15 bass of which not more than 10 could be of greater length than 11 inches. Trotline fishermen are restricted to one line, each limited to 20 hooks.

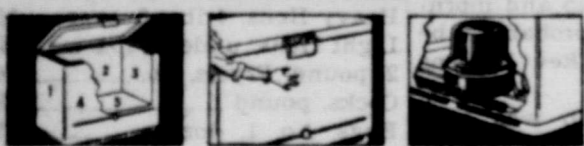

**Lubbock Council Public Films**

Lubbock. — Members of the Lubbock city commission have unanimously to ban the showing of feature-length and subject films in Lubbock during the summer. The city council took similar action there.

Public films were shown in Lubbock parks last summer five each week under joint sponsorship of a grocery chain and the city recreation department.

The recreation department applied for renewal of the contract without consulting the commission. But when the matter was called to commission attention, the contract was voided.

City officials acknowledged that the movies were a popular feature in the parks last summer. The attendance at the program was estimated at 50,000 to 60,000.

Members of the commission pointed out that operators of 21 motion picture theatres in Lubbock have invested several million dollars in their facilities. Their aggregate pay is large. They attract many tourists to Lubbock.

It isn't right for the city to compete with the theatre or any legitimate private enterprise, said a commission spokesman in forbidding the continuation of the programs.

The Amarillo governing body has a similar view of the subject. In each instance, showing of motion pictures will be allowed. But features, whether short or long, are out.

**Farm Income Now 45% From Livestock**

College Station. — Twenty-five years ago only about one-fifth or 20 percent of the agricultural income in Texas came from the sale of livestock. Today more than 45 percent of the state's agricultural income comes from that source, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

This situation, coupled with the fact that more than one-third of all the farms in Texas are operated by tenants, is creating a great need for a practical long-term lease or rental agreement. Both landlords and tenants, says Bates, are interested in working out long-term rental agreements that will prove mutually beneficial to both. Involved are such items as the division of the initial cost of the breeding animals, the division

of the income from livestock, how to divide the costs of improving pastures or sharing the supplementary pastures, soil building crops and the like. Then there is the question of providing the additional equipment in the form of fences, water facilities, barns and other equipment that is needed on most tenant-operated farms before the livestock enterprise can really be set up to the best advantage.

First, Bates says both parties must realize that through necessity the livestock rental contract must be for several years. The pastures and equipment can be improved slowly and this will in turn spread the expenditures over a long period and will not necessitate the borrowing of excessive amounts of money to get the business going. It is usually wise to grow into a new enterprise, if other things are equal, for the experience and information gained during this growing period often means the dif-

ference between success and failure, says Bates.

Secondly, Bates points out that the kind of agreement will depend to a great extent upon the individuals making the contract but the important item is to keep the agreement and agreements on a sound and practical basis. Both parties should profit from the rental contract not only financially but from more security and the greater satisfaction between the contracting parties that comes from the actual partner relationship that must exist if the arrangements are to be workable.

Bates says that several different types of rental agreements are now being tried in the field and that county agricultural agents are working with landlords and tenants trying to work out on the ground the best and most mutually beneficial contracts possible.

Bates believes that the forward looking tenant as well as

the landlord realizes that soil fertility must be improved, more soil and water conservation practices be used and better use must be made of the products raised on the farm. Greater production per man and per acre along with fair prices are the answer to a stable and prosperous Texas agriculture, he says.

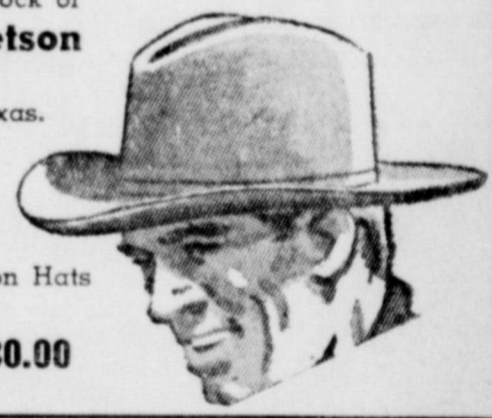

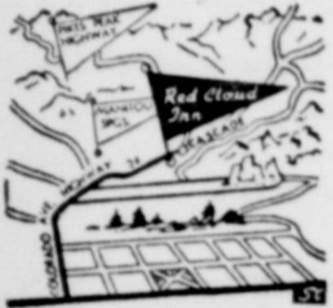

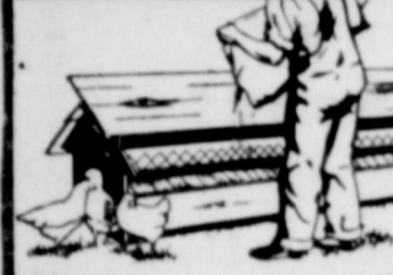

### Korea Service Men May Receive Benefits

American servicemen totally disabled during the current fighting in Korea may be eligible to have their National Service Life Insurance Premiums waived, if their total disability lasts six consecutive months or longer, according to an announcement made today by Robert W. Sisson, Manager of the VA Regional Office, Lubbock.

The waiver would go in effect, upon application, after the six-month period was over, and would remain in effect as long afterwards as total disability continued.

The waiver provision is not confined to those suffering total disability in action in Korea. Veterans who hold NSLI are eligible for waiver of premiums, if they become totally disabled before age 60 and while their policy is in force and remain so for at least six straight months.

"Total Disability," as defined in an NSLI Policy, is "any impairment of mind or body which continuously renders it impossible for the insured to follow any substantially gainful occupation."

Waivers of premium payment are not granted automatically; instead, application to VA must be made—if possible, immediately following the six consecutive months of total disability.

## Service Denies Charges Before Loyalty Hearing

**Silverton Votes \$65,000 School Bonds**  
Silverton.—The \$65,000.00 bond issue and maintenance tax proposals were approved by voters here Saturday. Trustees of Silverton Independent School District were authorized to issue \$65,000.00 in bonds and to levy a maintenance tax not to exceed \$1.25 on the \$100.00 valuation. The vote for issuance of bonds was 181 to 92. The maintenance tax vote carried 184 to 72.

Money obtained through the bond issue to be used to build four additional class rooms on the grade school, to repair the grade school building and to construct a modern school lunch room, as well as to give the entire school plant needed repairs. The building now used as a school lunch room is to be remodeled for use as a homemaking cottage.

**New GI Home Loan Regulations In Effect**  
New GI home loan regulations go into effect today for the more than 13,000,000 World War II veterans who have not yet used this GI bill benefit to buy or build a home.

Veterans Administration said that probably the most important aspect of the regulations to veterans is that providing for the use of the new 60 percent guarantee up to \$7,500. The new guarantee is available only to those veterans who have not used all or part of the old 50 percent guarantee up to \$4,000 for home loans. For veterans who have not used either the old or the new guarantee the regulations provide that they may take advantage of either, but that this is a matter for the veterans and the lenders to negotiate between them.

Veterans who elect to use \$4,000 or more of the new guarantee but not all of the \$7,500 maximum have no further entitlement to the remaining amount under the law. The new regulations also set up mandatory minimum construction requirements for new homes started on or after June 19, 1950, with GI loans. Similar requirements for new construction have been in effect for some time on a voluntary basis, but this is the first authority granted VA to make them mandatory.

The regulations designate eligible unmarried widows as veterans in their own right. This enables them to use the full amount of the new \$7,500 guarantee, even though their husbands had used all or part of the old \$4,000 guarantee before their deaths. Unmarried widows may qualify for the guarantee if their husbands died as the result of services in World War II. The husband must have served in the armed forces at some period between September 16, 1940 and July 25, 1947, and his death must have been a result of service while on duty or must have resulted from service connected

causes following discharge under conditions other than dishonorable. A further condition is that the widow must not have remarried following the veterans death.

The new regulations further provide that VA, under certain conditions, may restore the Loan Guaranty rights of veterans who already have used their entitlement to purchase property which they later lost through condemnation or by fire or other natural hazard, or for some other compelling cause "devoid of fault on the part of the veteran."

In addition VA is drafting regulations to administer the provision of the law which enables VA to make direct loans to eligible veterans in certain areas where 4 percent financing is not available from other sources. This provision became effective July 19, 1950.

VA said that on or about July 19, 1950, its field offices will announce the list of designated areas eligible for direct loans. Application forms for veterans use will be available in the field office at that time.

VA and Federal Housing Administration already have taken joint action under the law to limit fees and other charges which may be made against builders and veterans in connection with construction and sale of homes financed through GI and FHA loans. This joint action was announced June 28.

VA further has taken action under the law to terminate combination FHA—VA loans by October 20, 1950. This announcement was issued April 28, 1950.

All of these actions were taken or will be taken under the Housing Act of 1950 signed by the President April 20, 1950, which contained several provisions amending the GI loan law.

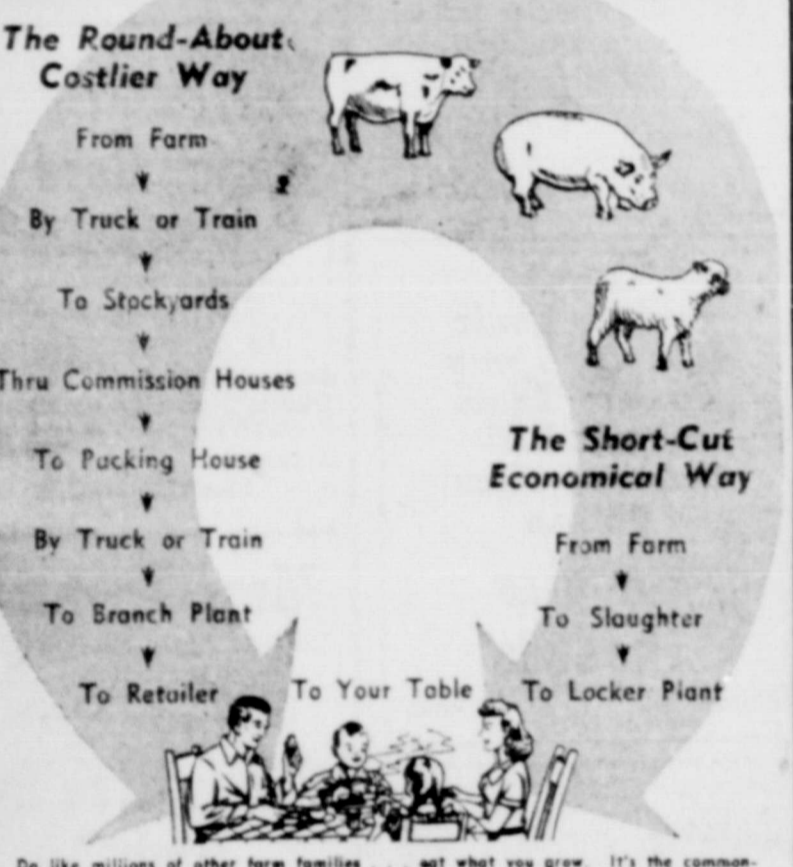

**Cotton Penalty Is 15.5c Pound**

The penalty rate for 1950-crop cotton produced on a farm in excess of the farm marketing quota will be 15.5 cents per pound, G. B. Johnston, chairman Floyd County PMA committee announced this week.


Mr. Johnston explains that under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, whenever farm marketing quotas are in effect for a crop of cotton, a producer for whose farm a "farm marketing excess" has been determined is subject to a penalty on the excess at a rate per pound equal to 50 percent of the parity price for cotton as of June 15 of the calendar year in which the crop is produced. The penalty rate announced is 50 percent of the parity price for cotton on June 15, 1950.

"Farm marketing excess" is defined as the normal production of that acreage planted to cotton on a farm which is in excess of the farm acreage allotment. He points out, however, that the law provides that the "farm marketing excess" shall not be larger than the amount by which the actual production of cotton on the farm exceeds the normal production of the farm acreage allotment. If the producer established such actual production to the satisfaction of the county PMA committee, the chairman warns cotton growers that until the penalty on the farm marketing excess is paid, all cotton produced on the farm marketed by the producer is subject to the penalty and a lien on the entire crop will be in effect in favor of the United States. The Act also provides that any producer having an interest in the cotton produced on a farm in 1950 where the acreage planted to cotton is knowingly in excess of the farm cotton acreage allotment will not be eligible for any payments under the Agricultural Conservation Program on such farm and on any other farm in which he has an interest.

Any person interested in cotton produced on a farm in 1950 on which the acreage planted to cotton is knowingly in excess of the farm cotton acreage allotment will not be eligible for price support on any cotton produced on the farm, he points out. Neither will such person be eligible for price support on cotton produced on any other farm in which he has an interest if the total of his shares of the acreage planted to cotton on all farms exceeds the total of his shares of the cotton acreage allotments on such farms. Where it is determined by the county committee that the acreage planted to cotton on a farm is in excess of the farm cotton acreage allotment, the producer will be notified immediately, and will be allowed a period of 15 days from the date the notice is mailed from the county PMA office in which to adjust his planted acreage to the allotment, says Mr. Johnston. If adverse weather conditions should prevent the adjustment to be made during this period, the producer may request an additional period, not to exceed 15 days, in which to adjust the acreage. The chairman points out that such request must be made in writing to the county PMA committee.
