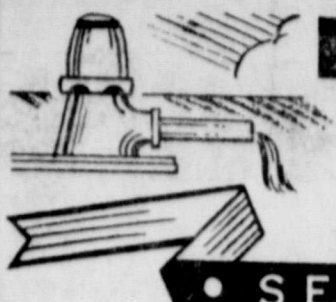

## Floyd Co. Gets \$27,938.35 From State Bond Fund

Floyd County's part of the surplus in the state road bond assumption fund totals \$33,455.61 this year, County Judge G. C. Tubbs has been informed. This is the most that the county has ever received from this fund. Mr. Tubbs said.

The state will credit the sinking fund of the eligible road bond issues with \$5,426.29 out of the fund, this being sufficient to pay the county's portion of this debt for the next year. The remainder of the money, amounting to \$27,938.35, will be sent to this county and will be used in the maintenance of county roads, Mr. Tubbs said.

## Funeral Services For C. E. Turner Held Here Tues.

Funeral services for Charles E. Turner were held at the Carter Funeral Chapel in Lockney Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Mr. Turner was fatally injured about 9:30 Monday morning at the Tucco crossing of Highway 87 a mile north of Abernathy when his car collided with another one at the crossing.

Rev. N. S. Daniel and Rev. E. J. Cobb officiated at the services. Interment was in the Lockney cemetery.

Mr. Turner had lived at Lockney years ago but recently had been a resident of Bowie. He was on his way to rent a house at Hale Center preparatory to moving there, it was reported. He was riding alone.

Occupant of the other car was James Moore, about 27, of Tucson, Ariz. He is in a critical condition in a Lubbock Hospital. He received head and chest injuries.

Turner was traveling east on the Tucco road, known as Highway 54, and Moore was traveling north. The two cars collided near the center of the intersection.

Mr. Turner and his family moved to this area in 1905 and he lived here until about 1932. He was engaged in farming and also operated a service car here. Later he moved to Hale Center, engaged in the grocery business at Plainview until 1946 and then moved to Bowie.

Survivors include one son, Roy Turner of Amarillo, two grandchildren, Leland Turner of Anton and Mrs. Ed Mahoney of Los Angeles.

## FW&DC to Re-file Application To Discontinue Train

Announcement has been made this week by Robert L. Hoyt, general passenger agent of the Fort Worth & Denver City Railway, that an application to the Railroad Commission of Texas for authority to discontinue passenger train service between Childress and Lubbock will be filed within the next day or two.

"The experimental overnight passenger service between the Lubbock-Plainview area and Dallas-Fort Worth, inaugurated last March, has produced deficits exceeding the former motor car operation," Hoyt said.

An application for authority to discontinue the motor car operation was filed in January, but the case was dismissed because of the decision to try an overnight service providing coach, pullman and dining car service.

It was pointed out by Hoyt that during the period March 5th to June 30th the direct out-of-pocket operating loss on the experimental service was more than \$14.00 per passenger handled.

The railway company is this week announcing that the pullman service on the branch line will be discontinued this week end.

## Floydada Soldier Is Reported Missing In Korean Fighting

Floydada.—William W. Anderson of Floydada was informed by the War department Wednesday that his son, Cpl. Omar L. Anderson, United States Army, was missing in action in the fighting in Korea.

Anderson was the first known casualty from the South Plains in the Korean action. His name was on a casualty list 32 which was made public by the Defense department Thursday.

No details of where or under what circumstances Cpl. Anderson was missing was made public. The casualty list which carried his name also reported three killed in action, one dead of wounds, 49 wounded and 79 missing in action.

## July Rains Here Total Six Inches

Rain falling here Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights totaled 3.05 inches to bring the total in July to approximately six inches in this immediate area. However, much more rain than this has fallen in near by farm areas with the total running as high as 10 inches in some reports here say.

The gauge at Hammond & Company showed 1.9 of rain Sunday night, 2 Monday night and .95 Tuesday night.

Farmers generally are anxious for clear skies and dry weather lest the weeds take the crops.

The entire area has been receiving some rain each night this week but the amounts have varied greatly. Sunday night a half inch was reported at Lone Star while Alvin Wilson, south of town receiving 2 1/2 inches. One inch was reported at both Aiken and Sterley.

East of town and the Floydada area received three and four inches of rain Sunday night and streets in Floydada were flooded, it was reported. Water was over the highway in several places but not enough to stop traffic. Water stood in yards and lapped at the doorsteps of a number of houses in the city limits of Floydada.

## Newell Leads Vote For Unopposed Candidates

W. D. Newell, county surveyor, lead the vote in the list of unopposed candidates in Floyd County. Mr. Newell received 2987 votes. The actual number of votes cast was unavailable here Wednesday.

Margaret Collier, county clerk was close behind Mr. Newell with 2986 votes. Other candidates had: Mary L. McPherson, district clerk, 2979; Mrs. Sam A. Spence, county treasurer, 2964; T. T. Hamilton, assessor-collector, 2984; Enos T. Jones, county attorney, 2971; Ben P. Ayres, county Democratic chairman, 2917; John B. Stapleton, district attorney, 2894; Alton B. Chapman, district judge, 2935; Hugh Counts, Commissioner, precinct No. 2, 1177; P. L. Hart, Commissioner, precinct No. 4, 403; E. H. Boulter, state board of education, 2933; William J. Murray, railroad commissioner, 2921; Price Daniel, attorney general, 2934.

All unopposed candidates were seeking reelection with the exception of Ben P. Ayres, who replaces Homer Steen of Floydada as county Democratic chairman.

## TWO RUN-OFF RACES IN COUNTY FOR SECOND PRIMARY ELECTION

There will be only two run-off races for the Democratic nomination in county offices according to final election returns from the first primary compiled Saturday night. Those races will be for the offices of county judge and commissioner, precinct No. 1.

In the county judge's race Frank L. Moore led the ticket with a total of 1168 votes and G. C. Tubbs, the present county judge ran second with 1088 votes. W. E. Grimes trailed with 673 votes. This race attracted more interest probably than any other county race due to several issues involved. A full page advertisement published in the Floyd County Hesperian last week, just preceding the election, attacked the Commissioners Court for their road plans on the Sandhill-Lockney road.

In the race for Commissioner, Precinct 1, five candidates were on the ticket with the run-off to be between C. O. Spence and J. K. Holmes. Spence led the balloting with 281 votes to 259 for Holmes. Other candidates votes were Leonard H. Smith 233, E. W. Turner 160 and W. H. (Bill) Brock 74.

Earl Cooper of Lockney, candidate for Sheriff, was edged out by the present sheriff, Leland Hart, although the vote was close. Hart polled 1506 votes to 1339 for Cooper. Bud Still of Lockney received 120 votes but Hart still had a majority of 47 votes and no run-off will be necessary in the race. Cooper carried Lockney and other boxes in northwest Floyd County by big majorities but it was not sufficient to overcome the heavy vote Hart received in Floydada. Cooper received 491 votes to 169 for Hart in the two Lockney boxes but Hart received 827 votes to 338 for Cooper in the Floydada boxes.

In Commissioner's Precinct No. 3 W. C. Plumlee, the present commissioner won easily over A. D. Monk. Monk carried only his home box of Goodnight. The vote was 229 to 158.

J. J. Harris defeated two opponents to win the nomination as Justice of the Peace, Precincts 2 and 3. Mr. Harris polled 574 votes to 343 for Frank Dodson and 202 for Bill Rigdon, giving Harris a majority of 29 votes over both opponents.

In the race for Justice of the Peace, Precincts 1 and 4, O. B. Olson almost doubled his opponent Walter A. Gound to win easily. Olson had 997 votes to an even 500 for Gound.

H. J. (Doc) Blanchard carried Floyd County by a nice majority in his race for representative, 120th District, but was defeated in the district by H. M. LaFont of Plainview. Incomplete returns from the district gave LaFont 7496 to 2821 for Blanchard. In the County Blanchard polled 1648 votes to 900 for LaFont.

George Mahon, congressman, 19th district, carried Floyd County by a big majority even as he did the entire district. Mahon received 2420 to 208 for A.

## "Red Menace" Coming To Mesa Theatre

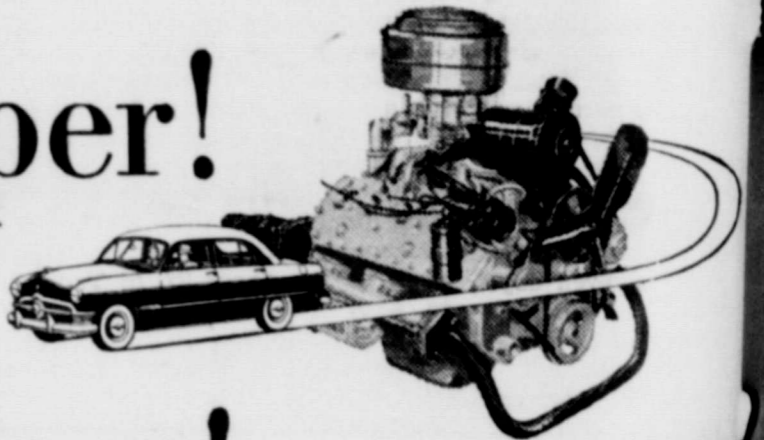

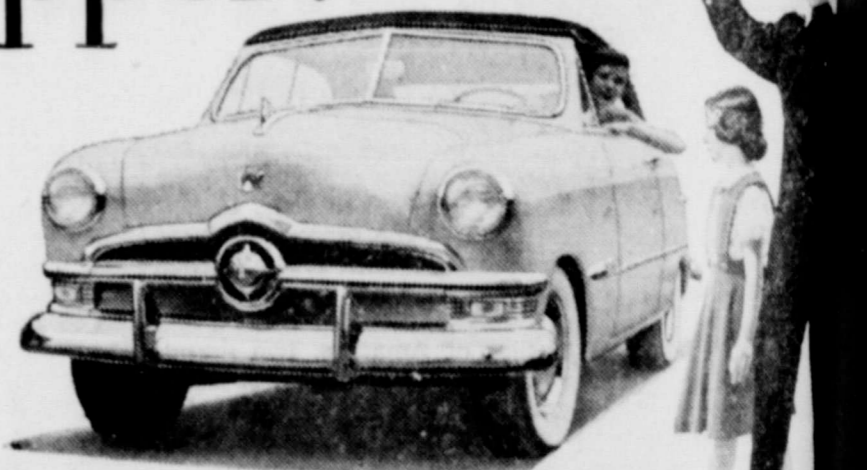

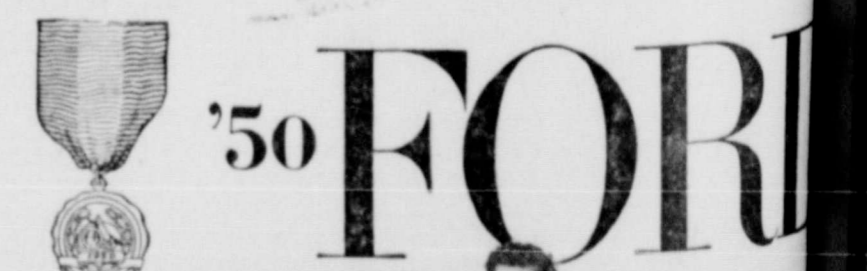

# MRS. ALLEN'S NIECE TELLS OF ESCAPE FROM KOREA

Editor's note: Following is a public description of the evacuation from Korea of a group of Americans among whom was Miss Betty Roach, niece of Mrs. J. Allen of Lockney and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Roach (Mineral Wells.)

As sure glad to get George's last night. I had not called her simply because I didn't see any news of what the State Department intends to do with her. However, it is fairly certain that we will be here in a couple of months at the most. Of course, the wives and children are being rushed to the States as fast as possible.

I moved several times before being in Tokyo on the 6th. We were evacuated from Korea by cargo planes to Itazuke Air Base, Fukuoka; from there we went by convoy truck to Camp Baha; next we were moved to Camp Baha, then left there on the 1st for Osaka; on July 2nd we were moved to Kyoto, Japan; left there on the 5th for Tokyo. I have certainly had a sightseeing tour of Japan, passed through Hiroshima where the atom bomb was dropped. Koto is the pleasure resort of Japan and the emperors hold their coronation ceremonies there. While there we

took sightseeing tours twice a day, which were arranged by the Army for us. We went through a pottery factory, a damascene jewelry factory, a lace factory, a cloisonne factory, and saw numerous shrines, temples, buddhas, etc. One day we went to Nara, which is the most historical and oldest city in Japan, being the first capitol. Tokyo is just as metropolitan as New York City. Our billet is a large hotel 7 stories high and we have every modern convenience. The P. X. here is a 7 story building also, and carries everything from new cars to silverware. However, they are certainly short on clothing at the moment.

I sure want George to write me immediately whether my winter clothing arrived—if not, I will really be destitute, as I left my receipts in Korea and the postmaster lost all his records there also. If the clothes did arrive, just hold them until I let you know what to do with them. Most of the girls left both winter and summer clothing there, so we are all in pretty bad shape. Of course the government will eventually reimburse us partially for our losses, but with 2000 or more evacuees, that will take a long time to do. Mama, you might ask Ellis White whether I could get photostatic copies of all the checks I have written on the bank—a lot of them show what the purchase was for, such as fur coat, etc., and I think would be of help in filing my claim. I left my cancelled checks in Korea too. If so, I would want 4 copies of each check, as we have to file the claim in triplicate, and I would want one copy for myself.

I wonder how the U. S. Papers are playing the situation up about Korea. Of course, all of us over here feel that if we don't call Russia's bluff now once and for all that the whole East is lost to communism. Japan is

alerted, so we might possibly wind up being evacuated from here. Things certainly look bad at the moment for the U. S. forces in Korea, and they are definitely losing ground — but reinforcements are on the way from the States, so eventually we will be strong enough to push back the North Koreans. This was really ONE big surprise, as no one thought Russia was ready for war anytime soon and we were more or less caught napping. I can truthfully say that I wouldn't have missed this business for a million dollars, but I wouldn't want to go through it again for two million dollars.

Mama, by all means I don't want you to worry about me. I have actually gained 5 pounds in weight these two weeks in Japan. We have excellent quarters and food in Japan, the horrors and strain of the evacuation now seem more or less like a bad nightmare, and I am not crying about the things I lost in Korea. There is nothing that can be done about that, and I am just thankful that I got out alive and in one piece. Now that it is over, I can tell you that we were in constant danger while this was going on. Sunday, June 25th wasn't so bad; that night they

called us to the Embassy where we worked all night long destroying files; but Monday was when it started getting hot in a big way. About 6:30 that evening they started strafing the billets where we lived, as well as other places in the city, and I don't think I was ever as scared in my life. We were ordered down to the Embassy that night about 10 for purposes of air-raid precaution. We were strafed there also; on the long convoy truck ride to Kimpo Airfield (18 miles from town) there was continuous strafing, and also after we got to Japan we were alerted twice for possible parachute attacks, and had blackouts for two nights.

I don't know of anything you can send me at the moment. I will try to buy the things I need here. It's really something to have to start from scratch again, even to little items like safety pins, needles, toothbrush, and necessities like that, as well as clothing. I don't play to buy too much summer clothing, and if my winter clothing did get home okay, then I will be well fixed for next fall. If it becomes necessary to cable or phone me again, you can reach me at the Old Kaijo Hotel, Tokyo, Japan; otherwise the address at the head of

this letter will be sufficient. Am sure anxious to hear from all of you, as I haven't had any news since leaving Korea. Did Mrs. Culpepper call you, Mama? Hope all of you are well, and I sure miss you. I just don't want you worrying, though, because I feel that I am safe for the time being. Love to all of you,  
Dorothy.

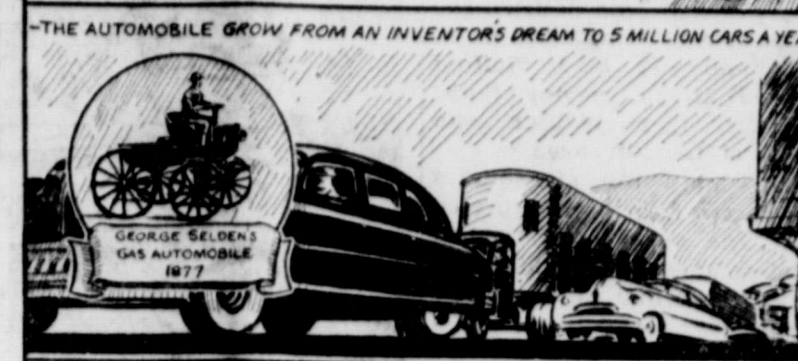

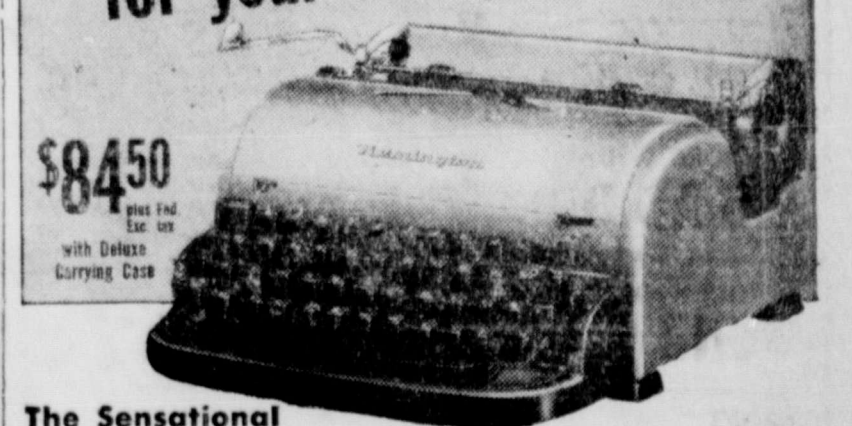

### BETTER NOW THAN LATER

If we have to fight Russia we had better do it now than later. This seems to be the opinion of the man on the street and the farm. They think that President Truman did the correct thing in drawing a definite line beyond which Russian aggression will not be permitted to go.

As yet there is no open conflict with Russia; yet every thinking person knows that the calculated risk taken by the United Nations may lead to global war. The answer to that is up to Russia; but now the rulers of the Kremlin know that the United States and her potential allies will not forever continue to retreat and appease until it is too late to fight. That is what the Kremlin rulers, not the Russian people particularly, wanted. Now the men in the Kremlin know there is something else to consider and force is the only thing they respect.

For five years it has been increasingly clear that Russia had no intention of trying to get along with any other nation that was not subservient to their particular brand of totalitarianism. The only question has been how long would the United States retreat and try to appease a vicious movement that cannot be appeased without world slavery.

Perhaps it was this realization that caused the American people to receive the news of the fighting in Korea with a commendable steadfastness and lack of hysteria. Perhaps another reason was that they realize that the United States is in a much better position to cope with Russian aggression now than it would be five years from now.

Even though we are not as well prepared as many would like for us to be, it is evident that we are much better prepared than we were in 1941. Our industrial machinery is in good shape. Our stockpiles of essential war materials are so much larger that there is no comparison.

The thought of a Third World War is a grim one; but it is not a new one. If we are in it there is only one thing to do and that is to win it. But this time let us pray that we will so conduct ourselves as a people and a nation that we will also win peace. Peace can come only with the blessing of God. — Wellington Leader.

### Consumers Prefer Quality Ahead of Quantity—Survey

Lubbock—In these days of rising prices a survey made at Texas Technological College confirms what many have thought all along — give the consumer quality and not quantity.

The "consumer services" survey, made by Gene Conley, Quanah, and Bill W. Abell, Ralls, found that 37 per cent of the interviewed consumers thought quality all-important. Only 26 per cent said they looked for low prices first. Twenty-one per cent thought sales personnel courtesy most significant.

Check-cashing was easily the most desirable customer service, with an overwhelming 87 per cent of the consumers making it first on their list. Free alterations, rest rooms, gift wrapping and "cheerful refunds" followed in that order. Credit and free delivery were rated at the bottom of the list.

The survey also found that about half of the consumers believe credit, free delivery and free alterations are added to the price of goods in "hidden" charges. Only 24 per cent thought such services really were "free." Another 28 per cent thought it all depended upon the firm where the goods were purchased.

The Tech students found 61 per cent of the consumers did not base their buying habits on customer services, and 64 per cent were not influenced by the public relations programs of stores, such as college scholarships.

Twenty-five per cent of the customers had suggestions for improved retailing. They favored lounges and snack bars in larger stores. Gasoline-buying tourists thought free maps were necessary.

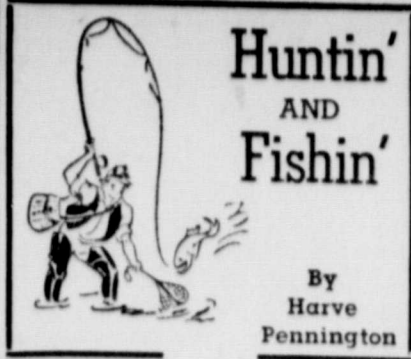

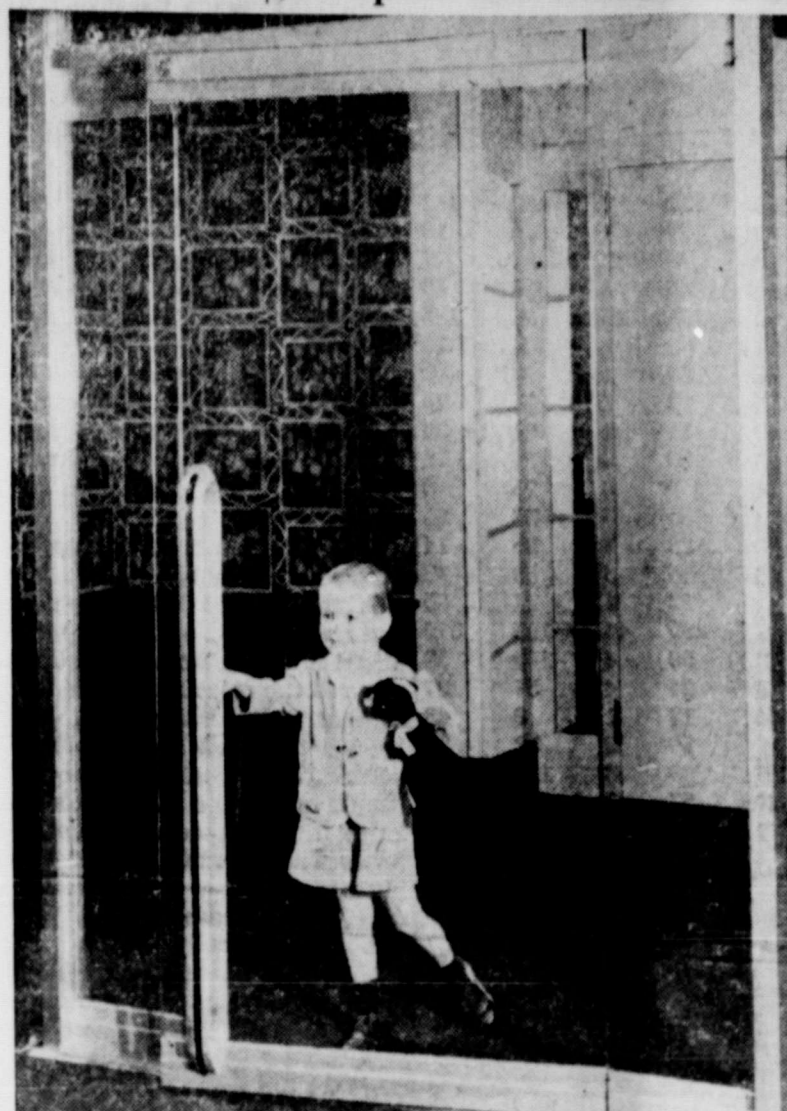


The backcast is everything in fly casting. Without a good backcast, there can be no good forward cast. Because the backcast is usually not seen, the fly fisherman may commit serious errors for years without knowing it. The line on the backcast must not be allowed to fall down behind the caster. It should be kept high in the air and the forward cast started before the line has entirely straightened out.

To make a cast, take hold of the rod lightly. Do not grip it. Raise the rod tip to about the 45 degree angle, while holding the line with the fingers of the left hand. This takes up the line slack as it lies out on the water, or grass, if you are practicing on the lawn. Now snap the rod upward toward the perpendicular. Stop the power on the upswing at about the 11 o'clock position and allow the rod of its own momentum to fall back of your shoulder to about the 10 o'clock position. The line should be almost straightened out before beginning the forward cast.

The forward cast should be started with a wrist movement and a push of the thumb along the top of the cork grip. The power thrust should be stopped at about the 11 o'clock position and the rod allowed to float down to the horizontal position. This allows the line to straighten out in front while it is in the air and to float down to the water without a disturbing splash.

**Touch of Finger Opens 250 Pound Door**



Little 25-pound "Corky" Castator can't quite believe his own eyes as he opens a door, weighing ten times as much as he does, with just the tip of one finger. It's made possible by a new "invisible doorman" developed by the Pittsburgh Plate Glass company. The hydraulic hinge unit, no larger than a shoe box, is completely self-contained and sets in the floor under the door. The first automatic door opener that may be used on storefront doors set flush with the sidewalk, it allows smooth, silent opening and closing of the door. Little "Corky's" finger tip touch is just as effective as Paul Bunyans mighty grip, even on a very windy day.

A good way to get the hang of the backcast and the right forward cast is to turn your head and watch the line as it travels backward. Try to pick the line off the water so that it will go high into the air back of you. Then watch the line as it goes forward. After watching the backcast and the forward cast in this manner for a while, you will learn just what power application will produce a good backcast and a good forward cast.

In fly casting, as in plug casting, you are not out to make distance records. It is accuracy and delicacy that you want. You lay the fly close to the pad, stump or log or other place where you believe there is a hiding fish. One of the greatest pleasures of fly casting is in performance. A well laid fly gives the angler much pleasure.

There are many more still fishermen than artificial bait users. They use minnows, worms, shrimp, grasshoppers and other natural bait, and they get fish. Still fishing is an art no less than fly or plug casting. The man who takes it seriously and tries to improve his art gets the most fish and the greatest pleasure.

The still fisherman should try for school fish, such as goggle eye, blue gill, bream, yellow perch, crappie, Calico bass and sun perch. Those are called pan fish and none are tastier. When taken on light tackle they put up a good fight. A maboo or steel rod or a fly casting outfit will increase the pleasure of still fishing. Such rods need not be expensive.

Hooks should be of various sizes, depending on the kind of fish the angler is after. A fly line size E or F makes a dandy still fishing line. It is large enough to get hold of with the

allows the minnow plenty of freedom to swim around, and the more action the minnow has the more likely he is to attract fish.

One of the worst faults of the still fisherman is that he strikes his fish too hard and too soon. Then he tries to "hoss" the fish onto the bank or into the boat. Let the fish have the bait a bit.

Don't try to yank the fish out of the water. There is greater sport in playing him. Lift him out of the water by taking hold of the line just above the leader.

When one kind of bait does not attract fish, try another. A bright spinner back of the hook is a good addition to the fishing rig. The flash of the metal attracts fish. When fishing, keep out of sight, keep quiet.

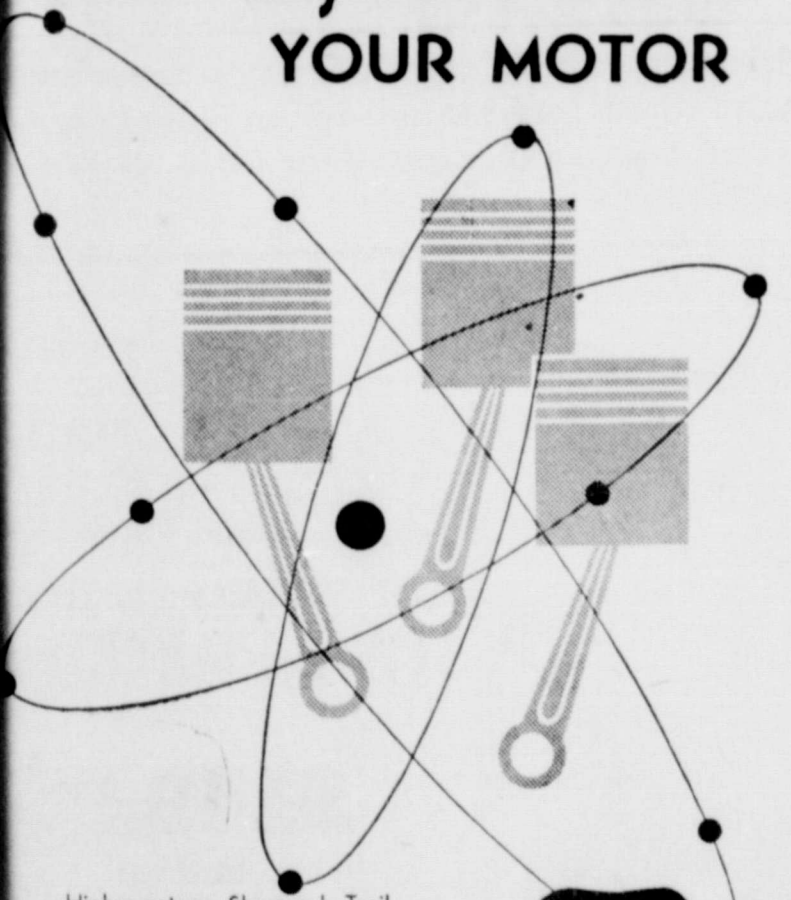

**School Children's Teeth Should Be Examined Now**

Austin, Texas. — "Now is an excellent time for school children of all ages to make a trip to their dentists' offices." — Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer reminds Texas parents. Since school progress is influenced by the pupil's health, which is in turn affected by mouth conditions, it is wise to visit the dentist during the summer vacation and obtain any needed treatment before school starts.

"It is dangerous to assume that there is no need for dental attention simply because a child does not complain of a tooth ache or the parent does not notice any cavities. Only careful examination by a dentist can justify such a conclusion.

"Children entering school for the first time are particularly in need of dental attention. Usually they are at the age when the first four permanent teeth, the sixth year molars, appear. Because these erupt before the shedding of any baby teeth, they are often mistaken for baby teeth. Since these are important teeth they should receive early and regular attention by the family dentist.

"Postponement of a visit to the dentist may result in pain and discomfort for the child later on. To avoid such suffering and to prevent the development of conditions that may require more extensive dental services at a later date, parents are strongly urged to take their children to the dentist for an examination now. Prompt action will allow time to complete any needed corrections before school opens."
