Cotton Insects Threaten Crops In Floyd County

NUMBER 50

County Agent Robert H. Gibson said Wednesday that the cotton insect situation in Floyd County was "just as bad as it can be." He stated that farmers must take immediate action to protect their crops from insects if they expect to harvest a crop next fall.

Gibson said that most of the cotton in Floyd County should be sprayed or dusted for leaf and boll worms now. Out of twenty fields inspected in the County every one of them needed to be sprayed or dusted immediately. There is enough leaf worms in most of the fields to completely strip the leaves from the cotton in the next two weeks and boll worms were present in all fields. Every cotton grower, without exception should make preparations for a sprayer or duster and secure enough poison to spray or dust his field at least twice. There is a shortage of poison and everyone should let your insecticide dealer know how much you will need so that he will know how much to order. "I cannot over emphasize the importance of doing this," Gibson said.

The recommended poisons in dust form are 3 percent BHC plus 5 percent DDT plus 40 percent sulphur. This poison is commonly called 3-5-40. Another good dust is 20 percent taxophene plus 40 percent sulphur. These two dusts are the newest and best and should be applied at the rate of 10-15 lbs. per acre. If neither of these can be obtained calcium arsenate dust applied at the rate of 10-15 lbs. per acre will give good results on

This is a partial report on the activities of your County Judge for the past eighteen months that I have been your County Judge. When I took over the office on January 1, 1949 one of the first things I did was check up on the amount of insurance on the different properties of the county. I found there was only \$70,000.00 insurance on the courthouse building. I recommended to the Commissioners Court that the insurance be increased to \$200,000.00, which the Court readily agreed to, and the policies then in force written with Frank Perkins and E. P. Nelson were endorsed to that amount. The Courthouse burned on March 11, 1949. As a result of the increase in the insurance the county recovered \$105,000.00 for the loss. We recovered approximately \$70,000.00 in insurance money more than we would have as it was originally

We have constructed 37 miles of paved farm-to-market roads. We now have under construction 101/2 miles of paved road. Plans are approved and now in the making, and contracts will be let soon for 24 more miles of farm-to-market roads. Other roads designated for improvement during the next two years amount to about 40 miles.

We have disposed of 111 misdemeanor cases, 11 civil cases, 4 mental illness cases, 63 probate cases, besides numerous probate orders, and juvenile matters, and innumerable minor matters constantly coming before the County Judge to be disposed of.

The Courthouse construction job requires considerable attention from the Commissioners Court and County Judge. The Commissioners Court has charge of all the business matters of the County, the County Judge presides over their deliberations and has no vote except in case of a tie. The County Judge hasn't had to untie a single vote during this eighteen months.

In view of the above record, I feel that I have earned a second term in this office, it being a custom of the Democratic Party to elect a man to a second term in any office unless he has been dishonest or incompetent in his first term and I have not been guilty of either. I solicit your vote on August 26, on my record which I am proud of.
