weather will tend to make the leaf and boll-worm infestation greater when the weather clears and becomes warmer, said County Agent Bob Gibson, While it is cold and wet the worms do not do so much damage but are ready to go when the sun shines therefore every one should check their cotton carefully and make preparations to spray or dust as soon as weather permits. he said.

After this wet spell the bollworms will increase and since they are harder to kill a full pint of toxaphene per acre should be used. If you are using 40% toxaphene put on one gallon every three acres, if 60% toxaphene is used put on one gallon every four and one-half acres, if 80% toxaphene is used put on one gallon every six and one-half acres.
