The year after year planting of cotton and grain will eventually wear out the land on the South Plains, until it will be as unproductive as the land in South Texas, where it has been turned over to Johnson grass and to grazing or to dairy farming. Many of the counties in Central and North Texas that used

to produce as much as a bale to the acre, year after year, have been turned into pasture because of continued planting of one crop and most of the land that is planted in cotton in North and Central Texas must be fertillized every year in order to get any kind of cotton crop, and most of the time the yield is very low
