Sorghum Stalks **Protect Soil**

The grain and forage sorghum harvest in Floyd County Soil Conservation District is getting nto full swing. Management of the sorghum residue is an important and essential conservation practice according to Ralph R. Cogdell, work unit conservationist of the District. Sorghums that are harvested for bundles are sometimes cut too close to the ground to be effective in preventing fields from blowing next spring. A few more inches of stubble left on the land would not affect the forage yield very much but would offer much more protection from wind erosion. Normally, a twelve inch or more stubble is recommended on rowed sorghum with a lesser a. mount for drilled sorghums. Sandy or chalky soils need more crop residue than the good wheat land type soil for ample protection


Sorghums that are combined for grain usually have ample stubble for protection from blowing. However, they can be grazed to the extent that it offers little or no protection. Some grazing


