## 7,243 Bales **Ginned In County**

A survey of Floyd County Gins Tuesday revealed that 7,243 bales of cotton have been ginned up to that time. Robert H. Gibson, County Agent said that this was considerably less cotton than had been ginned at that date in 1949. He said that the above normal rainfall and cool weather in July and September had caused the cotton to be much slower opening that usual. The hard freeze last week has materially reduced the yield in some fields of later cotton as much as 40%. Most all cotton opening after the freeze will be lower in grade or

Gibson has estimated that 35,-000 bales will be produced in 1950 compared to 71,563 in 1949. Gibson said that where ever possible the open cotton should be gathered by hand before the boles killed by the freeze are
