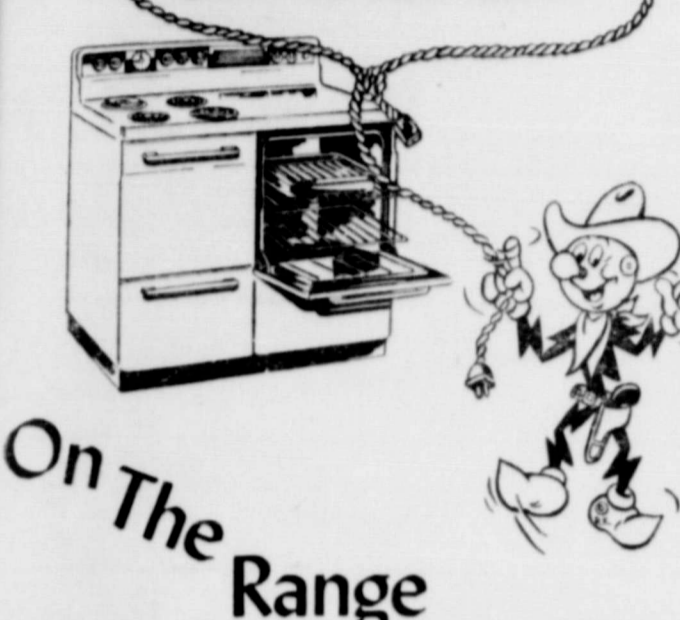

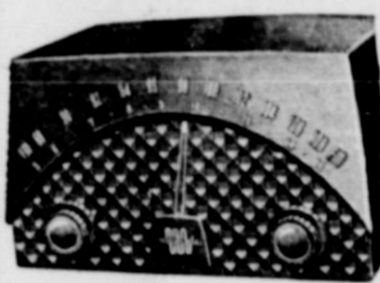

The flu situation this week is much improved. There are very few cases in town, and all the old ones are getting along nicely or having thoroughly recovered.

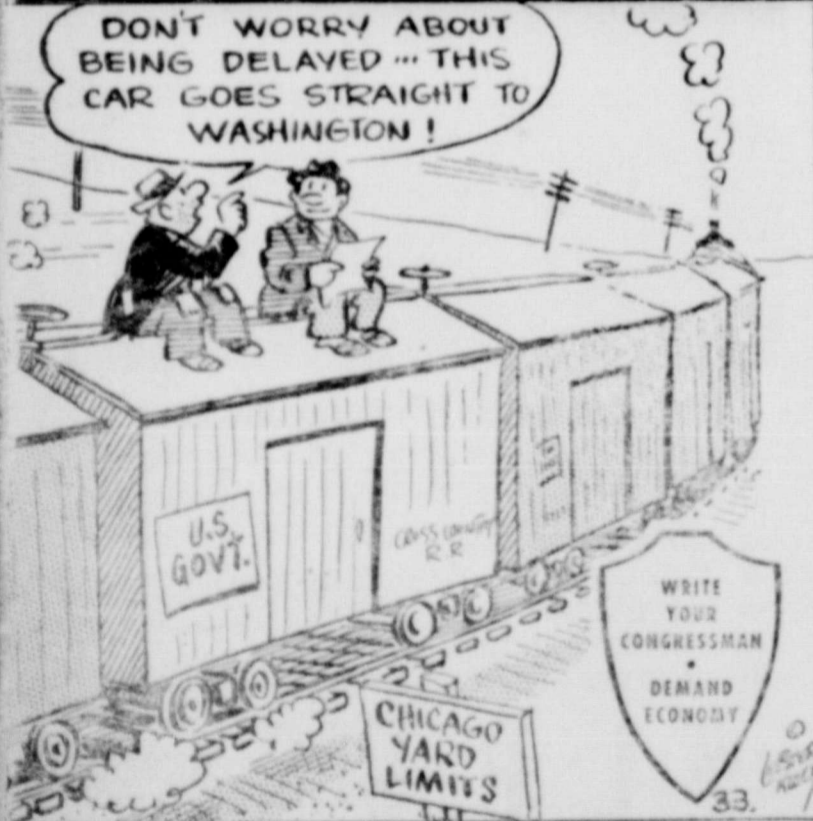
