

Electricity Now On 90 Percent Of **Farms-Ranches**

College Station.-Approximately 90 percent of all the farms and ranches in Texas now have central station electric service. The bringing of electricity to P. T. Montfort of the agricultural A. & M. College, a new tool which offers almost unlimited possibilities in revolutionizing farm liv ing and farm operations.

Montfort says electricity is a versatile source of energy. From the same set of wires and by flipping a switch, the farmer may have light, heat or power. Electricity is easy to transport. It can be carried over-head, under ground or between the walls of any point where it is needed. It is safe when transported through a properly designed and constructed system of wiring and when the correct equipment is used. On the other hand, he points out that it can be the cause of fires and serious accidents when wiring systems are not properly installed and when the user becomes careless.

He says the most extensive use is now made of electricity on farms where most of the production and processing activity takes place in or near the farm buildings. Listed in this category are dairy, poultry, truck and livestock farms. Montfort estimates the 7,200 Texas dairy farmers who used milking machines in 1949 saved approximately \$10,700,000 in labor costs alone and the electricity for doing this job cost them about \$155,000. Dairymen have also found, he says, that a high rate of milk

Using inexpensive electric water heaters during the winter time for warming the cow's drinking water, ventilating fans for cooling the milking barn in the summer time, and better insect control through the use of electric sprayers are a few of the uses that can be made of electricity to help keep "Bossy"

comfortable. Montfort says some 250 profitable ways for using electricity on the farm have been proved by research but generally farmers are using only a limited number of them. He suggests that farmers take advantage of every opportunity that they may have for increasing their knowledge on using electricity on the farm and in the home. He says the housewife, like the farmer, is still doing many back-break ing jobs that could probably be done better and a lot cheaper with electricity and that the time saved could be spent doing some of the things they like to do when the home chores are
