#### Callahan Groups Participate In 20th Annual Don't Mess with **Texas Trash-Off**

ABILENE, Texas -Drivers saw something different along Texas roadways April 1, when approximately 200,000 volunteers around the state participated in the annual Don't Mess with Texas Trash-Off - one of the nation's largest one-day litter clean-up events.

So far, two Callahan County Adopt-a-Highway groups have signed up to take part in this annual event. They are the Baird Chamber of Commerce and 4-His Kids, Inc.

Trash-Off will launch a spring and summer filled with special events and contests commemorating the 20th anniversary of Don't Mess with Texas. The Don't Mess with Texas Trash-Off is a partnership between the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Keep Texas Beautiful (KIB). The public is invited to participate by contacting your local TxDOT district office at 325/676-6806 or the Callahan County maintenance section at 325/854-1353 to adopt a stretch of highway or by signing up online at www.ktb.org.

"When you see thousands of volunteers coming together on one day to help keep Texas beautiful, it's truly inspiring," said TxDOT Travel Division Director Howdeshell. Doris "There's so much to celebrate this year as the Don't Mess with Texas campaign turns 20, and Trash-Off is certainly one

In addition to the media campaign, TxDOT is sponsoring a "Real Texans Don't Litter" Cleanup Contest, challenging "Real Texans" to volunteer at one of 25 cleanups around the state. The locations will be unveiled the day of Trash-Off, April 1, and the events will take place between May and mid-August. 

#### Officials differ on scope of special session

AUSTIN - Something is fluating in the Texas sky and it's big enough to obscure the sun. To some observers it looks like a spring cloud, to others, it's more like the airship Hindenburg. But really, it's just a question: How will the Legislature, in a 30day special session, fix the state's unconstitutional tax system?

Since the late 1980s the Legislature repeatedly has failed to agree on something better than "Robin Hood," the court-ordered wealthsharing formula that requires rich school districts to contribute a portion of their tax revenue into a pot divided among poor school districts.

And, during those 20-odd years, the Legislature forced school districts to pay an ever-increasing share of the cost to fund education. Now hundreds of districts are taxing at the cap rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

Texas' top officeholders are looking toward April 17, opening day for the 79th Legislature's third called session, each with different perspectives on how to proceed.

• Gov. Rick Perry called the special session with the sole purpose of getting lawmakers to fix the state's broken property tax system.

· Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, wants to expand the call to include school finance reform.

# **April Is Child Abuse** Prevention Month

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, a time to focus on the protection and care of our most vulnerable and trusting resources - our children. Governor Perry has proclaimed April Child Abuse Prevention Month in

Child Abuse Prevention Month has been observed each April since its first presidential proclamation in 1983. Since that time, individuals and organizations have joined during April to raise the public's awareness of child abuse and its prevention.

Nearly 200,000 Texas children are reported as abused of neglected every year, according to Child Protective Services, a division of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. April is child abuse prevention month in Texas and in the nation.

"It's a time to focus on ways not only to protect children but also to prevent abuse from ever occurring," said Wendell Teltow, Executive Director for Prevent Child Abuse Texas. 'This is our opportunity to make a difference in young lives.

Neglect is the most frequent form of child abuse, according to the state agency charged with protecting children.

'Yes, children die simply because they're put in situations where they are not supervised," said Teltow. "But parent's are not alone. We need to raise the public's awareness of distressing statistics," says Teltow, "and to encourage people to become involved in the prevention of child abuse. One small, but public way of showing your support, is wearing a blue ribbon during April. Remember, children are helpless, you are not."

According to Prevent Child Abuse America fortythree percent of American parents report spanking or hitting their child, 37 percent report insulting or swearing at their child, and two percent report having kicked, bit or punched their child. More than 3 million children were reported to child protective service agencies as alleged victims of child abuse or neglect each year, and approximately 1 million of these reports are confirmed.

Prevent Child Abuse Texas is a statewide nonprofit organization dedicated to the prevention of child abuse and neglect in all its forms. Its network works in collaborative manner with community, state, and national groups to turn information into action by developing sound child and family oriented communitybased prevention programs, public awareness activities, educational initiatives, and



# Make The Most Of Your **Medical Appointments**

For some people, a visit to the hospital or physician's office can be a very stressful experience- a long drive may have been involved, almost certainly a long wait. By the time you actually see your health professional, you may forget to tell him or her something important. To out your new list of ensure the best quality care questions, comments and for you or your loved one, take an active role in preparing for your health visits so that you may take full advantage of your time with the health professional.

Most people don't leave their house for the supermarket without a list of things to buy, right? A visit to your health professional should be no different. A suggestion for keeping this list might include purchasing a spiral bound notebook so that all your information is kept in the same place. Make a list of questions, comments and concerns before going to your health provider's office, leaving space to write down any instructions you might be given. Your list should

·Your main reason for visiting your health provider ·Your list of health

concerns and/or complaints, in order of importance •When did it start? What

makes it better? What makes it worse?

·Your list of medications. Include dosages, why you take that medication and any side-effects you may be experiencing.

During your visit you will be able to work your way down this list, making sure that each item is addressed. By having this information ready, you will be able to maximize your time with your health provider. Your part of the visit with your health provider includes listening to his or her

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notebook, such as your Social Security Number. This is for your protection in case your notebook is lost or

stolen.

A spiral bound notebook will serve as an excellent personal health record. 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

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
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
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## Letter

Dear Friend,

Our religious freedom is on the line today, literally, as never before.

Our national motto--"In God We Trust"--may soon be eradicated from our nation's currency.

You know how the Pledge of Allegiance had been attacked--the words "one nation under God" have been under fire from atheists.

When that assault began, I warned that our national motto, "In God We Trust," would be next.

Now the same atheist lawyer who sued for removal of "one nation under God" has sued for removal of "In God We Trust" from our coins and bills.

If "In God We Trust" is deemed unconstitutional, what expressions of our faith will be banned next? "So help me God" in the presidential Oath of Office?...the Supreme Court of the United States and the U.S. House of Representatives opening sessions with prayer?...the President saying, "God bless America"?

This is an abomination. I shudder to think of the many men and women who have sacrificed their lives for the freedom of nation...freedom tyranny...freedom from religious intolerance and persecution. What would these great heroes think of what is happening in our country today?

This new assault is an affront to history itself. "In God We Trust" has appeared on our nation's money since the Civil War.

My friend, I submit to you today that this attempt to remove the motto is no idle threat by one renegade atheist. There is a tragic movement in this country to wipe out every last vestige of religious faith in the public square. This effort is often strongly supported by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), Americans United for the Separation of Church and State (AU), activist federal judges, and a host of other anti-faith individuals and organizations.

Furthermore, the man behind these lawsuits--Michael Newdow--is an intelligent and tenacious attorney. I understand that he is also a medical doctor, and some say, with tremendous financial resources available for pursuing his pernicious agenda.

So we cannot simply sit and wait and hope the problem goes away.

We must pray and we must act; we must take godly action to stop these ceaseless encroachments on our religious liberty, our religious heritage.

And today, I am pleased to tell you that there is hope.

I thank God that a number of members of Congress have united to propose a Constitution Restoration Act, which would protect our national motto and other expressions of our Judeo-Christian heritage from such onslaught.

The passage of this Act would be the single strongest weapon we could have, short of prayer, for the protection of our national motto and other public expressions of our Christian faith. It needs to be the first priority for Congress, right now, with a new session under way.

But passage of this Act is by no means guaranteed--the anti-God forces hate it.

It will take the concerted efforts of caring Christian citizens --people like you-speaking with a strong and united voice, to make their values known in the halls of

Congress. For this cause, I suggest

#### A Brief History

In the early days of the Civil War, Treasury Secretary Salmon P. Chase instructed the director of the U.S. mint at Philadelphia to prepare a motto for the United States coins have nation's coins.

"Dear Sir," his memo began: "No nation can be strong except in the strength of God, or safe except in His defense. The trust of our people in God should be declared on our national coins."

After a few options were considered, Chase settled on IN GOD WE TRUST; Congress passed the necessary legislation, and the motto sappear on our paper money first appeared on the 1864 "also.

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
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



# **Texas To Receive \$1,916,800** in Drought Relief Funding

WASHINGTON, March 2006-Agriculture Deputy Secretary Chuck Conner today announced that UDFA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will allocate close to \$20.1 million in Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) funding to 26 states affected by Natural Disasters.

"The Emergency Conservation Program is an important tool for farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate and strengthen environmental stewardship of their lands, said Conner. "These funds will help farmers and ranchers rehabilitate farmland damaged by floods, drought, wildfires and other natural disasters in recent years."

E.C.P. gives producers resources to remove debris from farmland, restore structures, provide water for livestock in drought situations and grade and shape farmland damaged by a natural disaster. Locally-elected F.S.A. county committees implement ECP for all disasters other than drought, which is done by FSA's national office. Eligible producers receive cost-share

assistance of up to 75 percent of the cost of approved practices, as deter-mined by F.S.A. county

committees. The \$20.1 million in E.C.P. funds allocated today are from unused funds from various states.

Among the 26 states receiving the funding an-nounced today are Texas and Oklahoma, which are continuing to face drought and severe wildfire conditions. \$3.9 million, while Oklahoma will receive \$2.7 million. F.S.A. is allocating \$20,142,400 in E.C.P. funds to 26 states including \$1,916,800 in drought disaster funds in Texas.
