At the beginning of the special session of the Texas Legislature it appears that there will be considerable agreement on the new registration law. At the beginning of the session it looks like there will be a requirement for annual registration, during a designated time, without the levying of a registration fee of any kind. Chances are that people over sixty years of age, in towns of 10,000 or less, will not have to register as has been the law in the past. Governor Connally favors an election law with these provisions and chances are good that he will be supported by a large majority of the legislature. It is presumed that this piece of legislation will make it possible for Texans to qualify to vote in the various elections, but there could still be considerable confusion. There will be a constitutional amendment on the ballot in November, giving the people of the state an opportunity to repeal the poll tax as a requirement for voting. Apparently that amendment will make little difference whether it carries or not. Then the Attorney General, Waggoner Carr, according to news reports, will make an effort to get the United States Supreme Court to revoke the decision of the lower court that found the poll tax to be unconstitutional. In short the voters in Texas have got more going for them at the moment than any would be bunch of ballot casters in history.

I have never resented, or failed so far as I know, the payment of a poll tax for the privilege of voting. If the idea behind the assessing of the poll tax was to raise needed revenue for some necessary state agency, it would be all right with me. But if the purpose of the poll tax is to keep people in the lower income brackets from voting, and that was and is its purpose, I am unalterably opposed to it. Being a citizen of this country, and of sound mind, should be sufficient qualification for voting. The right of franchise is an inherent right that defies the use of a price tag.

I don't think I mentioned it before, but I had a birthday just a few days ago. When I was a teenager, I thought people were getting old when they got up around sixty, but I have changed my mind. About all the difference I can tell is that a skinned place doesn't heal up as quick as it used to, and people seem to be a little more courteous.

The changeable weather in Texas was a conversation piece even before the first trail herds made dust clouds on their way to the Kansas railheads. Texas weather is as unpredictable as its politics and has about the same ratio of change. It is doubtful if there is a person in Dimmitt that could tell you how many northers, or cold spells, we have had in the past month. There is another due in before press time, which is about 18 hours from now.

From all reports there will be a drastic reduction in acreage of basic crops, because of the nature of the farm program, especially grain sorghum. Net income to the farmers could conceivably be near what it was during the past year or two, but the retail business created by farm labor is in for a slump. This may be offset to a degree by renewed interest in vegetable production. It is reported that cucumber acreage in the county will be increased considerably, and since the Dimmitt Produce Company's vegetable processing plant has been leased to LaMantia, Cullum & Collier of Crystal City an increased acreage of carrots and other vegetables can be expected.

### Congressman Rogers Schedules Meetings In District Cities

Congressman Walter Rogers will travel by air to the Texas Panhandle next Thursday, February 17, to attend scheduled meetings with constituents in Amarillo, Pampa, Hereford, Dimmitt and Littlefield. Events to be scheduled after his arrival will take him to other Panhandle points, and the Congressman said.

The Congressman will be accompanied by Mrs. Rogers. "I am looking forward to discussing first-hand with residents of the 18th Congressional District the problems now facing the Congress in this new Session," Congressman Rogers said. "Of course, the Viet Nam war is of primary importance, but in addition there are a number of questions before Congress concerning agriculture and the Nation's economy generally, as well as the 1966 legislative program."

Congressman Rogers plans to return to Washington February 23 in time for the resumption of hearings February 24 aimed at pin-pointing the cause of recent electric power blackouts in the Northeastern United States and elsewhere. The Congressman was appointed chairman of the special sub-committee to conduct the House of Representatives' investigation of the power failures and to make recommendations.

Before leaving for Texas, Congressman Rogers will preside Monday and Tuesday when his Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation will hold hearings on water resources expansion legislation and on the saline water program.

Dimmitt Bobcats vied with Abernathy as District 2-AA Champions Tuesday night when they defeated Friona by one point in a battle royal on the cage floor. Dimmitt and Abernathy have a 9-1 record in this season's basketball play.

Dimmitt grabbed an early lead in the first quarter, keeping Friona from scoring until mid-way into the first period. Dimmitt ended the first quarter with a three point lead, but Friona quickly closed the gap during the early part of the second period.

Dimmitt Bobcats will play Abernathy Friday Night at 8:00 p.m. in the Plainview High School Gymnasium to determine who will represent District 2-AA in Bi-District play.

The second quarter saw a close contest between the two teams with each swapping leads, but Friona ended up on top at the close of the first half with a three point lead over Dimmitt.

The Bobcats came back like a house on fire after half-time and soon claimed the game again. Dimmitt ended the third quarter after a hard battle with a 3-2 lead over Friona.

With less than three minutes to play in the fourth period, Dimmitt had a good seven point lead over Friona, and it would have been anybody's guess that Dimmitt had an easy road to hold during the remainder of the game, but Friona still wanted to play ball and came within one point of Dimmitt with 2 seconds left in the game.

Friona started their gain on Dimmitt with two minutes and 45 seconds registered on the clock when Friona started dropping two pointers in their basket to add up their score. Friona scored 13 points during the last 2 1/2 minutes of play, while Dimmitt scored 5 points during the same period of time.

It was Kent Lindsey who saved the day for the Bobcats when he dropped in two free throws and gave them a three point lead over Friona with 10 seconds left in the game.

With only two second left in the game, Friona dropped in two more points, but not enough to catch Dimmitt. The game ended with Dimmitt 51-50 victors over Friona, and the Bobcats were in possession of the ball.

Coach Kenneth Cleveland said that he thought the boys did an excellent job on defense. An example he mentioned was Ronnie Kenmore who held Friona's Graves to only five points for the entire game. Graves has scored an average of 20 points every game this season.

Cleveland also mentioned that Bobcat Bob Bradford grabbed 11 rebounds during the game.

John Howell was high point man for the Bobcats with 17 points. Bob Bradford scored 15 points.

The Bobcats hit 21 out of 3 free throws for 58 per cent, and 15 out of 33 field goals for 46 per cent.

Cleveland stated that he has been pleased with the fans support at the games this season.

### Campbells Make Special Gift Of \$5,000 To ACC

Mr. and Mrs. Truvis Campbell of Dimmitt have made a \$5,000 gift to Abilene Christian College designated for the Design for Development program of the college.

The announcement was made Monday night in Amarillo at a report meeting of the Panhandle Region Committee of the ACC National Development Council. Campbell is the newly appointed special gifts chairman of the Panhandle Region.

A trustee of Abilene Christian College since 1954, Campbell is a farmer and an elder of the Church of Christ in Dimmitt. He has two daughters who attended ACC, Mrs. John Alton Ginn and Mrs. Dean Wiseman of Sudan.

The Design for Development at Abilene Christian College is a \$25.7 million program of physical, academic and endowment expansion. The Phase I three-year goal for the campaign is \$10.4 million and a total of \$6.8 million has been subscribed since the campaign was announced in February of 1965.

Campbell's work as special gifts chairman of the Panhandle Region will be to assist in the solicitation of gifts in the \$3,000 to \$25,000 range, usually on a three-year pledge basis.

Groundbreaking for the first building in the ACC Design for Development program will be held at 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, February 22. This will be official ceremonies for the \$1.5 million Moody Coliseum - Auditorium.

**Senator Yarborough's Washington Report**

Dear Fellow Texan:  
I have good news from Washington. There will be a Cold War GI Bill in time for our deserving veterans to begin school this summer.

On Monday of this week, the House of Representatives passed S.9, my Cold War GI Bill, by an overwhelming vote of 381 to 0. Since the Senate passed the bill last year, this week's House action insures that there will be a Cold War GI Bill.

Although there are differences in the two bills that were passed, I will make every effort to see that these differences are ironed out so that our Cold War veterans can be in school by June of this year.

Under the provisions of the bill that have been agreed upon, any veteran who has served more than 180 days on active duty since January 31, 1955, will be eligible for readjustment benefits.

For each day of active duty a veteran will be eligible for one day of educational assistance up to a maximum of 36 months — this is enough for four complete 9 month school terms. If a veteran is single, he will receive \$100 a month for a full-time program of education; if he is married he will receive \$150 a month.

This educational assistance will begin on June 1, of this year, which means that over 2½ million veterans who have already completed their military service and have been discharged will be eligible to receive educational assistance at that time.

By 1970, over 5 million Cold War veterans will be eligible for this bill, which gives them a new hope in life to catch up with those people who have not spent time in the defense of our Nation.

This bill also provided for guaranteed loans for home and farms, similar to those of the Korean GI Bill.

Although the bill passed by the House of Representatives does not provide for high school training, I have amended the bill to be sure that returning veterans can use the bill to complete high school if they desire. Over one-third of the Korean veterans used the bill for high school training.

After seven years of concentrated work on getting a Cold War GI Bill enacted into law, I am extremely elated that we have finally conquered the opposition to this bill. Although the bill is not as broad as I would like for it to be, I will continue to work on amendments to give larger educational benefits to these deserving veterans — over ¼ of a million in our own State of Texas.

They have fled in any vehicle, any place, and any time that they can. Some have even fled on foot in daylight through the rifle fire of border guards. And now the communists are "bauteifying" the zoal border! They are clearing land and planting gardens — the better to see and shoot those who seek freedom.

### SPORTS AFIELD

Sometimes a guy's legs are particularly vulnerable while he's big-game hunting, fishing and/or camping by packtrain in the high mountains or Far North. On horseback, one can be confronted by a great many undesirable situations, chief among them the distinct possibilities of snow and a cutting, vicious wind seemingly off the polar ice cap. When a fellow is astride a horse, his legs don't have the same circulation they will while he's trudging on foot — so consequently his thighs and shins are susceptible.

So chaps, of some kind, are essential to the pack train camper. Chaparajos, which is the long way of saying "chaps," probably are Mexican in origin (at least, in North America) and were, 'tis said, to protect vaqueros from chaparral and cactus (even surly-range-cattle horns). Recognition of their usefulness quickly spread through our West. They can be had in a great many varieties, including the ludicrous angora-wool type — but it is generally agreed that the best working chaps for sportsmen are the strictly utility cowboy batting, type of lightweight top-grain elk or chrome-tanned leather.

Good chaps should be relatively thin, pliable and not inclined to stiffen in bitter weather. "Everyone is a bit different in personal likes, but I prefer my leather chaps to ride a bit low — so I have them with a shorter inseam measurement than do most," remarks John Jobson, Camping Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. Chaps are best suited for sportsmen's use if they are secured to the leg with the customary three conchas and snap rings. That way, if you have to pile off your horse for a trophy stalk, you can shed them in a hurry. They are made with zippers instead of snaps for those who like the feature.

How to acquire them? Most of us, since we actually need them about once a year for a pack trip, want to keep the cost low. New ones can be purchased for about \$30 if you like the plain, unadorned pattern. In the West, if you should by chance wander into a saddle shop, occasionally you can pick up a good used pair for about half that amount — as cowpokes sometimes hock or sell their gear during periods of stress and adversity (such as being out of work or having tried to fill an inside straight).

AUSTIN, Texas - They're back at it again!

Texas legislators were called back to Austin for a special session Monday by Gov. John Connally.

A three-judge federal court's order knocking out the poll tax as a requirement for voting prompted Governor Connally, on advice of Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, to call the extraordinary meeting of lawmakers. Purpose is to pass a voter registration law in case Carr's appeal of the lower court's decision to the U. S. Supreme Court is lost.

Texas has no other form of voter registration than machinery for collecting the poll tax, noted Charles Wilson of Lufkin said he believes teachers will ask another pay raise in 1967. They got one in 1965.

POVERTY PROJECTS APPROVED - Fifteen more Community Action grants and two VISTA grants under the Economic Opportunity Act have received Governor Connally's approval.

Grants went to agencies in Harris, Hidalgo, Atascosa, Karnes, Wilson, Brooks, Jim Hogg, Zapata, Dallas, El Paso, Kleberg, Maverick, McLennan, Shelby, Starr, Comal, Blanco, Nueces, and Webb Counties. They ranged from \$5,752 for Economic Opportunity Development Corporation of Laredo project to \$53,181 for Harris County Economic Opportunity Organization.

MANUFACTURING AT RECORD LEVEL - All-time highs in employment, payrolls and value of output were set by Texas manufacturing industries in 1965, and outlook is even brighter for 1966.

So concludes a study of Texas industrial expansion by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Total Texas manufacturing employment this year is expected to rise by 13 per cent, with biggest increase in electrical machinery production. Estimated value added by manufacture for 1966 is anticipated to be slightly above eight billion, five hundred million dollars, a 21 per cent rise over 1963.

A serious problem facing Texas as manufacturers, BBR noted, is a shortage of skilled labor, particularly machinists and engineers for aerospace companies supporting the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston.

Shortages of engineers, machinists, technicians and managerial talent emphasizes again the "need to provide a superior educational system at the elementary, secondary and college levels," BBR stresses. Many industries, Bureau warns, can move where needed labor is available, and there is less and less work for the uneducated and unskilled.

In other opinions, the attorney general concludes: Alabama - Coushatta Indian tribal members cannot create a public housing authority as separate corporate entity to which they can make a 40-year lease of state trust land for low-rent housing project.

Election workers in counties under five hundred thousand may be paid for overtime over 10 working hours at polls at rate not to exceed \$1.25 an hour.

Conviction in a misdemeanor case punishable by imprisonment is void where defendant was too poor to employ a lawyer and trial court failed to appoint one for him.

Game wardens are entitled to \$3 arrest fee payable to Parks and Wildlife Department, but fines and trial fees go to county officers' salary funds.

## Crashes In Castro County Result In \$6,025 Damage

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor.

Three crashes resulted in six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,025.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months only two million or 40 per cent of the approximately five million registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves three million vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months.

If the number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas each would have approximately 577 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or about 15 vehicles per day. The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average number to inspect. In areas where there are only a few inspection stations you may have many miles to travel to get your vehicle inspected.

The Sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines.

Remember — no extension of the Safety Inspection deadline, April 15, 1966.

### School Counselor Discusses Increased College Enrollment

A major responsibility of the Dimmitt High School junior and senior counselor, Mr. S. T. Newman, is to provide information for students who are planning to go to college. Mr. Newman wrote the following article about college opportunities in Texas, and it should be of interest to anyone planning to further his education.

The steady increase in college enrollment has been widely publicized. All indications point to an ever greater number of students seeking to attend college in the foreseeable future. Not as widely recognized is the fact that a high percentage of entering

college students fail to continue in college. According to information received from several colleges in this state where many of our students attend, over fifty percent of all freshmen who enroll never graduate. Although many reasons have been advanced to explain this high drop-out rate, there is general agreement that the selection of an appropriate college by a student is an important factor.

Since there are upward of two thousand colleges and universities in the United States, each with a distinct personality of its own, the task found by students in se-

lecting a college compatible with his background, interests, personality, and level of academic ability is far from easy.

We believe the first consideration in selecting a college is whether or not it teaches on a high level what the student wishes to study.

There are one hundred seven public and independent junior and senior colleges in Texas, ranging in enrollment from 123 students at one junior college to the University of Texas, a city within itself, of upward of twenty-six thousand students. These colleges range in personality from the cosmopolitan view of the big city universities of Dallas, Austin and Houston to some small South Texas and West Texas college towns with rural atmospheres and a feeling of the wide open spaces.

The tuition fees of these varied Texas colleges and universities are as different as the colleges themselves. One of our highest ranking universities requires no tuition. The entrance requirements to this school are very exacting, and everyone accepted is enrolled tuition free. All of the twenty state supported colleges charge a flat rate of fifty dollars per semester, and several of the independent or church supported schools require a tuition of upward of a thousand dollars per year.

The course offerings of these schools are more widely divergent even than the other factors mentioned. Of the 100 plus institutions of higher learning in Texas, if one wishes to study Dental Surgery, his choice of schools is reduced to two — the University of Texas and Baylor. The same is true of the study of medicine. If he wishes to major in Meteorology and be a weather specialist, he attends Texas A & M or the University of Texas. Certain degrees in Home Economics are taught only at Texas Tech and Texas Woman's University. A degree in library science is offered only at Texas University and Teacher training courses are offered at all the four-year colleges in Texas — so are courses in business training.

To compete with the private business training schools, several of the area junior colleges and at least one of the area four-year colleges are offering two-year terminal business courses at a much reduced tuition fee. These college business training programs are to be recommended for many reasons, not the least of which is the fact that at the end of the two years' training, if one wishes to continue his college work to four years and a degree, he has already two years completed.

Therefore, it is easy to see that college opportunities in Texas and this part of the state are certainly not limited to anyone who really wants to get a college education.

### Work Of The FBI

There has been much said against the F. B. I. in the last few years. There are, over two thousand agents who each day risk their lives to defend the cause of the secret war against the Ku Klux Klan, and in slum areas.

The Ku Klux Klan is not like it was at its beginning. In 1920, the membership was about four million and growing, and spread all over the United States. After much senseless violence, the organization was reduced to only a small nuisance to the government. The Ku Klux Klan members are causing misery to those who fight for civil rights. Communists and other fanatics stir up disorder and racial hatred by infiltration of civil - rights organizations.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has developed four basic tactics for civil rights. Massive investigation is an immediate action involving as many agents as needed. The F. B. I. has begun to recruit local authorities as allies. This has resulted in steadily decreasing racial violence.

They have developed a technique called "psychological warfare." Soon after a man joins the Klan, an F. B. I. agent visits him and tells him that as long as he stays in the Klan, he is a suspect for anything that happens.

The most important of the tactics is counterintelligence. This is the infiltration of Klans and Communist groups with informants — patriotic men who risk their lives to forewarn of subversion and violence. Today, because of the F. B. I., almost every Klan group is infiltrated with such people.

In the last four years, the F. B. I. has investigated over fourteen thousand civil rights cases in the United States. Agents have quietly passed on intelligence which has enabled loyal civil rights leaders to prevent Communist subversion.

Still there is no end to the abuse being heaped on the F. B. I. agents who fight in this war. Herbert Hoover said, "If we do our job right and impartially, the extremists on both sides are going to scream at us. In fact, the louder they scream, maybe the better we are doing the job."

No one really realizes the wonderful work that the men of the F. B. I. are doing. Their job is hard, and their hours are irregular, but the personal rewards are beyond realization. We should all stop and think if we are also doing our part to stop this discrimination against the Government of the United States.

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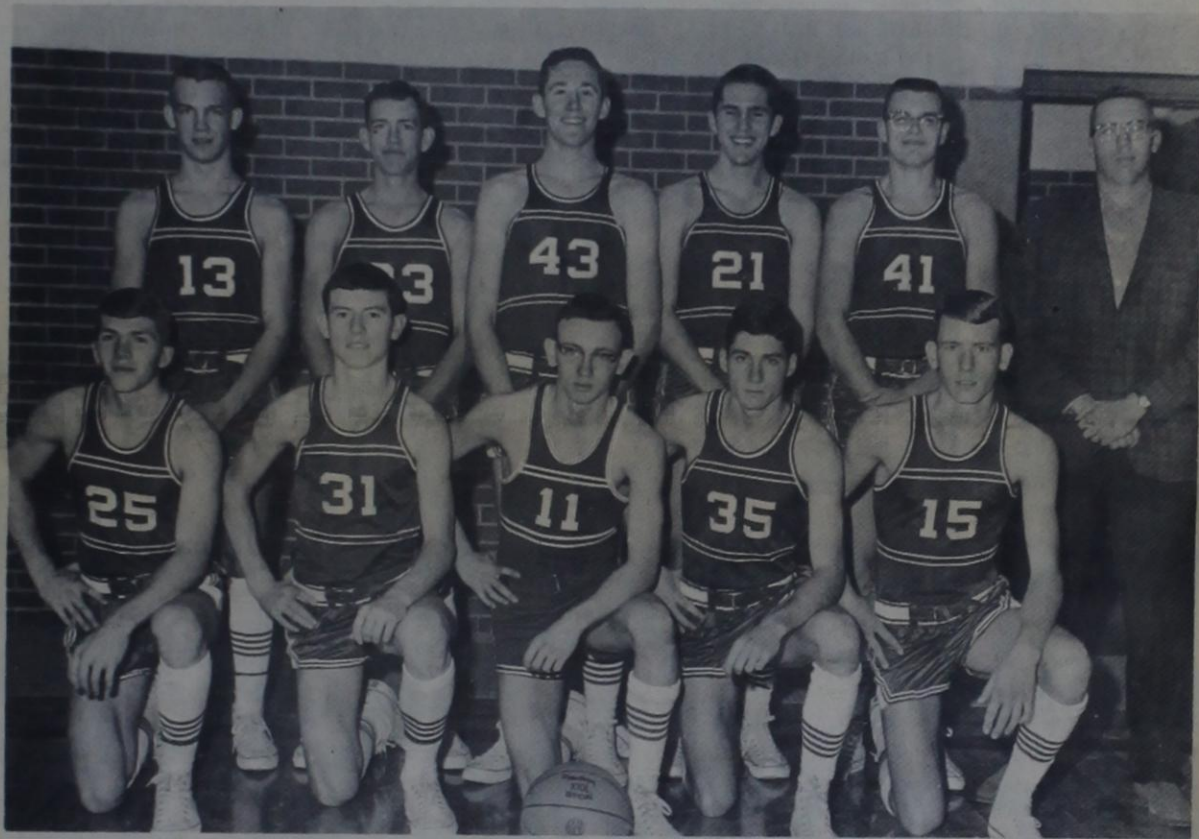

**Governor Connally Designates Feb. 19-26 Texas FFA Week**

The week of February 19-26 has been designated as FFA Week in Texas by Governor John Connally. While making the designation, Governor Connally said, "The Future Farmers of America organization is playing an outstanding role in assuring the future and progress and prosperity of our State and Nation."

In speaking of the FFA Program, Governor Connally said, "The importance of agriculture in our State increases as Texas progresses. It is vital to our well-being that we train skilled farmers and ranchers to provide a plentiful supply of food products in years to come and to train those who will provide services to the farmer and process and distribute farm products."

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 37th year in Texas. There are 48,382 members studying vocational agriculture in 864 high schools in Texas. In these vocational agriculture classes students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership citizenship and cooperation.

Texas membership has grown from 28,643 in 1950 to 48,382 in 1965. The largest growth came this year partly as a result of total school integration. In a recent study conducted by Mr. George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, it was found that over sixty per cent of the vocational agriculture students

who graduated from high school last year and were available for employment are now in full-time farming or in agricultural related occupations. Over forty per cent of this number are in full-time farming.

The theme this year for the FFA is: "Agriculture is more than farming." It involves those who process and distribute many agricultural goods. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientists, management personnel sales and service personnel and educators. Also there are over sixty thousand desirable openings each year for farm operators, farm engineers and full-time hired farm labor.

Vocational agriculture and the FFA are striving to provide a sound and a continuing education to help produce the leaders and work force so direly needed in our nation's agriculture industry.
