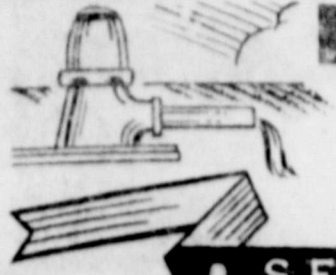
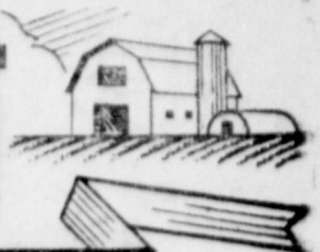

Lockney District Given 10 Sections From S. P. District

The Lockney Common School District was given 10 sections of land out of the South Plains District in an order issued by the Floyd County School Board Monday.

The action was endorsed by both the school boards of the Lockney District and the South Plains district.

The land transferred to the Lockney school district included all of sections 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35 and 37, the north one-half of section 38 and the south one-half of section 36, Block D-2, according to information from the office of County Superintendent Clarence Guffee. This land is all in the southwest part of the South Plains district and was once a part of the old Roseland district.

The majority of the people of the area affected lived closer to Lockney and wanted to send their children to the local school, it was reported here.

The County Board appointed Hilburn Casey as a member of the Lockney School Board replacing O. H. Hockabee, who has moved away. Mr. Casey lives in the area affected by the transfer.

The Board, in acting upon requests for transfer of students from one district to another, granted all requests if the student's grade was not taught in his home district but refused to transfer students if their grade was taught in their home district, Mr. Guffee said.

Lake Irrigation Project Creates Much Interest

A lake irrigation project on the Horton Howell farm just south of Sterley is creating a great deal of interest among farmers of this area. Mr. Howell is supplementing water from a weak irrigation well with water from a lake on his farm by pumping the water 1550 feet through a 15 inch concrete pipe to a high point on the farm and running it into his irrigation ditch.

Many farmers of the area have visited the Howell farm to view the project. The pump from the lake side was first started on a trial run Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning Mr. Howell started the pump in earnest and turned it into his ditch.

Mr. Howell figures that he has around 300 acre feet of water in the lake at this time which is sufficient, even allowing for evaporation and seepage, to give him enough irrigation water for the remainder of the summer. A 10 foot deep hole was dug at one side of the lake and a ditch dug from the center of the lake. The 6-inch centrifugal pump was placed in the hole and is powered from a Model G John Deere tractor. The pump is capable of pumping more than 2000 gallons of water per minute but has been slowed down to around 1000 gallons, Howell said.

The entire project will cost around \$2500, which is less than half the cost of an irrigation well.

W. A. Carthel Succumbs to Long Illness Thursday

W. A. (Babe) Carthel, a long time resident of Floyd county and community leader, passed away at his home here late Thursday after a long illness. He was 68 years of age.

Mr. Carthel had been in ill health for more than a year and was confined to his bed the past few months. His condition became critical last week and death was not unexpected.

Funeral services were held at the West Side Church of Christ in Lockney Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock with Elder Charlie Watkins of Lubbock and Elder Alvie Johnson of Turkey officiating. Burial was in the Lockney cemetery under the direction of Carter Funeral Home.

Probably one of the largest crowds ever to attend a funeral service in Lockney was present for the services Saturday afternoon. The church was crowded and almost as many people were congregated on the church lawn.

Mr. Carthel was a community leader in the Prairie Chapel community for many years. He served at one time on the school board of the old Bobbitt school district. He was a leader in the co-operative movement in this area.

He had been a member of the West Side Church since 1911.

Mr. Carthel was born at Cleburne on December 18, 1882. He moved with his parents to Altus, Okla., when he was six years old. He was married to Miss Lilly Steel at Olustee, Okla., on December 18, 1904 and the couple moved to Floyd County in 1905. They settled on the farm 6 miles northwest of Lockney where they lived until 1943 when they retired and moved into town.

Survivors include his wife, four daughters, Mrs. Ennis Cooley, Floydada; Mrs. Amos Richie, Clovis; Mrs. Doyle Harrison and Mrs. Chester Rogers, both of Lockney; six sons, W. F. Cunyus, Mrs. Della Willmon and Mrs. John Bell, all of Lockney; six brothers, G. H. Carthel, B. R. Carthel, Francis Carthel, and John P. Carthel, all of Lockney; Milford Carthel and Ross Carthel, both of Plainview.

Fuel Tax Refund Law Is Amended

Amendments to the motor fuel tax law passed by the recent session of the State Legislature will prohibit dealers from keeping tax exemptions duplicates belonging to their customers more than seven days and will also prohibit the dealer from filling out or notarizing any claim for a tax refund for the customers, local dealers have been notified by Robert S. Calvert, State Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The amendments to the law become effective September 1. Local dealers were this week notifying their customers that they would be unable to fill out claims or keep exemption duplicates after that date.

Petitions Ask Consolidation Election Soon

Reports reaching The Beacon Tuesday were to the effect that petitions were being circulated asking for an election to determine whether or not the Lone Star school district would be consolidated with the Lockney school district.

The petitions were circulated first in the Lone Star district after the county board had refused transfer of some pupils of that district to the Lockney schools, it was reported here. Later the petition was circulated in the Lockney district.

If as many as 20 signers are secured on the petitions they will then be presented to County Judge Frank L. Moore who will call the election. Plans call for the voting to be held on September 1. Petitions had not been received in the judge's office Wednesday afternoon.

The election must carry by a majority in each district in order for the consolidation to be effective.

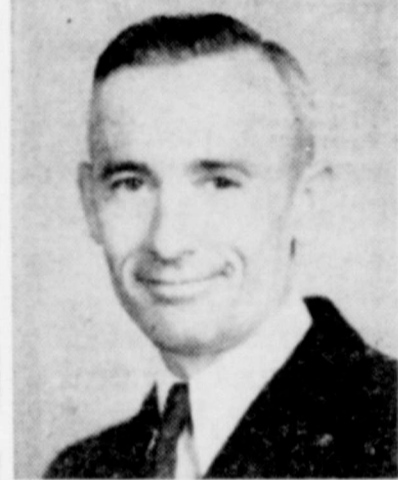

Softball League Playoff Starts Thursday Night

A playoff between five teams in the Lockney Softball League will get underway Thursday night of this week, according to a schedule released Wednesday by League officials.

The team managers held a meeting Tuesday afternoon at which it was decided that all teams still participating in the league would be invited to participate in the play-off and that the roster of the teams would be cut back to those players who started the season. The Providence team declined to enter the play-off because of difference of opinion regarding a pitcher on their team and that left only five teams to enter. They are Lone Star, Fire Department, Paymaster of Aiken, South Plains, American Legion.

League officials said that in the play-off series no outside players would be allowed to participate and that each team would use only those players on their original roster.

Following is the schedule for the play-off series:

Thursday night, August 9—No game in the top bracket of the series, the Fire Department and Lone Star each drawing a bye. In the lower bracket Paymaster will play South Plains and the American Legion team drew a bye.

Friday night, August 10—Lone Star will play the Fire Department in the first game while the American Legion will play the winner of the Paymaster-South Plains game in the second game.

On Saturday night, the loser of the top bracket game Friday night will play the loser of the South Plains-Paymaster game Thursday night.

Monday night, August 13 — The first game will be between the winner of the top bracket game and the winner of the lower bracket game on Friday night previous. The second game will be between the winner of the Saturday night game and the loser of the second game on the previous Friday night.

Tuesday night, August 14 — One game only will be played and that between the loser of the first game on Monday night and the winner of the second game on Monday night.

However if the winner of the losers bracket game wins the Thursday night game then the two teams will play again Friday night to determine the winner since they will be tied with one game lost each.

Two Petersburg Boys Drown In Lake Thursday

Two young brothers, inseparable companions in work and play, drowned Thursday morning of last week when one of them responded to the other's cry for help.

Donnie Gale and Louis Carlton Burns, 13 and 11 year old sons of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert H. Burns of Petersburg, sank to their deaths in about six feet of water in a lake on the H. A. Hegi farm a mile north and three miles west of Petersburg.

Soon after the drownings, the Heard and Groce boys were unable to direct searchers to the exact spot in the 25-acre lake where the brothers went under. Members of the Lockney Fire Department took their grappling hooks and assisted in the search for the bodies.

Time To Plant Pastures Now

By Ralph R. Cogdell, Work Unit Conservationist... Planting time for improved pasture grasses or cool season irrigated grasses is about here.

Last fall several plantings were made before the September rains and they came up to a very good stand.

Two or more grasses along with alfalfa or madrid sweet clover are sown together. This prolongs the growing season as well as making more volume of forage available.

Alfalfa is the best legume for mixtures but may cause bloat. One pound of alfalfa or sweet clover is recommended.

The rate of seeding of grass is fifteen to twenty pounds of good quality seed per acre.

The Floyd County Soil Conservation District has two special grass drills for seeding these mixtures.

The area should not be grazed until it is well established.

Entomologist Here From College Station

Read Whippecht, entomologist who has been connected with A. & M. College for a number of years, is in this area at this time to assist farmers in detecting insects on cotton. M. W. Wiley, president of the First National Bank said this week.

Mr. Whippecht is doing consultant work only and has nothing to sell and does not do spraying, Mr. Wiley said. He charges 10c per acre for thoroughly checking cotton for insects of all kinds. He plans to stay here the remainder of the cotton year and may be contacted through the bank.

Urges Close Watch For Worms

According to the County Agricultural Agent Robert H. Gibson, fleahoppers apparently are not bothering the cotton, but some army worms and web-worms are still working in some places. Some fields have spots infested with boll-worms, which if weather conditions are favorable will extend throughout the fields. Everyone should inspect their cotton 2-3 times a week for boll-worms, checking very carefully for the small worms and take steps to stop them whenever they are present.

Bollworms are very hard to control and should be stopped when they are small. The best bollworm control is 2-3 pounds of 2 parts Toxaphene and 1 part DDT per acre. This rate of application will control bollworms and any other insect that might be present except lice. Whenever an infestation of bollworm is found it should be sprayed with the above mixture at 5 day intervals until they are under control.

There has been a great deal of confusion about the kerosene soap and nicotine sulfate mixture for controlling cotton insects. In a recent conversation with Dr. H. G. Johnson, Head Department of Entomology, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. & M. College, he said this mixture is of little or no value for controlling insects. A letter from Dr. Johnson to the County Agent, Bob Gibson is being quoted below:

"1 lbs. soap dissolved in 5 to 10 gals. of water; add 10 gals. kerosene and mix; add 14 ounces nicotine sulfate and fill barrel with water. This amount to spray 20 acres."

"There are several reasons why this formula would be comparatively ineffective for the control of cotton insects. Kerosene in the quantities that can be used on cotton without burning is not effective for cotton insect control. Kerosene is commonly used as a solvent for organic insecticides but in the quantities used does not appreciably increase the kill obtained. Kerosene in this formula has little or no value. For cotton insect control in this formulation intended to cover 20 acres, no less than 6 pounds of nicotine sulfate should be used for effective aphid control. The soap is essential with nicotine sulfate for a sticker-spreader and as an activator. From the standpoint of known insecticidal value of the materials included in this formulation it is not likely to be effective for control of any cotton insects."

A reserve officer in the Navy, Lt. Foote re-entered service August 29, 1950, was assigned to the USS Winston, and sailed for Japan September 1. His ship has carried troops and supplies to and from Korea. He is awaiting his discharge from the Navy before coming home.

Foote was a teacher in the Lockney schools when he was called back into service.

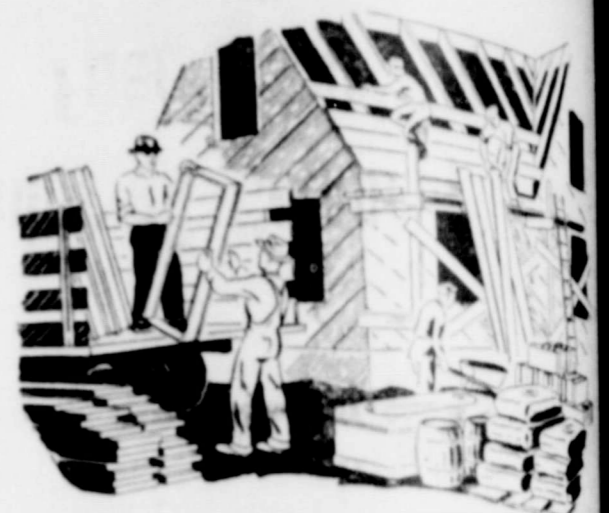
MARGARET WEATHERS PROMOTED TO TELEGRAPH OFFICE MANAGER

1. Making it unlawful for dealer or employee to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of motor fuel tax.
2. Making it unlawful to keep duplicates of exemptions in a place of business where the fuel was purchased for more than seven days after they were issued.

The amendments to the Motor Fuel Tax Law are effective September 1st and after that date we, your local motor fuel dealers, will not be allowed to keep your exemption duplicates for you and will not be allowed to make out any claims for refunds of taxes paid on motor fuels. This law is very strict now and for that reason we are notifying you of the change.
