



#### Can Prevent Child Disease

Not long ago parents and doctors alike were helpless to prevent children from getting communicable "childhood diseases" which endangered the child's health and often cost him his life. Among these death-dealing diseases were whooping cough, smallpox, diptheria, and meas-

Better child care and the development of curative drugs have decreased child deaths from these diseases. But an ounce of prevention is still worth a pound of cure. One powerful weapon against childhood diseases has been the use of immunizing techniques to protect children against many communicable ills. For the first six months of

his life, a baby retains in the blood he derived from his mother certain infection-resisting substances. After this "natural immunity" period, protection against some diseases can be extended artificially by a program of immunization. The baby's doctor, of course, is the best source of advice on when and what immunization should be given the individual child.

The younger a child is when he falls victim to diseases characteristic of childhood, the more against tetanus (lockjaw), a ion, whereby a child can be imdangerous it is for him. So it is deadly disease caused by a munized against

For example, in some localities infants are vaccinated against smallpox at birth. Whooping cough, also, has always been a special hazard of infants and with modern techniques these days it is wise to immunize babies against whooping cough at three to six months of age or earlier, especially if there is an epidemic in the area.

A third form of protection advisable for infants is immunization against diptheria, which should be given when a child is between two and six months old. certainly before he reaches his first birthday.

recent DPA announcement on the newsprint situation indicates how little national knowledge most bureaucrats pos

C. W. Harder

DPA Bulletin No. 170 reports five big newsprint firms have received certificates for rapid amortization of building costs for new production facilities.

But in the next sentence, the report says nothing will happen in the near future, because no priorities are planned at this time for construction of newsprint plants. DPA uses a large quantity of scarce newsprint to announce nothing will be done.

Washington observers point to this "ring-around-the-rosy" action by DPA as another example how bureaucrats are led around by the nose when the interests f small business are concerned.

The U. S. newsprint supply is closely controlled by a small group, and to meet the shortages, this group has continuously raised prices threatening the existence of weekly newspapers.

But many things have thrown a scare into the firms controlling newsprint supply. One is that the Senate Small Business Committee, headed by Sen. John Sparkman, Ala., is investigating.

It is not presumed that any one in DPA will ever be found to have received deep freezers or mink coats because of this action. But the very language of the DPA report on the subject shows that biggest "rubes" in the world are bureaucrats.

The Senate Small Business Committee has found that the nation's 9000 weekly newspapers use between 4 and 5% of the newsprint supply while the gov ernment alone uses 7%.

But DPA reports as follows: There is a growing number of weekly newspapers in the United States competing for available newsprint. This group, consists mostly of religious, labor and fraternal publications, and consumes about three per cent.

Thus, officials of the DFA went on record as not knowing what makes the nation run.

Briefly, and airily they dismiss the importance of the 9000 American weekly newspapers of general circulation that reach more than 15,000,000 homes, and are read by more than a third of the entire national population.






