### MEDITATION

Last week we studied concerning the Spirit's work in the salvation of men's souls. There is not a case in the entire book of conversions, Acts or Apostles, in which the Spirit worked directly on man's heart to his salvation. Even in the case of the Apostle Paul's conversion there was, of necessity, the preaching of the Word. Romans 10:14 makes it clear that there must be preaching. "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not HEARD? and how shall they hear without a PREACHER?" Again I Cor. 1:21b "... it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe." II Cor. 4:7, "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels." We see by all of these scriptures that the Lord has not desired to save man by the direct operation of the Spirit, but by the preaching of the gospel of Christ. It is as Paul states in the 15th Chapter of the Corinthian letter, the 1st verse, "Moreover, brethren, I declare unto you the GOSPEL which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; By which also ye are SAVED, if ye keep in memory what I preached unto you, unless ye have believed in vain."

If, then, you would be saved from sin today your hopes are in vain if you are waiting for the operation of the Spirit on your heart. Some one says "what about Romans 8:16." "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God." Dear friends this passage agrees completely with the passages above. Notice, the Spirit bears "witness WITH" not TO our spirit that we are children of God. Stop for just a moment and consider the difference between with and to. You give a gift TO someone but you enjoy association WITH someone. There is a great difference between the two words. Here is how the Spirit bears witness with our spirit. The Spirit in the written word tells us what to do and our spirit knows whether we have obeyed the Word or not. This is with and not TO.

If you are seeking the salvation of your soul won't you then hear what the Lord has commanded of ALL men since the Law of Christ went into effect some 1900 years ago. Study the Bible with open minds and ready hearts and receive the things commanded. Take no man's word but "try the spirits, whether they be of God."

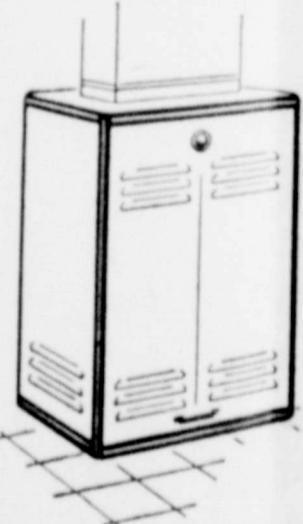

### Uncle Sam On Land-Buying Spree

Ablene. - Uncle Sam started a land buying spree in 1937 that has taken 65 million acres off state and local tax rolls and made the Federal government owner of one-fourth of the land area of continental United States, according to a bulletin just issued by the taxation and legislative department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Current Federal programs call for a federal acquisition of many additional millions of acres, the WTC reported.

The WTC report said that the government then owned from 33 to 40 per cent of the total land area in ten western states, as follows: Nevada, 87 per cent; Arizona, 73 per cent; Utah, 72 per cent; Idaho, 64 per cent; Oregon, 53 per cent; Wyoming, 51 per cent; California, 46 per cent; New Mexico, 44 per cent; Colorado, 38 per cent; Montana and Washington, 35 per cent.

The Committee report is quoted as declaring that a federal policy of land acquisition which stresses Federal ownership and control of all the resources of the United States had developed from activities of various government agencies.

"This policy is inimical to the proper and full development of many of the States - and seriously impairs the entire tax structure of such States and their local subdivisions," the Committee report declared.

The WTC commented that "this trend toward increased Federal land ownership is of comparatively recent origin. For many decades it was the established policy of the Government to dispose of its more accessible lands to private owners who proceeded to put them to productive use. Federal land holdings gradually diminished under this policy until in 1937 the total government acreage was a record low of 394,657,000 acres. By 1949, government acreage totaled 453,147,000. A recent unofficial check showed that approximately four

## Farm Unit And Community Help Program Grows

College Station. - The continuing trend in farm unit and community improvement is toward unified action in family and community welfare and away from individual methods. Consolidation of rural schools and shifts in rural population have brought about renewed interest in community organizations for improvement with the farm family as the pivot.

Home management specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service point out in their 1951 annual report that county Extension agents helped 212 families study their needs in relation to current economic outlook and plan improvements for their farms and homes. In turn these families assisted 5,065 other families to make farm and home plans. Farm unit tours - 138 - were conducted and resulted in 2,658 families adopting improved home practices.

The specialists cite as an example of progress in the farm unit demonstration the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Belton Snider, Matagorda county. In 1950 the Sniders planned as their major goal, a farm drainage system which they completed that year. Mr. Snider said this resulted in a 25 per cent increase in crop yields. At the end of 1951 new fences had been built, an insect control program started, 20 acres of legumes and 30 acres of cover crops planted. Just as much attention was given to plans for the family food supply and has resulted in 95 per cent of it being produced at home. The Sniders and their children, who are 4-H club members, are proud of their home and welcome all to see the improvements that have been made. Mrs. Snider is an active home demonstration club member and attends all leader training meetings where she gets up-to-date information on farm and home management.

When farm families were assisted with making their plans, the specialists stressed the importance of farm and home records. As a result, 2,228 farm unit demonstrators and 22,829 other families have set up a system of keeping farm and home records.

Statistics show that in 71 counties 1,383 leaders were trained in developing community programs. The 257 organized community programs on goals set up to increase and manage family incomes, improve health conditions and services, make farm and million acres more had been added."

home improvements and encourage participation in social activities. The specialists cite the Forest Chapel - Chicoma community, Lamar County, as one that repaired and painted the community building and landscaped the yard; graveled the parking area; and put the water system back into use. The general goals for the farms and home of the community were to test pressure cookers; do homestead improve-

ment; eradicate gophers and moles and expand the acreage of cover crops.

The community approach provides an opportunity for local, state and federal groups to coordinate their work in helping farm and ranch families solve their problems. According to the home management specialists, a larger number of people may be reached with Extension information through organized groups than through individual contacts.

We doubt if very much of the conversation is deliberately malicious, but much of it does irreparable harm—destroying confidences, defacing reputations and shattering friendships.

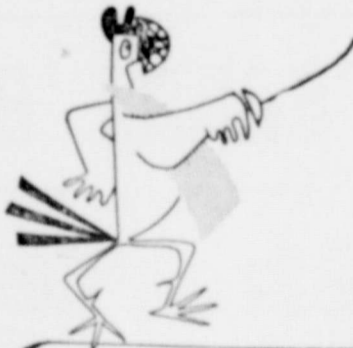
A great philosopher once stated that there are three levels of conversation — the lowest is about people, the next about events and the highest about ideas.

No telling how many ballots have been "thrown out" because of voters accustomed to checking their choice in the states from which they moved doing the same here — thereby losing the vote.

The new system permits those who never voted anywhere except in Texas to go right ahead and "scratch" their ballot, or, if they wish, follow the procedure of checking their choice. Likewise, it permits newcomers, who have lived here long enough to qualify to vote, to "good the Texas way" around. — Hockley Cour Herald.

\$100 DEDUCTIBLE The \$100 deductible provision of the new home policy holds the reins on the chin in this case of Texas.

It is inequitable. The small homeowner not only carries a disproportionate share of the insurance burden, but he pays for protection he doesn't get, in the face of wind and hail storm loss.

Take the hail storm we had here several weeks ago. Home owners with large roof areas and commercial building owners who suffered roof damage individually collected hundreds of dollars. But the little fellow, living in a GI house, was lucky if he could salvage an insulting \$10 or \$20 after his \$100 deduction.

His insurance agent couldn't be blamed for this. Neither could the adjuster. Policy terms are regulated by that shepherd of the public's interest, the Texas Insurance Commission.

In the past we have regarded the Insurance Commission as one of the state's most competent regulatory bodies. It has demonstrated time and time again that it is keenly aware of the public's interest first and the insurance companies' second. Yet the \$100 deductible is clearly discriminatory in effect, if not in intent.

Every policy, regardless of whether it is for \$5,000 or \$125,000 is burdened with form No. 200 which announces in reprinting that \$100 shall be deducted from the amount of loss on the insured property resulting from each windstorm or hailstorm which strikes it.—Thomas Thompson in the Amarillo Daily News.

### Bob Bratcher Now Preaching In Far East

Plainview.—"If you think it gets hot in Texas along in July and August, you should be out here right now," Bob Bratcher, Lubbock, sophomore from Wayland College, wrote May 2 from Manila, Philippine Islands. "The heat out here is terrific in Luneta, parts of which are just as modern as anything back in Plainview or Lubbock but in other parts it is horrible," he continued.

Bob, who left the South Plains in April on a 5-month preaching mission to the Orient, has had little time to devote to letter writing, but his brief letters have provided many interesting sidelights. Excerpts have been taken from those of several months.

Bob was sent by students, faculty and friends of Wayland College to the Orient. He has had little time to devote to letter writing, but his brief letters have provided many interesting sidelights. Excerpts have been taken from those of several months.

"Well, I know now how it feels to be in an air raid," he wrote two weeks later from Taipei, Formosa. "Last Friday (May 16) about 40 Red planes came over. I guess they just came over for observation. The air raid lasted for an hour." Since then he has written about two additional air raids.

"I thought we had it hard in Wayland but after I've seen how they pour it on these students out here, I think we've got it easy. I've got a really good interpreter. His name is Jerry Gas. He is a wonderful Christian.

"You can't imagine how people live out here. I'm staying with the Oz Quicks (Rev. and Mrs. Oswald Quick, Baptist missionaries to the Chinese.) "Of course, all the missionaries have fairly nice homes but you can't conceive how these Chinese have to live. Every drop of water must be boiled and you have to sleep under mosquito net; the mosquitos are so awful. The houses are mostly Japanese style, since the Japanese occupied this Chinese island for 50 years. The doors and partitions are of paper. The floors are covered with thick straw mats and, of course, you leave your shoes outside.

"The houses are not over 10 feet from the open sewers on each side of the street. You can't imagine the odor at times.

"There are not many cars out here. Men and women are the

burden bearers. I've seen men harnessed to carts pulling loads that only a horse or truck could pull back in the states.

"It is really a sobering experience just to be out here. You rarely don't see anything funny. These people know the joys and tragedies of life but they know the peace that Jesus has. God has really dealt with them spiritually since I've been here," he wrote Dr. Marshall in early June.

"The great need here is for the Chinese students who are studying in colleges like Wayland to complete their work quickly and return to work with their own people."

### Some Naval Reserve Officers May Resign

New Orleans.—If you're a naval reserve officer, this might affect you.

According to a Navy announcement in Washington, certain naval reserve officers who have been released to inactive duty since June 25, 1950 may resign.

Officers eligible are those who are 25 or over, who performed active duty (including enlisted service) of 90 days or more between December 7, 1941 and September 2, 1945, who have subsequently maintained continuous membership in the naval reserve, and have been released to inactive duty since June 25, 1950.

However, time served in government-sponsored training and educational programs may not be counted to fulfill the active duty requirement.

At the same time, the Navy announced that regular or reserve personnel, officer and enlisted, released or discharged from active duty since June 25, 1950, who become members of the organized reserve, shall not again be ordered to active duty involuntarily except in time of war or a national emergency hereafter declared by Congress.

Soil Conservation News

Bill Whitfill of Lockney, has recently harvested 10 acres of vetch, which yielded around 200 pounds of seed per acre.

Tornado Safety Rules Given By Bureau

Dallas. — The U. S. Commerce Department's Weather Bureau has issued a bulletin giving tornado safety rules.

It contains such pointers as: If you're in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Given no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine.

If in a city or town, seek shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building. Stay away from windows. In homes, the southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greatest safety.

The publication points out that the big storms are most apt to appear between 3 and 7 p. m., but "don't depend on it!"

How to recognize a tornado by its cloud formations is also explained.

Says Ernest Tutt, Commerce Department director for four states: "Better stop in at your nearest Commerce office and get a free copy of this tornado information before the next big blow."

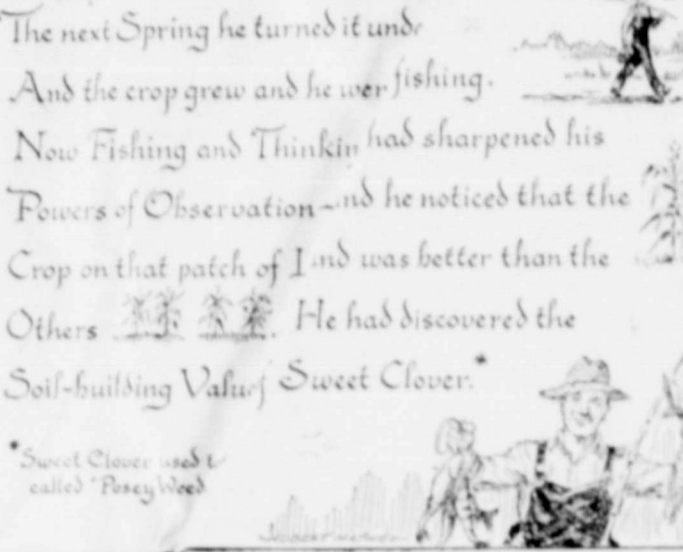

Most Adults Have Had Polio

Austin. — It is believed that the majority of adults have at one time been infected by the virus of poliomyelitis, usually without manifestations, says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. A view of the above it is expected that most of the recognized cases will be among children.

Only a small portion of infected persons are clinically recognizable. When symptoms are manifested, they usually comprise an acute illness with fever, headache, and almost always a characteristic stiffness of the neck and spine. Some degree of paralysis may or may not occur during the first few days of illness.

During the poliomyelitis season the following measures are recommended:

- 1. Insist upon safe waste disposal so that human excreta is not exposed to disease transmitting vectors.
2. Insist on elimination of fly breeding sources and do not depend upon community wide airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for basic sanitation.
3. Food supplies, including milk, must be protected against contamination.
4. Always demand safe water for drinking or swimming pools.
5. Insist that garbage be kept in covered containers and disposed of by incineration or sanitary fill.
6. Eliminate all insanitary conditions on your own premises.
7. Practice good personal hygiene, with particular attention to personal cleanliness.
8. Avoid excessive physical strain during poliomyelitis season.
9. Isolation in bed of all children with fever depending diagnosis by physician.

in Texas

**BAR GIVES TIPS ON JURY SERVICE**

Thousands of Texans are called each year as prospective jurors in our many state and federal courts. When chosen to serve, very few of these violate their oath with intentional misconduct. But honest mistakes have all too frequently brought the sincerity and ethics of an individual juror into question. Usually such errors arise from his misunderstanding of his function as a juror—for the juror is judge of the facts in the case before it.

Like Caesar's wife, the juror must not only avoid wrong, but must also avoid any appearance of wrong. Otherwise, his integrity and honor may be brought into question by actions which are actually innocent but appear censurable to those who view them by observing the following simple suggestions: the juror may be sure he is maintaining the highest of ethics, in which no possible fault may be found by others:

Hold yourself aloof from all persons (except other jurors) in any way connected with the trial of the case. That means that you should not mingle with nor talk to the lawyers, witnesses, parties nor the judge, even though the discussion is wholly unrelated to the trial.

Do not discuss the case nor permit others to mention it to you or in your presence during the trial. If anyone insists upon talking about the case after you have explained to him that you are a juror and must not listen, report the matter to the judge immediately.

Do not commence your deliberations until you have heard all the evidence from both sides, the argument of the lawyers, and the court's charge. You should not mention the case except in

the jury room when all other jurors are present. Do not become a private investigator. All properly admissible evidence will be brought before you. Do not try to search out additional facts you believe to have been omitted. Do not even guess or speculate about facts not in evidence.

Be attentive to the evidence as it is presented. If you are to properly aid the other jurors in settling the fact questions, it will be necessary to listen carefully to all evidence presented.

Do not guess at the judge's opinion of the facts. You are the judge of the facts. He is not allowed and will not try to invade your presence. His rulings on admissibility of evidence reflect no ideas or opinions on any fact question.

You should not mention or discuss your own personal experiences, or any knowledge that you may have of similar transactions. If you should disclose such information to others serving on a jury, the court would have to grant a new trial.

Accept no favors from and bestow no favors upon any person interested in the trial. However innocent the conduct may be, it will raise doubts in otherwise undoubting minds, and may even be subject to more serious insinuations and charges.

When in doubt ask the judge. If you are in doubt about your rights or duties as a juror, you should not ask anyone but the judge for information.
