LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Del Rio, Texas
August 24, 1952

Dear Mr. Hays:

Enclosed is a letter sent to us through mistake I'm sure — wrong name—right address for us. You will remember I'm sure that we renewed our subscrip- tion for 2 years just recently. We have been receiving two cop- ies each week of the Lockney Beacon which, too I'm sure is an oversight on someones part, but it surely makes it convenient for us as Edwin and I are both eager to read the happenings at home. If he gets the paper out of the post office I have to wait until he finishes reading every word and I surely get impatient waiting my turn. Ha!

The weather continues to be hot. For 22 days in row the temp- erature has been above the 100 mark. There seems to be no relief in sight either. I keep asking when it will begin to cool off. Some say it will be the last of October and others say "Oh, a- bout January", so I don't really know.

We plan to make a flying trip home over the Labor Day week- end, but it will be a busy week end as we have to make some arrangements about our house in Amarillo. The service man who was living in it was trans- ferred.

The boys and I were home the first week in August but I didn't get to see anyone hardly. Time went by so fast, and we had to get back here to have the cast removed from Macks arm on August 10. Mack fell from the shoulders of one of his playmates and broke his arm right in the elbow. That happened July 10. That same day Edwin was stung by a scorpion on the end of the first two fingers on his right hand. It hurt him pretty badly for a few minutes then he began to feel numb all over. His tongue got thick and he didn't have any taste for about 24 hours. Macks arm seems to be all

right. He has had to exercise it quite a lot to get it straightened out. He is using it fairly well now, so we believe it will be all right. The Dr. said it was a pretty bad break and was dislocated too.

When I was home, several people asked me if I planned to teach and I said "No" and didn't really want to, but now my plans are all changed. I will have either third or fourth grade in the West End Elementary school. I put my application in last spring for substitute teaching. Del Rio is just like every other town I suppose — an overflow of chil- dren and not enough teachers.

This one thing I want to tell you and then I shall close. The water supply for Del Rio comes from the third largest spring in the state of Texas. Not too long ago we drove out to the spring and pump house and the care taker told us that at that moment 750 thousand gallons of water was being pumped per minute and the spring was still bubbling on. In spite of all the hot weather and no rain, we have never had to cut down on our use of water. A friend of mine whose mother lives in San Angelo says the water situation there is critical. They expect at any moment to have to start buy- ing their drinking water unless this heat lets up and they get some rain.

Tell all our friends "Hello" and we are interested in hearing from them and about them through the Lockney Beacon.

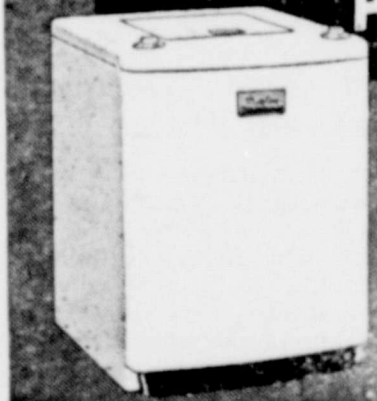

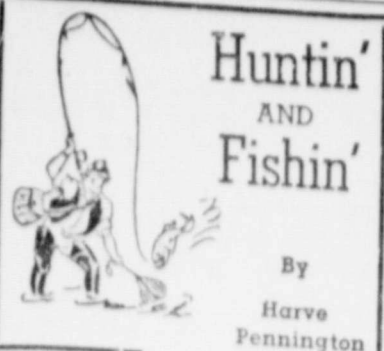

Huntin' AND Fishin'
By Harve Pennington

When the Kentucky reel makers, Meek and Milam, started the so-called bait casting reel on its way to fame they probably had no idea what a tremendous industry they had founded, nor how wide would be the recognition this method of fishing would inspire. Today bait casting with the typical quadruple multiplying reel and 5 and 5½ foot rod is very nearly universal throughout the nation. Originally used entirely in bass fishing, the bait casting method has been carried into almost every fishing field.

The first bait casting reels were small specimens of the watchmaker's art and would spool only 50 yards of line. They originated in Kentucky and were meant for fishing in the small streams and brooks of that state. The earliest bait casting rods were up to eight feet in length and were first made of bamboo and of various solid woods. Later seamed, tubular steel rods came into the market and the first advance was made in mass production of bait casting items.

With the founding of the bait casting plug by Jim Heddon in the early 1900's the upward swing in interest in this manner of fishing was assured. From 8 feet in length the bait casting rod dropped to three feet. All casting done during the early days of the bait casting rod was by what is known variously as the side cast or side swipe. For this purpose it was thought that the short rod was the most desirable, and operated on the theory that the rod must be short and, in fact, could not be too short. Just when the overhead cast was introduced is difficult to say. The formation of casting clubs no doubt had much to do with the trend toward perfecting the cast. It was found that the short rod have grave faults in overhead casting that were only remedied when the bait casting rod was stepped up in length. At first these rods went up to 6½ and 7 feet but later they dropped down to 5 and 5½ feet, in which two lengths approximately 95 per cent of the bait casting rods now in use are found.

Dr. Dobson To Teach Evening Bible Course

Plainview. — Dr. R. L. Dobson, chairman of Wayland College's division of Bible and religion, will again teach an evening course in Bible for the benefit of adults who need further training but cannot enroll in regular classes. The class will meet from 7 to 9 o'clock, Thursday evenings.

The course chosen is Bible 123, New Testament History, because of demand from students taking Bible 113, Old Testament History, under Dr. Dobson last spring. Students from Lubbock, Muleshoe and Plainview were enrolled in Wayland's first experience in adult education in evening classes.

This class is open to all adults who are not regularly enrolled in day classes at Wayland. It may be taken for credit of three hours at regular credit hour charge. However adults who wish to take it to help them with Sunday School classes or merely for their own appreciation and understanding of the Bible but do not desire college credit may audit the course at the nominal charge of \$10 for the 18 week course. They will not be required to take examinations.

Registration will be held at the first class meeting, Thursday, Sept. 11, according to Mrs. Roy Boles, registrar.

Many Improvements Made At Wayland During Summer

Plainview. — When the students return to Wayland College for registration, Sept. 8, they can parody a popular song by singing, "There've Been Some Changes Made," when they see all the new features and all the refurbishing and renovating that has gone on in their absence from the campus. Aside from the \$60,000 that has gone into the new residence hall for young women, some \$10,000 has been spent on renovations and landscaping.

Agnes Mays Dormitory, which will house 34 young women and their counselor, is nearing completion at a cost of approximately \$50,000 for the building and \$10,000 for the furnishings.

Since spring, Matador Hall, the oldest residence hall for young women, has had a face lifting, which began by the rebuilding of the stairways in the parlor, refinishing floors, painting the woodwork and hanging new draperies. This summer six

rooms have been repainted, three floors and all showers refinished. Three rooms have been given new furniture.

The President's home has been painted and repaired and three staff cottages have been repainted and repaired and sidewalks have been laid for two of the houses on West St.

The Science Building has been repainted, a new chemistry office has been built and the lobby textured and painted. Three new classrooms have been added on third floor of Administration Building, replacing dormitory space.

Two tennis courts were poured in the spring and backstops have now been completed and ground around them leveled. Landscaping is underway around C. C. Slaughter Memorial Center and much work done on the campus in general. The lawn around Agnes Mays Dormitory has been seeded.

All single trailers have been sold and the grounds where they stood have been cleared. Two old storage sheds, landmarks on the back campus, will be moved before school opens. A central warehouse area is being created on Utica street, with board fence enclosing machinery and materials which will not fit into warehouses.

In Administration Building, a new central telephone system is being set up with the latest Western Electric switchboard equipment.

The 1952 Senior Class donated a directory for Administration Building and this will be hung in the front lobby. Visitors and staff will have no difficulty in locating all employees when this is in place.

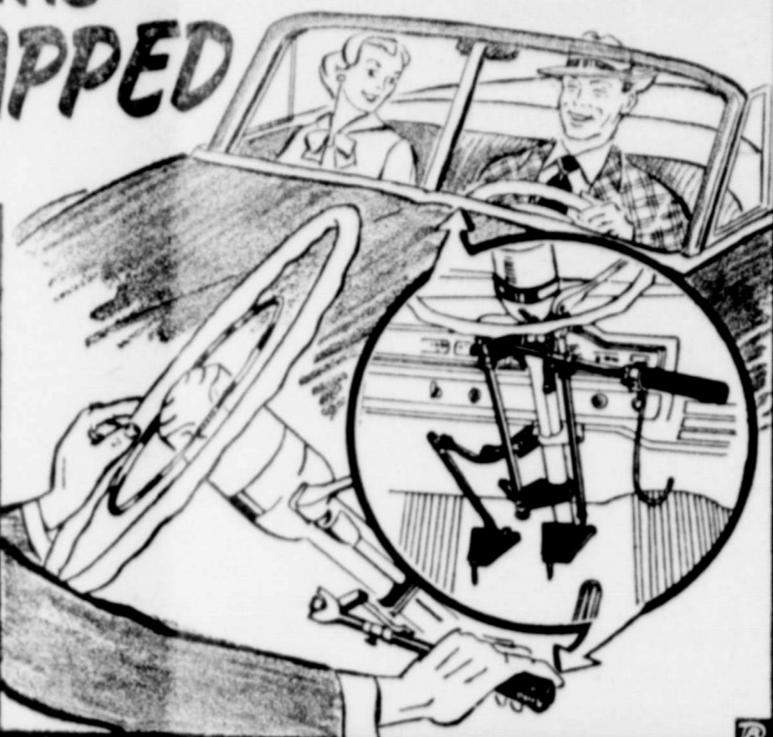
