

# TV D'monstration Shown To Rotary

Coaxial cable and microway radio relay, the two "Communications trains" which are bring ing network television to Texas. were demonstrated to members of Lockney Rotary Club last Fri day by Don Hanson of South western Bell Telephone Comp

Hanson demonstrated a min iature coaxial cable which "piped" an image several feet to a television receiver. He showed a cross-section of the large cable which contained eight pencil sized copper tubes. Each pair of tubes can handle 600 telephone calls or two television programs, he said. Coaxial cable is used to provide a TX link between Dallas and Houston, according to Han-

Radio relay was demonstrated by transmitting a picture between two small microwave towprogram to Fort Worth and San Antonio from Dallas, where they are picked up from the transcontinental coaxial cable. The large towers are about 30 miles apart and relay TV signals along a line-of sight path. These telephone calls and two television programs at the same time the speaker said.

Explaining the telephone company's connection with television, Hanson said: "We're like the railroads down in the Valley. They don't grow the fruit or sell it. They just haul it. We don't produce TV programs or put them on the air. We just transmit them between stations in differ





#### Read This From Wes Izzard's Column In The Amarillo Daily News!

A RETIRED COTTON FARMER from Wise County has handed me a copy of an editorial from a

Texas cotton-county newspaper. "Run this," he said. "I'm getting tired of a lot of city people and politicians who never grow a bale of cotton talking about 5-cent cotton and 2-bit wheat as a political issue.

The editorial was written by T. Glenn Doss, who runs the Whitewright (Grayson County) Sun. It follows:

Speaker Sam Raybuin is quot. ed by daily newspapers as saying the "present economic s.atus of Texas 's a result of the Demoeratic administration."

Sun editor has been voting the many years, but Sun editor is a stickler for the truth, whether it be in politics or something else. So, let's have the facts.

In the 1930 November election. the Republicans, in power for 10 years, lost control of Congress, although retaining Herbert Hoo. ver as President. The Democrats organized the House in March. 1931, and elected John Nance Garner of Texas as speaker, in which capacity he served until he became Vice-President in

So you see, it wasn't a Republican administration in 1931 and 1932, even with a Republican serving as President.

Mr. Rayburn has had much to say over the last 20 years about 5 cent cotton under the Hoover administration. Let's see what

the record says. In 1930, the last year this country had a Republican House and Senate and President, cotton sold in Whitewright the first week in September at 191/2 cents per pound, and cottonseed at \$27 per ton, according to the record as

published in The Sun In September, 1931, six months after the Republicans lost control of Congress, cotton sold at Whitewright at 6.2 cents a pound and

cottonseed at \$10 per ton. In September, 1932, still under the Democratic-controlled Congress, cotton sold in Whitewright at 7 cents per pound and cottonseed at \$10.50 per ton.

In 1933 the Democrats also took over the Presidency

On Sept. 7, 1939, six years after Roosevelt became President and gave the nation the New Deal Whitewright had ginned 2,085 bales of cotton, and buyers were paying 81/2 cents per pound for cotton and \$16 per ton for seed. The Sun of that date quoted other farm products prices in Whitewright as follows: Corn. 50 cents per bushel, and oats, 35 cents per bushel.

In 1952 we are in an inflated condition an a false appearance of prosperity due to wa spending. In spite of big incomes, high cos of living and federal taxes make it impos sible to buy a farm home at present price and pay for it - a condition that did not on tain in the 1930's.

Sam Rayburn and other New Dealers blow about our prosperity and ignore and re fuse to mention high taxes and inflation and that the present administration is run ning the country in the red at a tremendous rate each year without making any effort whatever to economize.

There are many other reasons why we want a change in the administration, not to mention Trumanism and the Tidelands. Gov. Stevenson's juggling of figures about the Tidelands doesn't do away with the facts that they have belonged to Texas for la years and now the Federal government is trying to confiscate them as they will everything else we own unless we kick the rascals out.

Don't be fooled by the cry about the depression. The administration is looking for suckers. We've been suckers long enough Let's change on November 4th.

So eight years after the Republicans lost control of Congress and six years after a Democrat became President, cotton and cottonseed prices in Whitewright were less than they were the last year under a full Republican administration, 1930.

All of which leads up to the fact that in spite of all the New Deal could do after six years, it took World War II to restore prosperity, and it took the Korean War and preparations for World War III to maintain it.

If Mr. Rayburn or anybody else tells you otherwise, he is only trying to fool you. If this war and preparations for war go on indefinitely, this false prosperity will also go on indefinite-

And that is the real present economic status of Texas and the rest of the nation: A false prosperity paid for with the blood and sacrifices of our fighting men and a mortgage on the camings of this and future genera-


