A STATEMENT BY

SENATOR RICHARD B. RUSSELL

OF GEORGIA

THIS IS THE MAN GOV. SHIVERS AND THE TEXAS DELEGA-TION VOTED FOR IN CHICAGO THROUGHOUT THE DEMO-CRATIC CONVENTION

As the campaign for the Presidency approaches a decision, it becomes more and more evident that I was correct in the prediction I made in August that Governor Stevenson and Senator Sparkman will be elected by one of the largest majorities given a National Ticket in recent years.

General Eisenhower's evident confusion in his efforts to grapple with vital political ssues has clearly demonstrated to the American people the grave danger of placing our government in the hands of a military man who is totally unfamiliar with the American civilian thinking and the laws and policies which control our domestic way of life. No military career, however great, can be a substitute for familiarity with the operation of a government which traditionally and by law is dependent upon civilian control. Civilian control is all the more imperative in circumstances which make it necessary for us to maintain large military forces and devote two-thirds of the national budget to preparations for military defense.

As one who has admired General Eisenhower as a military leader, I have been bewildered by the endless contradictions of his political pronouncements. It would require a book to catalog them. Of course, it is difficult for him to bring forth the blueprint for his early classic, "our whole program must bring on idealistic approach for every problem

Shortly after his nomination, he declared: "The Soviet threat is no more to be feared than a pollywog swimming down a muddy creek." Since that statement, he has devoted much time to stressing the fact that he is the best qualified man to deal with the ominous threat of world communism he had likened to a pollywog.

Shortly after stating that he did not understand the term "Farm Parity," he assured the American farmer of 100% parity for all the products of his toil. As one who has devoted a large part of his legislative service to overcoming Republican opposition to fair farm legislation, I have vainly awaited an endorsement of this last farm statement from General Eisenhower's Republican Congressional supporters. I have failed to see where one of them has disclaimed their record of opposition to the soil conservation program and to the laws which enable the farmers to have some idea when they plant their crops what they will receive from their harvest.

On those days when General Eisenhower decides to support collective security in the field of foreign relations, he is deserted by the Republican leaders in the Congress who will direct legislation in that body and whose record stamp them as isolationists.

The American voters are thinking for themselves in 1952. Neither the bedlam of this campaign nor the military glamour of the Republican candidate will confuse them. They will go to the polls in the greatest number in our history on November 4 to maintain in power the party of the people. They will protect the social, political, and economic gains of the past 20 years. They will not be beguiled by the promises of an easy road to National Security nor risk the future of this country to hawkers of painless means to stop the march of communism. They will not gamble with the future of their children.

It is well known that I do not subscribe to every plank in the Democratic Platform nor agree with all of the views of our party's Presidential candidate. I am convinced, however, that Governor Stevenson has the potentialities which can make him one of the greatest Presidents who has ever served our country. With the support and prayers of the American people and the aid of the Almighty he devoutly worships, he will see this nation safely through the dangers of today's world.



MEDITATION

SCRIPTURAL WORSHIP What Day?

The Sabbath day was given to Israel because of the deliverance from Egypt. Deut. 5:15. The Sabbath day is or was Saturday. Some today refer to Sunday as being the Sabbath: if it is dear friends I have been unable to find in the pages of Divine writings where God ever changed it from Saturday (the seventh day). Paul states in the Colossian letter that the sabbath day was just a shadow of things to come. Col. 2:16-17.

The Lord's day is the first day of the week. This is the day that our Savior rose from the dead. Inc. 20:1, Luke 24:1. This is the day that Jesus met with the disciples. Jno. 20:19, 26. The church of Christ was established on this day. Acts 2:1-4 (It was established on Pentecost and Pentecost always came on the first day of the week (Sunday). Read Lev. 23:15-18. This is the day when the church of the New Testament met together to worship. Acts 20:7. This is the day that Paul (by the Spirit) commanded the church at Corinth to "lay by in store." I Cor. 16:1-2.

We reach the conclusion that the first day of the week or Sunday is the day for us to come together to fulfill all five acts of Worship. Namely:

- 1. To partake of the Lord's Supper. Acts 20:7. I Cor.
- 2. To sing. Col. 3:16, Eph. 5:19 (Amos said "Woe . . unto them that invent to themselves instruments of music, like David.") Amos 6:5.
 - 3. To pray. Acts 2:42. I Tim. 2:1-8.
- 4. To give as God has prospered us (Not a 10% as under the Old Law but as God has prospered us).
 - 5. To teach. Acts 2:42, Acts 20:7.

All of these things are necessary upon the first day of the week to constitute Scriptural worship. If we leave out one then we are leaving out part of what the scriptures say and therefore make it unscriptural worship.

Those who teach that "their church" is not essential cannot press this matter of assembling together on the first day of every week. But the Church of the new Testament taught that it was important to come together to worship God in His appointed way. Notice Heb. 10:25-26.



Grocers Must Display Ceiling Prices By Nov. 3

Floyd County will begin displaying official OPS ceiling price posters on November 3 in an extension of the Office of Price Stabilization's nation-wide "community food pricing" program.

The announcement was made in Dallas by Frank C. Tomlinson, OPS regional food and restaurant branch chief, who added that the posters are now being printed and will be mailed in sufficient time to be posted by grocers before the deadline date.

On the same date, the OPS grocery price posting program will be extended to 179 counties in Texas, covering the entire state. Since September 29, "community pricing" has been in effect in a 72-county area in the northern half of Texas, and in the three south Texas counties of Bexar, Harris and Galveston.

According to Tomlinson, the official charts which will be posted in this county and in most of West Texas, list uniform ceiling prices for some 450 food items. The posters basically are the same posters which have
