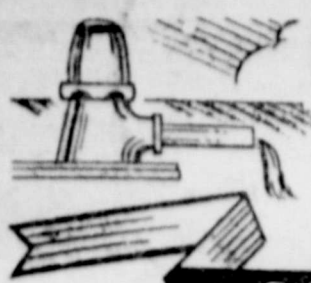
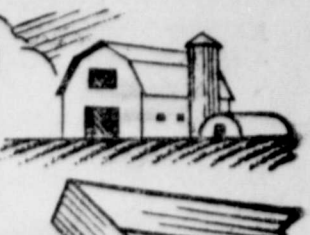

## Basketball Team Plays Floydada

The three Lockney High School basketball teams will play Floydada Teams in the local gym next Tuesday night starting at 6:30. Coach Curtis Kelley said this week it will be the first games of the season for the locals as well as for the Floydada teams.

The first game will be the Longhorn B squad against the Floydada B squad, the second game will be the Longhornettes against the Floydada girls and the final game will be between the Longhorn A string and the Floydada A string.

Kelley said this week that his B squad would be made up of freshmen and sophomore players and he wasn't sure who would start.

For the girls he has six forwards and any three of them may be starters he said. All are good and he doesn't plan to have any regular starters the entire season as far as forwards go, he said. They are Audrene Rhine, Ann Cooper, Elizabeth Handley, June Wiley, Nancy Holland and Mary Jo Bonner.

The starting guards will be Nell Cunyus, Pat Poteet, and Patsy Holland with Patsy Adams and Rosemary McDonald seeing a lot of action.

For the Longhorn A squad the starters will probably be Joe Taylor, center; Teddy Carthel and Jimmy Williams, forwards; Orland Gilbert and Jimmy Myers, guards. Several other boys will see considerable action also. Bill Sherman, only hold over starter from last year's team, is out for several weeks because of a knee operation but will probably be in shape to play by the first of the year.

## Mexican Admits Stealing Suits

Luis Alvarez, a Mexican farm laborer, confessed this week to stealing 15 suits from Brown's Cleaners & Clothiers here Monday night of last week. Alvarez told where he had disposed of the suits and officers were attempting to recover them this week.

Four of the suits have been returned and others are expected to be recovered this week. The Mexican sold nine of the suits to one man for \$100 and five of them to another for \$50, Mr. Brown was informed.

Alvarez forced open a back door and entered the local clothing store Monday night of last week. He was arrested late Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Pat Murphy and City Officer Olan Poteet after Mr. Brown had made a trip to Lubbock and found where he had attempted to sell the suits at two places. He maintained his innocence until early this week when he confessed the theft to District Attorney John Stapleton.

The Mexican has been working on a farm northeast of Lockney the past few months. He has a wife and five children and his father also makes his home with him, it was reported here.

## Ira H. Cox Is Buried Monday

Death of Ira H. Cox of this community came as a shock last Saturday night. Mr. Cox had not been in good health for some time but his sudden illness and death was unexpected.

Mr. Cox became seriously ill Friday and was carried to the Plainview Hospital. Death came Saturday about 10 p. m. His death was attributed to a heart ailment.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church here Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock conducted by Rev. N. S. Daniel, local pastor and Rev. R. H. Campbell of Plainview. Interment was in the Plainview Cemetery under the direction of Carter Funeral Home of Lockney.

Mr. Cox was born at Merit, Hunt County, on November 7, 1889. He was married to Miss Lena Owens on April 25, 1909 and resided at Farmersville and Merit until they came to Lockney in 1925. He had been a member of the Methodist Church for many years. He had farmed in this vicinity since moving here.

Cagle has served as deputy sheriff at Spur the past four years. His father, J. G. Gage lives in the Hillcrest community in eastern Floyd county and he has a brother also living in the same vicinity.

### Auto Accidents Continue Toll

Auto accidents continued to take a toll of Floyd County people with one dead and seven injured in accidents in this immediate vicinity within the past week. The previous week saw one killed and 17 injured in similar accidents in the Lockney area.

Last Thursday Mrs. T. V. McClure, 33, of Lone Star community, was killed instantly, three of her children and two other people were injured when two cars collided near the Seale Drive-In Theatre about three miles west of Lockney. The injured were Velma Faye McClure, 15, Garland McClure, 12, James Carroll McClure, 10, J. C. Dossey, 40, of Floydada and Lossey's 3-year-old niece, Freda Darlene Cork, who was riding with him.

The accident happened shortly before noon and the McClures were on their way to eat Thanksgiving dinner with relatives in the Erick community. They were traveling west and the Dossey car was going east.

Mr. McClure was not with his family but was enroute home from Plainview with Fred Paschal of Lockney when the two drove upon the scene of the wreck. Mr. McClure immediately returned to Plainview where the McClure children had been carried.

Most seriously injured was Garland McClure who received a badly broken leg and cuts and bruises. Velma Faye received a broken right arm and facial cuts and James Carroll was cut and bruised. Dossey was brought to the Lockney General Hospital where he was treated for a fractured jaw, cuts and bruising. He has several teeth missing. The little Cork girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willie D. Cork of Plainview, was not injured.

All had been dismissed from the hospital this week with the exception of Garland McClure.

### Wreck Tuesday Night

Another wreck Tuesday night of this week very near the same place injured two people and damaged the cars extensively. A car driven by Earle B. Johnston of Hart, traveling east, struck another car driven by A. N. Armstrong of Lockney as the Armstrong car attempted to turn

Santa Claus is coming to Lockney next Tuesday along with his reindeer and sled and will greet all the children of this area right on Lockney's Main Street. The Old Gentleman with his reindeer and sled will parade down Main Street from the south with the Lockney High School Band leading the way.

School will be dismissed from 9:45 until noon, school officials say, so that everyone may be on hand to greet Old Santa and his reindeer. The parade will be at 10 a. m.

This event will open the Christmas season in Lockney and all stores are getting ready for the big event by decorating. The street decorations will probably be up by this time too including colored lights and cedar stringers across Main Street.

The Santa Claus in this instance is Delton Barnett, Goldthwaite, a nephew of Hugh Carroll of Lockney.

The annual Christmas parade is always a thrill for the youngest generation because they get to see Santa Claus in all his benevolent glory. But for local kids this year's parade is on the "must" list because they'll be able to see Santa's reindeer — real ones.

This is brought about by Grady Carothers, Goldthwaite ranchman, who has spent five years building up an 18-head herd of reindeer and showing them off to kids at Christmas.

Carothers deer live in an air-conditioned barn on his ranch and are treated like the aristocrats they are. Because of Alaska's recent shortage of female reindeer, he couldn't bring down any females until last year. But the herd's on the natural increase already. Carothers is expecting a reindeer fawn in a few months, and when it is born it will be the first reindeer to be born in the Southern states.

The real-life reindeer are a little different from the mythical variety, but not less amazing. Their thick hair is hollow to provide insulation against the normal 5 to 50 degrees below zero of their native plains. When a reindeer walks his ankles pop and his tongue hangs out like a dog's.

This combination is even stranger: a reindeer grazes like a cow, has an intestinal tract much like a horse, and makes a noise like a pig.

These curious beasts live in 20 well-marked herds in north Alaska along the shores of the Arctic Ocean. Eskimos own all the herds but two, which are owned by the government and used to help stock Eskimo herds.

The Eskimos round up the deer by walking them down with trained Collie dogs, and sell them to Carothers at \$150 to \$250 a head. Carothers' load is limited, though, by his transportation. The big C-46s he flies the animals the 6,000 miles back to Texas in can only handle 18 at a time. The reindeer cost about \$1,000 per head delivered in Texas.

The Eskimos, a friendly, intelligent people, work happily in the sub-zero weather, and are invaluable to Carothers in helping him understand the animals, which are very gentle by the time they arrive in Texas.

The reindeer even seem to appreciate the wide-eyed attention they get at the parades, and are as noble as their fantasy brethren, Dancer, Prancer and the others. In any event, their arrival in town brings the same excitement to the air as the click of Dancer's hoofs on the rooftop Christmas Eve Night.

Due to the extremely cold weather only about 3,000 fans attended the game but a much larger crowd is expected to attend the game at Childress Friday if the weather holds. In fact, it was reported Wednesday that it looked like a sell-out crowd.

**Select And Save Seed Potatoes**

College Station. — Next year's sweet potato crop depends directly upon the quality of the seed potatoes used. As this year's crop is being graded at the farm or the commercial storage houses, careful attention should be given to selecting a supply of good seed potatoes.

Too often, says J. F. Rosborough, horticultural marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the cull and scrap potatoes are kept for seed. Seed of this type, he adds, cannot be expected to transmit good yielding qualities, desirable shape or good flesh color.

Seed potatoes need not be perfect specimens of the variety but should have a salmon flesh color, copper colored skin, be from three-fourths to two inches in diameter, three to four inches long and have a good shape, says

the specialist. from such potato ample food to and plant vigor are set in the spindly plants from seed potato "strings."

### Soil Conservation News

Mr. Gilbert L. Fawver was elected chairman of the board of supervisors of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District. This was the first meeting of the board since the election in the Southeast sub-division of the district. Mr. Fawver was re-elected to serve another term as supervisor in that part of the district.

Mr. W. F. Ferguson was chairman of the board last year but insisted that the duties should be passed around among the other members of the board.

Mr. Bert Bobbitt was elected vice-chairman, R. G. Dunlap was elected treasurer and Cecil Purcell secretary.

**Some Conservation Activities**  
Mr. Will Campbell, five miles west of Floydada, has about 18 acres of land which he had leveled in the summer. He now has it seeded to small grain.

Sam Baker, a neighbor of Mr. Campbell, has leveled about 47 acres of land which has a good deal of bindweed on it. He has seeded this area to irrigated pasture, and is attempting to whip the bindweed problem with a different approach. He plans to graze the bindweed in his pasture. Livestock seem to graze the bindweed pretty good, especially sheep.

Mr. J. P. Moss, four miles south of Floydada, has about 40 acres leveled. This area was put to wheat this fall. Soil Conservation Service technicians do not have a report from him, but no comment is needed to know it has been worth a lot to him in grazing for his sheep.

Bill Norman of Dougherty has leveled some of the flat land on his farm. He has seeded this 25 acres to grass. This planting has made remarkable growth.

Guy Goen of Aiken has done the largest leveling job completed this year. He has leveled 73 acres which he eventually plans to seed to a permanent irrigated pasture. However, it is his immediate plan to seed most of it to wheat this year. When he gets his wheat crop off he will go in and re-finish his leveling to get it in peak irrigating condition before seeding it to any type of permanent irrigated pasture.

Mr. Raymond Williams, who lives about three miles south of Floydada, has just completed about 32 acres of leveling. He plans to seed part of this area to wheat now and the remainder to Hubam clover in the spring. This will give Raymond an opportunity to come in and re-finish his leveling. By using Hubam clover as the following

crop he will replenish the organic material in his top soil; which has been removed in the process of leveling. The Hubam clover, being a tap rooted plant, will open the soil and make for better in-take.

This is probably the best system to follow after land has been leveled.

Durard Reves, of South Plains is in the process of leveling.

Robert Lee Smith is waiting for a contractor to get started on land which he hopes to get finished in 1952 program year.

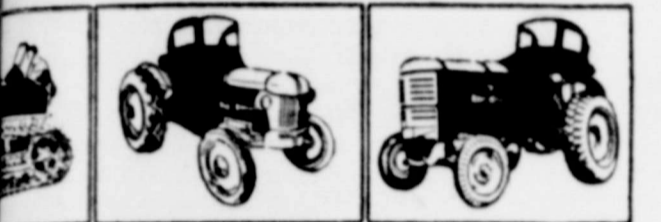

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**Wash Slipcovers — No Ironing**



IF YOU WANT to enjoy living with your furniture, select color-fast and pre-shrunk materials for slipcovers. Such fabrics offer an inexpensive remedy for the marks of busy young fingers or careless heels. It is soap and water.

Once you have had the satisfaction of seeing slipcovers emerge with renewed brightness from tub or washer, you're less likely to put off the next washing.

Before washing, brush loose dust and dirt from seams and pleats. If places, like chair arms, are particularly soiled, rub and brush them with soapy lather first. Then immerse the whole cover in a tub or washing machine of rich suds and warm water. Rinse thoroughly and wring. Hang on two clothes-lines set parallel a foot or more apart so the weight of the material is adequately supported and won't sag out of shape.

If slipcovers are put back on furniture while still slightly damp, only the pleated skirts have to be pre-ironed—and only if you're extra fussy, as box pleats can be finger pressed and smoothed nicely. That way, the covers also fit better because the fabric can be adjusted smoothly around corners and seams if it isn't quite dry. Stretch along the seams and slide fasteners to smooth out wrinkles and shape them to the cushions. Turning on the electric fan will hasten final drying.

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**"Silent Death" Is Dangerous To All**

Austin — "You can't see it . . . you can't smell it . . . you can't taste it and yet it can kill you," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent poisoner never knew their life was in danger. As others died, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so benumbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they couldn't walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage or automobile, are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burning, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cars so tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victim from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, keep heated rooms ventilated, do not leave gas heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not entirely close all the windows in your car and do not run your car in a closed garage.

Whether your stoves, heaters and your car serve you and

family usefully, capably and safely, or whether they become agencies of death depend upon how wisely you use them. Remember, ventilate at all times.

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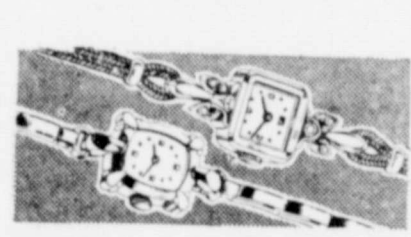
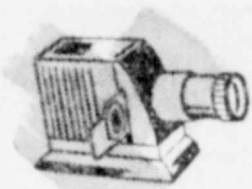

### Water Committee To Suggest Stop-Gap Legislation

Austin. — Texas moved closer to relief for its acute water problem with Governor Shivers' Statewide Water Committee of 101 members and four task committees meeting here November 19 to consider important "stop gap" legislation to be presented to the new legislature when it meets in January.

J. B. Thomas, Fort Worth utility executive and chairman of the Governor's committee, announced the four committees that are outlining proposed legislation will meet in Austin December 4 to co-ordinate their

findings. This composite report will be submitted to a steering committee which will meet here December 11. The steering group will pass on the final co-ordinated report of the task committees and a copy will be mailed to all the members of the Governor's committee.

A meeting of the general committee will be held and final action will be taken which will then be presented to Governor Shivers and the recommendations to be submitted to the legislature.

The four task committees and their chairmen are: First, one to recommend statutory changes in present laws to give more legal power to the present State Board of Water Engineers, headed by Guy C. Jackson of Anahuac; two, a committee to devise the best method of financ-

ing a state water control program, Victor Bouldin, Houston, chairman; three, to co-ordinate participation of state and federal agencies on Texas water projects, chairmanned by J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls and fourth, a committee to evolve a program for the control of pollution, headed by Mason Lockwood of Houston.

No effort will be made to write a new water code at the next legislative session, it was agreed. It was also the opinion of the committee that a long range program preceded by a two year survey of all approaches to the Texas water problem will be necessary before Texas gets the later legislation it needs and desires.

"We feel confident that our committee will be able to come up with immediate, necessary

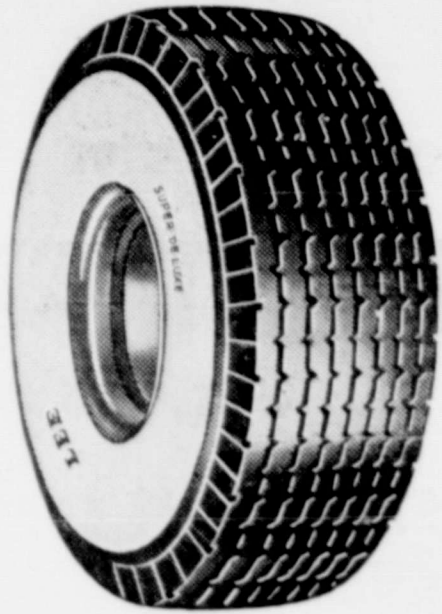

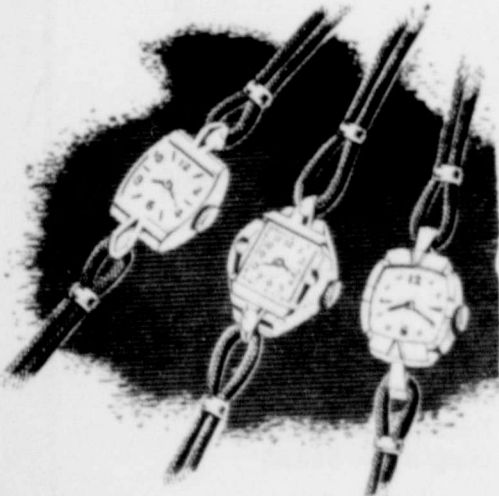

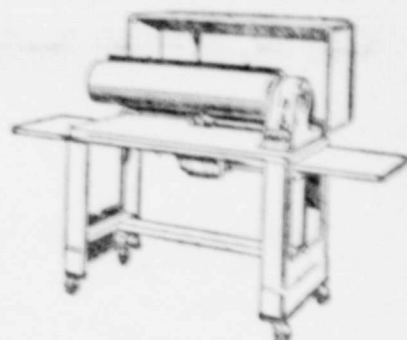
