Changes Basketball Rules To Be Put Into **Effect This Season**

There are some important changes in the basketball rules, one designed primarily to stop stalling and to cut out the rough stuff.

There also is a movement on foot to allow a player more fouls, which would appear to be defeating the purpose of the two rule changes that are supposed to dimish rough play.

The proposal to allow a player more fouls will be tested in Dallas in December when the second annual pre-season Southwest Conference Tournament is held. The Southwest Conference, which espoused the proposal that would allow a player three personal fouls per half instead of five for an entire game, got permission from the National Rules Committee to experiment in the annual tournament. Under this rule a player could make three fouls in a half and then come back and play the second half with privilege of making three more before being banished for good.

One important change specif ies that in the last three minutes of a game all personal fouls call for two free throws. Even if the player is not shoot make the foul more expensive ing at the goal when fouled Statistics show that a team there will be two free throws. shoots 60 per cent of its free This is done as a penalty for throws, thus the cost of a foul fouling late in the game.

There always has been a rule that an intentional foul calls for two free throws but it was never enforced - the officials didn't want to be responsible for determining if it was intentional. They claimed they never could see if it was.

The new rule, it is believed, will make the defensive team try to get the ball legally instead of deliberately fouling in

NEW YORK-The third winter of war means increased suffering for the South Korean people, Paul Comly French, executive director of CARE, reminded Americans in an appeal to continue their relief

About 10,400,000 persons, half the total population, are in dire need of food, warm clothing and blankets, according to reports from Dr. Charles R. Joy, CARE mission chief in Korea, Mr. French said, Relief packages provided through donations to CARE-for-KOREA, 20 Broad St., New York 5, N.Y., or any local office of the non-profit agency, are direct as-surances of these lifesaving sup-plies, he pointed out.

"Cities like Pusan and Seoul are swollen with refugees, who live in flimsy straw huts," Mr. French stated, "Orphaned children, clad in rags, roam the streets begging for food. Throughout the fall, families in rural areas were eating weeds and grass-but frozen fields do not yield even that surcease from hunger. "Starvation and cold must be




