Healthy Child Enjoys Life

Austin. — In speaking about the food requirements of a child enjoying maximum health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasized the importance of a well diet and stated that a healthy and well nourished child enjoys life because he is physically fit.

Stressing the importance of health of an adequate and well balanced diet, Dr. Cox stated further that when a child is in good health, his appetite is good, elimination regular and sleep is sound and untroubled.

"A child's appearance can usually help parents to judge the state of his health. A well nourished child has a rosy color and the padding of fat over the muscles of the body. Muscles are toned and strong and the gums firm and pink," Dr. Cox said.

That finicky appetite feeling after a little exercise indicates a possible malnutrition and the child should be referred to a family physician. Poor nutrition can also mean the beginning of an illness and possibly child does not require food as he is being urged.

Required as a diet for school child and those at home, Dr. Cox included milk, vegetables, eggs, meat, cheese, cereal and bread added that cod liver oil and other vitamin preparations are important in winter and early spring but should be prescribed by the family physician.

Registrants Must Comply With Law

(Article 10 of a series)
Ignorance of the law excuses no one.

That is something everybody has heard, and it applies to a draft board's deliberations and actions, as well as to any other agency set up to administer public law.

The law makes it the responsibility of the individual registrant to do everything that the law requires of him. The law requires him to do these things within a certain time limit. If he doesn't do them, he can lose many privileges and rights given him under the law.

"It is the duty of every man registered with a draft board to be alert and protect his rights under the law," advises Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service.

"Certainly it is the moral responsibility of parents to have their sons make themselves aware of the necessity of complying with all provisions of law and regulations," he says.

"It is too bad that registrants, parents, and employers often sleep on their rights until it is too late, or extremely difficult under our regulations, to do anything about their cases," he says.

General Wakefield says that sometimes a registrant, parent or an employer never request anything at the board until after an order to report for induction is issued.

Registered men, parents, and employers should begin to concern themselves about the Selective Service law and regulations immediately after men register. General Wakefield points out.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN DIVORCE AND ANNULMENT EXPLAINED

Notices of the filing of suits for divorce appear daily in our newspapers. Something has gone wrong with the marriage, and one of the spouses is asking the court to end the marriage by granting a divorce.

Occasionally, however, we read that someone is suing for an annulment of their marriage. The average reader may be inclined to say, "What is the difference?" Obviously the marriage is terminated if the court grants the petition, whether for divorce or annulment.

In the case of a divorce, the plaintiff (the person asking for an end to the marriage, whether the husband or wife) recognizes that the two parties involved were validly married and that there is an existing valid marriage.

The plaintiff alleges, though, that the other spouse has been guilty of some act which the law says constitutes a ground for divorce. If the divorce is granted, a marriage that actually exists is terminated legally by the court.

In effect, the court tells the couple that they were validly and legally married at one time, but no longer are.

Annulment Differs

In the case of an annulment, however, the plaintiff alleges that there never was a valid marriage in the first place because of some impediment of the parties or because of some fraud in its inception.

In this case the court must determine whether there ever was a valid marriage. If the court agrees with the plaintiff, the decree says in effect that the couple never was legally and validly married, and is not now.

Such a decree of annulment establishes for the public record the fact that the marriage was and is invalid, according to law. Children Protected

Whether the action takes the form of a divorce or an annulment, the decree will have no effect on the legitimacy of the couple's children. Our statutes provide that the children of couples whose marriages have been declared null shall nevertheless be legitimate.

Every divorce petition must set out the name, age, sex and residence of each child under 16 years of age born of the marriage involved. Then, before a divorce may be granted, the trial judge is required by law to inquire into the "surroundings and

circumstances" of each such child.

Having considered all the pertinent facts and circumstances, the court in granting a divorce may give the custody and education of the child to either the father or mother. The governing factor here is the judge's belief and findings with regard to the best interests of the child himself.

Either parent may be required to make periodical payments for the benefit of the child, and may be punished for contempt of court in event of failure to comply with the support order.

In the past some trouble has been experienced in enforcing support orders against parents who move out of the state, as a person cannot ordinarily be extradited for the purpose of answering a contempt of court charge. However, many states (including Texas) have recently passed laws providing for the reciprocal enforcement of such orders, which is bringing some relief in support cases.

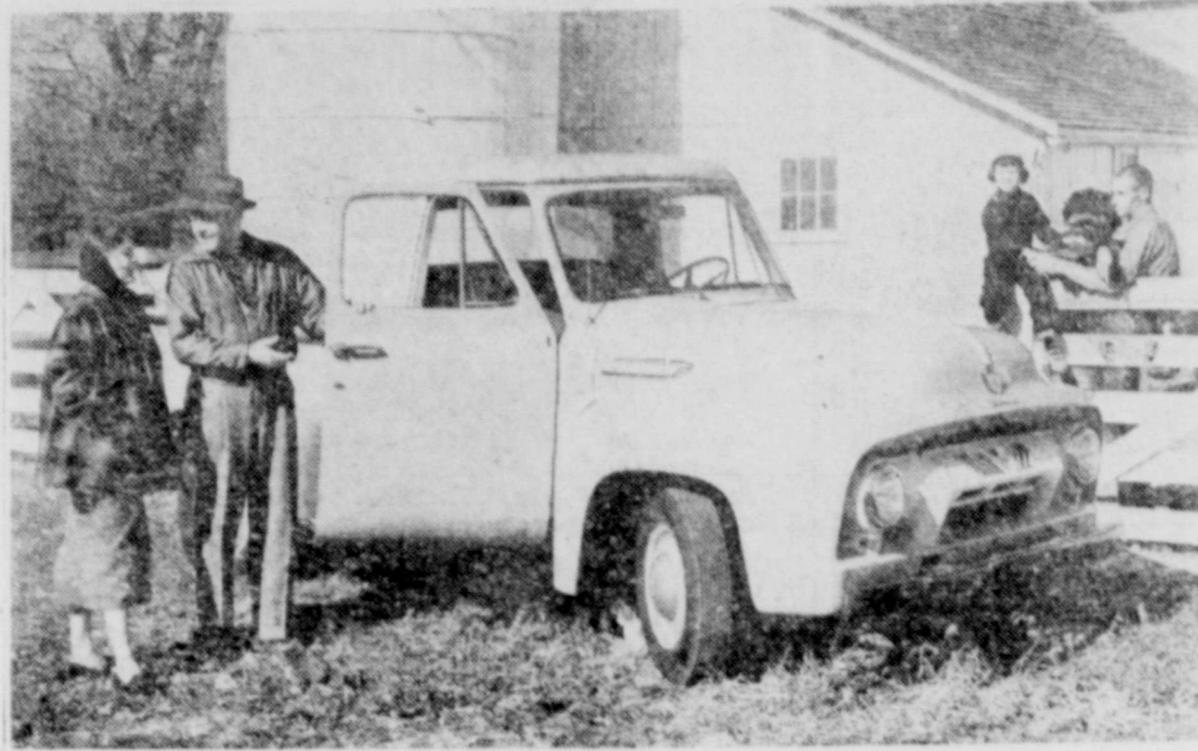

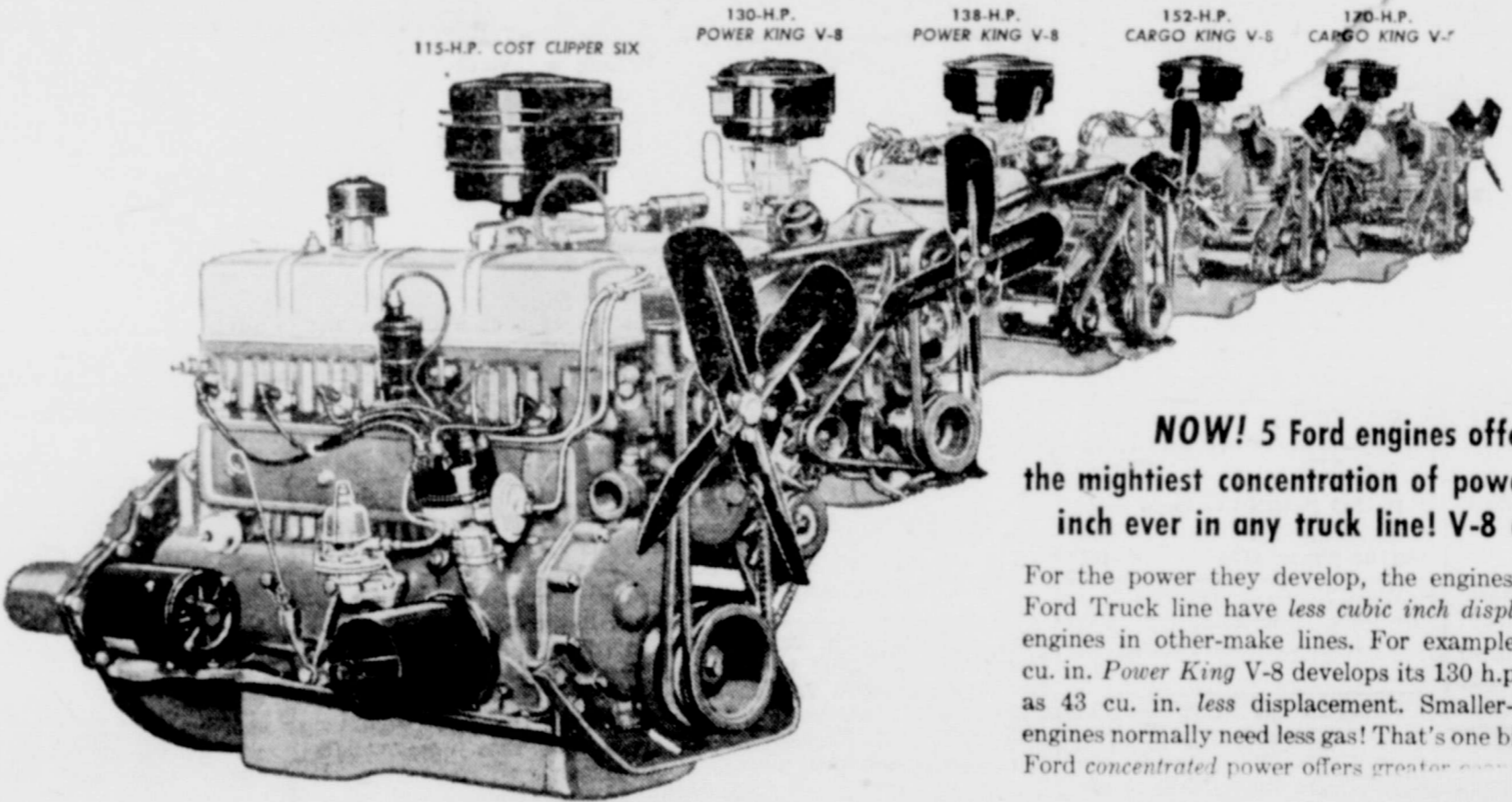

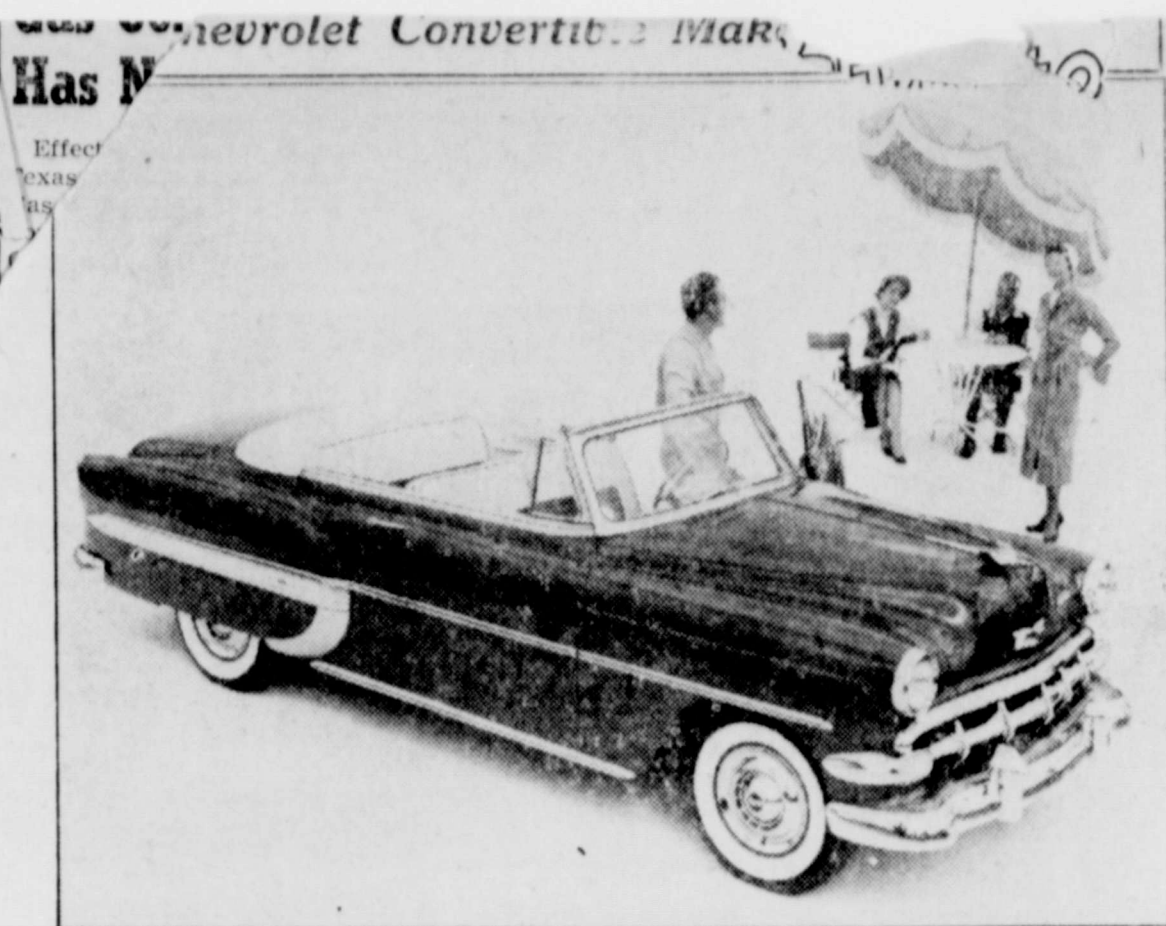

and other reliable sources indicates that more than 23,000 irrigation, industrial and irrigation wells are now in use. (This is a heavy toll on the underground supply.)

7. Permits have been issued for more than 2,000 additional wells since February 1.

8. The supply of underground water on the High Plains is not unlimited. It is one of the big aims of the district to keep individual ownership of the underground water. In other words, it is working to see that farmers retain ownership of the water beneath their lands.

Also, this district was organized to protect and recharge the underground reservoirs, as a part of a more lasting economy. It is the thinking of the officials of this district, said McFarland, that with the terrific demand being made on all resources today, and with the extreme growth of the population, it is highly possible that the water level on the High Plains could lower more rapidly than most persons expect.

"Everyone should take a part in water conservation activities," McFarland said, "because everyone is a user. They should participate in all of the conservation and recharge activities. The district will provide the technical knowledge and research, and the farmer, businessman and other water users can put it into effect," he said.

This organization was formed to help the population with its water problems. It employs men who know water and can get to the base of most problems. Also, it works with the Extension Service and Experiment Station personnel whose jobs concern the conservation of water.

The district is now serving the following counties: Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Lamb, Bailey, Farmer, Deaf Smith, Castro, Randall, Armstrong, Floyd, Lynn and Potter. Other counties which are within the boundaries of the district, but by local option, voted against participation are: Terry, Garza, Crosby, Dickens, Hale, Briscoe, Swisher and Oldham. These counties could become a part of the district if the

Plan Your Rose Garden Carefully

College Station. — Plan your rose garden for beauty and usefulness. Roses for cut flowers to use in the house or church decorations can be grown in the family garden. For beauty in the landscape the rose garden can be part of the outdoor living room.

Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says if roses are included in shrub plantings, place them a long wall or in front of screen plantings. However, roses require spraying and dusting more than other shrubs, so it is better to have the flowers growing in a bed for easier care.

Select rose plants adapted to the soil where you want them to grow. The neutral soil or slightly acid soil in many East Texas areas are especially productive for roses. Wherever you live soil tests can indicate the

and rose plants selected accordingly.

As for types of roses, remember the Red Radiance is the hardest and continuous bloomer. The Pink Radiance and the Shell Pink or Mrs. Charles Bell roses are also prolific in most soils. The Cecille Brunner, sometimes called a sweetheart rose, is a hardy plant that will grow into a large shrub. Other hardy roses are the red and pink Etoile de Hollande, the white Kaiserin Auguste Victoria, generally called K. A. V., the Hoover, Poinsettia and Talisman. The Poinsettia is a prolific red rose but has many thorns which makes it objectionable.

"Check with your nurseryman or rose grower to find out the best variety for your garden," the specialist adds. "He can assist you with other information about growing a successful rose garden."

Your Farm Problem
By Ezra Tait Benson
Secretary of Agriculture
Part II

Any effective solution of today's farm problem must provide methods for reducing our huge stockpile of agricultural commodities and at the same time prevent further burdensome accumulations.

Getting rid of these surpluses is only half of our problem. Even if we were able to bring them down to manageable proportions, we would soon acquire new hoards of wheat, corn, cotton and butter under the existing system of price supports. We already have approximately \$2.5 billions tied up in loans on farm commodities, in addition to an equal amount invested in goods which we own outright — \$5 billions in all. Our present program does not encourage the production shifts which are required to meet the changing market demands for various commodities. Of course, we could destroy some of our surpluses. Remember the government's potato fiasco of a few years ago? Or we might plow under every third row of cotton and kill little pigs. Remember the mid-1930's? Actually, we would not even consider such wasteful practices. We are attempting to move surplus food and fiber into foreign markets. World prices, how-

ever, are well below the figures at which we acquired these commodities under our price support operations. This means that we will be forced to take substantial losses on whatever we sell abroad. At the same time, we must avoid outright dumping, which would disrupt normal trade channels and bring down upon us the wrath of other friendly countries. There are these other alternatives: We can make a real effort to move surpluses out of warehouses and into stomachs by promoting greater public

research programs to uncover new uses for farm goods. We can throw our entire weight behind plans for expanding present foreign markets and finding new outlets overseas. Such methods, while they will not produce results as quickly as dumping or destroying food, offer a far sounder approach to our basic problems.

Along those lines, I can report that our promotional campaign, undertaken with the meat industry and food stores, is producing real results. We are consuming beef this year at the rate of 75 pounds per person, the highest in our history. Farm exports have turned upward since July 1, reflecting our emphasis upon expanding trade. Continued high employment at home, with national income at record levels, means a strong demand for farm goods in the United States. Our population is growing at a rate of more than 2,000,000 per year, which means that by 1975 there will be 200,000,000 Americans. Our future farm problems may involve questions of shortages, rather than surpluses. We cannot wait for an expanding population to solve our immediate troubles, however. We need an interim program to encourage shifts to other crops. We must halt further build-ups of government stockpiles now. Our urgent need is for a price support program which can be adjusted in terms of production and demand. One which will effectively reduce surpluses, with a minimum of government controls. That is our immediate goal. Such a program will be offered to Congress by this Administration in January. Custer's Last Stand took place in Montana.

Just how good a dairy year 1954 proves to be may depend on how well dairymen balance their herd operation. A well-fed, well-managed herd of well-bred dairy cows will yield the most milk per cow and at the lowest cost.

Crime Decline Is Noted Here

Floydada. — Infractions of the peace and dignity of the state in Floyd county, and in fact in all the four counties of the 110th judicial district, are continuing a steady rate of decline that began in 1949.

This trend, noted by District Attorney John B. Stapleton, is contrary to the experience of peace officers nation-wide. Edgar B. Hoover, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, is responsible for the statement that nationally there has been a steady increase in the ratio of crime, and he has emphasized the condition as regards juvenile delinquency.

The subject came up in connection with reports from the county and city officers that the Christmas of 1953 was the quietest in many years in all parts of Floyd county. At the court house Sheriff Cooper's office reported only one or two infractions of the misdemeanor type during the holidays.

"The rate of crime incidence has gradually declined in the 110th district for five years," Mr. Stapleton said. "Although the county has had many transients in this period and there has been an increase in population, not only has the ratio of crime decreased but also the actual number of offenses."

The decline was noticeable first in 1949. After 1947 and 1948 when there was considerable readjustment taking place incident to the last years of World War II, the crime ratio began going down. 1950 less than 1949, 1951 less than 1950, and so on.

Floydada Sailor Critically Injured

Floydada. — Parents of George (Dub) Hodge, Floydada sailor, were informed by telegram Monday that their son was critically injured in an auto accident in San Diego, Calif.

The Associated Press reported late Monday that Hodge was still unconscious and on the critical list from a skull fracture suffered when the car in which he was riding crashed into a power pole early this morning.
