Fair Association Fills Vacancies

The directors of the Floyd County Fair Association met on Thursday at the Floyd County court house to make first plans for the fall fair. Loyce Turner of Harmony community presided at the meeting.

Most of the meeting time was used in the appointment of three more directors for the board. The county was divided into eleven areas last year by the fair membership and a director was elected from eight of the areas. The board was then directed to fill the remaining vacancies. The areas in which there are no directors at this time are Lockney, Northeast Floyd County and South Central Floyd County.

Directors from other county areas are Chester Mitchell, Mrs. M. J. McNeill, Chester Carthel, Mrs. R. H. Tinsley, D. T. Mayo, Dean Walls, Bill Norman and Loyce Turner.

The board made recommendations for directors for areas where a vacancy exists and asked for reports at the next board meeting January 28.

Other business on Thursday was the appointment of D. T. Mayo and Bill Norman of the fair grounds and building committee, and a report that the association now has 188 members.

Miss Leila Petty, Floyd County Home Demonstration Agent and Bill Rodgers, County Agricultural Agent were also present at the meeting.

CARING FOR TOP BURNERS

HIGH SOUNDING TITLES

The Bible recognizes no classes or distinctions in the Lord's church. Jesus said: "All ye are brethren." (Matt. 23:8) Preachers are on the same level with other members, hence they need no titles of honor to distinguish them.

The desire for honor is nothing new in religion. Christ said to the disciples: "The Scribes and Pharisees . . . love the uppermost rooms at feasts, and the chief seats in the synagogues, and greetings in the markets, and to be called of men, Rabbi, Rabbi. But be not ye called Rabbi; for one is your Master, even Christ, and all ye are brethren. And call no man your Father upon the earth, for one is your Father who is in heaven. Neither be ye called Masters; for one is your Master, even Christ." (Matt. 23: 2-10.) The humble apostles would have frowned upon such titles as many preachers are wearing today. You will search the Bible in vain for such expressions as, "Father Peter," "Rabbi Paul," or "Doctor John." These inspired men were content to be known simply as "servants of God." We have no spiritual Superiors or Fathers in the church, hence Jesus said, "Call no man your Father upon the earth." Brazenly ignoring this simple command is certainly no exhibition of faith in Him.

One other title we should notice is, "Reverend." Of all the names of dignity that men arrogate to themselves, this one seems the most inappropriate. It is found only one time in our English Version, and refers to God. The Psalmist said: "He hath commanded His covenant forever: Holy and Reverend is His name." (Psalm 111:9.) Since the term "Reverend" is used only with reference to God, we profane it when we apply it to man. Few people would be so impuduous as to say, "Mister Jesus," yet they will say, "Reverend Jones." To affix a human title to Divinity is certainly no worse than to affix a Divine title to humanity.

Should not preachers strive to be holy and reverent? They should, and so should all members of the church. It is one thing to exhibit a measure of these qualities and something else to presumptuously use such terms as titles of honor. If preachers excel, let it be in consecration and service; and not in gloating over high sounding titles.

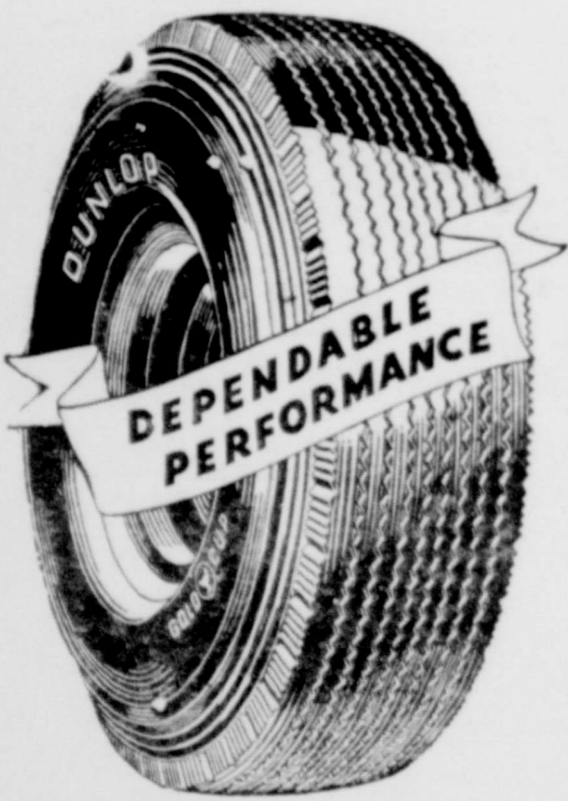

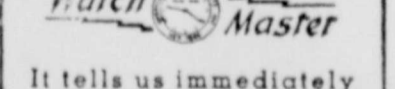

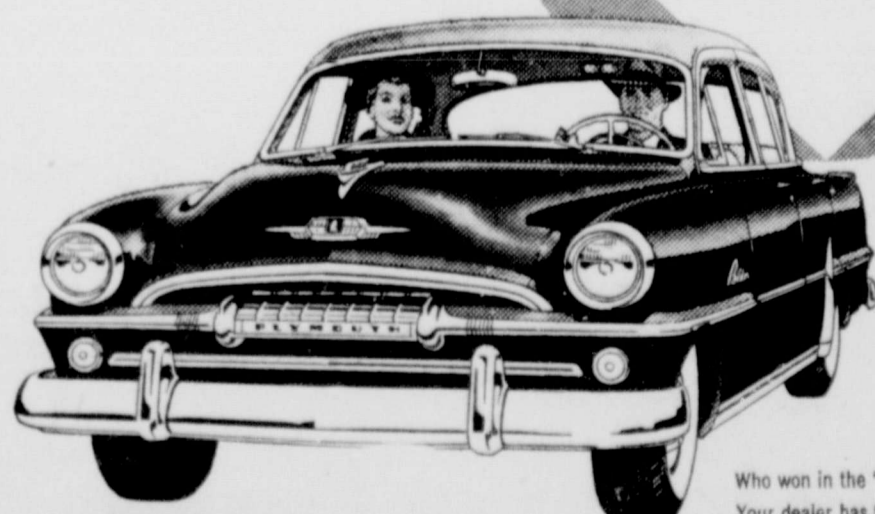
