#### THE MEANING OF CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

To be a member of the church (body) of Christ simply means to be possessed of, and controlled by, Christ. Christ owns the church by reason of having given himself for it; and he controls the church as his spiritual body by reason of having been made the head of it. (Eph. 5:23-25; Acts 20:38). You cannot belong to Christ without being a part of his possession, the church. Moreover you cannot be controlled by Christ without being a member of the body, the church, over which he exercises control. The hand belongs to the head of the physical body by reason of being a member of that body; and this same member is controlled by the head by reason of such membership. A hand or foot existing independent of membership in the physical bdy is as much a possibility as a member of Christ existing independent of membership in his spiritual body, the

In the natural world God created the water as a state of life for the fish. Following this he created the fish and placed it in the water, and the life of the fish depends upon its remaining in that state. Just so, in due course of time God created the church, or kingdom, as a state of spiritual life for man (See Eph. 2:15-16). The church is not, therefore, so much of an institution as it is a state or condition of spiritual life. Consider this fact. You cannot possess natural life without natural birth, that which introduces one to the natural family. You cannot possess spiritual life without being "born again," that which introduces one to the kingdom or church of Christ (John 3:3-5). This kingdom or church is referred to as "the family" of God. (Eph. 3:15). As it is impossible for one to be born naturally without becoming a member of the natural family, so it would be impossible for one to be "born again" without becoming a member of the spiritual family, the church. The denominational idea that one is "born again" and afterwards (when convenient) "joins the church" is not found in the New Testament, God's children are those who have been "born again," and those who have been "born again" were thereby introduced to God's family, the church. If those who teach otherwise be disposed to do so, we would be pleased to have them point out any error in our understanding of the meaning of membership in the Lord's church as expressed in this article. — Selected.
