

SHOULD CHRISTIANS DANCE?

A few years ago churches disciplined members for dancing, just as they did for drunkenness, and thieving. Even though the dance has not changed many have changed their attitude toward it. Under the guise of innocency it has made its way into many of our homes and schools, and is destined to destroy the purity of our young men and women. Many fathers and mothers are consenting to it by their silence. I believe that the harmful influence of the dance should be pointed out, and that good people should oppose it just as they do other evils.

Someone has offered twelve reasons why Christians should not dance. I pass them on to you without comment:

- 1. Dancing church members are considered hyprocrites by the world.
- 2. Three-fourths of the fallen girls in America attribute the beginning of their ruin to dancing.






