Most of the 4,500,000 acre feet of water which irrigated fields in 1953 was used on 1,703.923 acres of cotton and 860.625 acres of grain sorghum. 


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

THE CHRISTIAN PLATFORM

A political party has its platform, which is a statement of its rules and policy, and so does the church of the Lord. A brief outline of this platform is found in Paul's letter to the church of Ephesus. After exhorting them to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." he proclaims the oneness of God's plan. He said, "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling. one Lord, one faith, and one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all." (Eph. 4:3-6.) Men have not been satisfied with this platform, and have sought to modify it; yet it remains the same and will judge us in the last day.

The word "one" occurs seven times in this quotation. We hear no dissenting voice as the apostle affirms that there is "one God." Yes, there are "Lords many, and Gods many." In the city of Athens there were hundreds of Gods, yet there is only one true God who created us and made provisions for our salvation. All accept the statement that there is "one Lord." According to Jesus there were some among the heathen who sought to exercise lordship, but He said to the disciples, "so shall it not be among you." (Mk. 10:42, 43.) Some in our day are guilty of "lording it over God's heritage"; but there is one Lord Jesus Christ who is able to save, and guide us to Heaven. There is "one Spirit." We read of "evil spirits" and "spirits of demons": but there is one Holy Spirit the third person of the Godhead, and the revealer of God's plan. There is "one faith." This part of the platform is confusing to the mind that has been lead to believe in a multiplicity of faiths. There are creeds many, yet there is one true faith, the embodiment of the doctrine of Christ, revealed in the New Testament. There is "one baptism." When we look away from God's word, we see baptisms such as sprinkling, and pouring, oftentimes administered to infants without faith. But there is one true baptism for people today. It is immersion of the believer in water, for the remission of sins. (Acts 2:38; Rom. 6:3, 4.) There is "one hope." This is the expectation and desire of the heart based upon the promise of God.

In brief, the movement toward God is as follows: 1. Away from idols to the "one God." 2. Away from all ecclesiastical potentates, to the "one Lord." 3. Away from hunches and urges or presentiments; and back to the will of the "one Spirit." 4. Away from human creeds, to the "one faith." 5. Away from substituted baptisms, to the "one baptism" authorized by Christ. 6. Away from denominations to the "one body." 7. Away from all human expectations based on material powers, to the "one hope" of the heavenly calling.





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

The following has been released by Local Board No. 45, Selective Service System, for the information and guidance of young men graduating from high school, who may be interested in attending college: The fact that a registrant is classified into Class 1-A (A class available for service) does not necessarily mean that he will not be eligible to go to conege. Normally a registrant will not be reached may, If he meets the criteria as set forth in the selective service regulations, quality for a II-S classification (college student deferment). During the first year (and the summer months preceding) a registrant will probably be classified into class I-A. and, should he be reached for induction prior to completion of said first year he may qualify for a postponement of induction if he is a full time student doing satisfactory work. Contact your local draft board office to ascertain proper procedure necessary to request a student deferment, or a postponement of induction; also, requirements for a II-S classification.


