### Voters to pick local officials Saturday

# Absentee voting is brisk

Heavy absentee voting forecasts a good voter turnout for school, city and hospital district elections in Castro County Saturday, when polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

ABSENTEE voting ended Tuesday and was reported heavier than usual in Dimmitt, also for Hart and Nazareth school board elections. Only four absentee votes were cast in the Hart city elections where candidates for three places are all unopposed.

The highest number of absentee ballots were cast in the Dimmitt school board election with a total of 88. There were 64 absentee votes in the city elections and 57 for Plains Memorial Hospital board mem-

Two offices are to be filled in the City of Dimmitt. Mayor Elmer Youts is unopposed in his bid for re-election, but talk continues of a write-in campaign for Rev. Raphael Chen, pastor of the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church, although he denied the rumors in talking to a representative of the News last week, saying "I don't want to be mayor . . . I think Mayor Youts is doing a wonderful

IN THE other city race, for corporation court judge, incumbent L. G. Manning is opposed by Carmen Catano. Voting will be in the commissioners' room at the Dimmitt City Hall.

W. J. Hill, David Schaeffer and Deanne Clark are candidates for the Dimmitt Independent School District board, where three places are to be filled. The members whose terms expire, Charles Nutt, Donald Wright and Fred Brue-

gel Jr., are asking re-election. The school board election, also the hospital board election, will be held at Dimmitt Middle School. Noel Gollehon will serve as election judge.

HOSPITAL board candidates for three places are James Welch and Dan Nelson, seeking re-election, and Juanita Welch, Dr. Bill Murphy, Miguel Zuniga, Joe Bailey and Frank Wise. Dale Maxwell, whose term also ends this spring, is not a candidate.

Four have filed for two places on the Nazareth school board, where James Wilhelm and Edward Ramaekers are retiring. Voters will choose from Hubert Backus, Rita Book, Richard Hoelting and Jimmie Schulte. Twelve absentee votes

### Fund is started for injured boy

A fund has been started at the First State Bank in Dimmitt to help cover medical and hospital expenses for Leland Abbe, a Dimmitt High School freshman who lost part of two fingers on his right hand Thursday in an accident with a paper cutter in his office duplications class at the school.

AFTER emergency treatment, the youth was sent to a specialist at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. The fingers could not be replaced, and skin grafts were made to cover the stumps.

When efforts were made to notify Abbe's family, it was discovered that they are in dire financial need with four children and an elderly, ailing father at home. The children have been without their mother for about nine

The father's meager social security check is nearly all taken up with his medicines and medical costs. The oldest son at home is a junior in high school and is working half-days and Saturdays in the Agricultural Cooperative Training program through the school.

LELAND had been the cook for the family. There is another boy in high school and a girl in seventh grade. The father, J. D. Abbe, is in his 60's, has arthritis and has suffered a stroke. The family lives on a farm near

The family has no insurance and is having difficulty just meeting day-to-day ex-

being planned. LELAND was driven to Lubbock by Rev. William Summers of the Assembly of God, where the family attends regularly. Since his release from the hospital Monday, Leland has been staying with the Summers fam-

Mrs. Summers was instructed by the nurses in Lubbock on how to care for the damaged hand by soaking it in a solution four times a day. She said he will go back Monday for a check-up, and may be able to start back to school after the

spring break. 'They are a very proud family," said Rev. Summers. "They have refused any welfare or food stamps on principle. We have persuaded them, however, to accept help with these med-

ical expenses.' AT NOON Tuesday, \$400.21 was deposited in the fund from the collection jars at the high school. According to Rev. Summers, the hospital bill alone is \$640.

Bill Stephenson is the teacher of the duplications class where Leland was injured. His daughter, Jonette, is having a bake sale Saturday at Dimmitt Supermarket and encourages everyone to either bring a cake to sell or to come buy

Rev. Summers said people wishing to help in other ways besides cash may contact him. Some food and clothing for the family has already been collected. Any cash left over after the hospital expenses are taken care of will also go to the family's other needs.

OPTIMISM was expressed this week by Bob Binn, agricultural manager for Holly Sugar's Hereford plant, although he added that moisture conditions and irrigation water availability may prevent some growers in the area from planting all the sugarbeet acreage they desire this year.

"As a result, domestic beet sugar production may be down somewhat in 1977 despite more favorable economic outlook provided by recent events," Ginn said.

Legislative relief appears to be in sight for the sugarbeet industry after some rather dark days, Ginn said, basing his optimism on recent events in Washington, D.C.

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An Exceptional View

Special Education Supervisor Students with poor hearing seem to show more emotional stress and frustration than students with other types of handicapping conditions. Parents and teachers, all too often, are impatient with children whose hearing loss is in the mild or moderate range and undetected in the school age child. The label of "stubborn" or too engrossed in play to listen or try to talk takes its toll in social and personality development.

EVEN when the hearing defect is identified, society seems to lower its expectancy in academic and social development since communication is involved. This is communicated to the child with poor hearing and he responds, in many cases, with a loss of confidence and poor self-image.

Unfortunately, many children with hearing losses are behind other children in school progress. There is no evidence that hearing impairment is related to intelligence or educational achievement, but this handicap produces the "image" of retardation and results in "feelings" of social and psychological inadequacy in this type child. The use of hearing aids, which could help many children, has not been accepted by parents as have glasses for the visually handicapped. This condition is being overcome by great strides in the development of very efficient transistorized aids that are easy to wear and do not alter the appearance of the







Surviving are his wife, Veta; the daughter; a son, Max of Friona; three sisters, three brothers and three grandchildren.





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
