





The average annual production of American-type cottons outside this country in 1934-38 was 4,486,000 bales, the University study shows. The figure climbed to 7,759,000 bales in

1953-54.

Texas Cotton Getting are copying the U. S. growers policy of supplying large amounts of American-type cotton with relatively uniform fiber properties, an important factor in mass production of textiles.

That trend coupled with lower foreign-cotton prices is one of the reasons why world-market buyers apparently are taking Texas cotton only after exhausting sources of the same varieties grown outside the U.S., Research world cottons indicates foreign Scientist Joel H. Hembree warn-



Aphids or plant lice have been found on cotton in a number of fields over the area. Occasional medium to heavy infestations occurred in spots within a few fields. Such areas observed show a definite increase in beneficial insect population, but should be watched closely to determine whether or not the beneficial insects will effectively reduce the population.

Thrips have occurred in light nfestations in most fields. Oc. casional fields near wheat of Thrips migration to cotton car be expected to increase as adjacent host plants are destroyed or mature.

Fleahopper infestations in general have been very low to date. There are sufficient host plants to enable this insect to increase rapidly should favorable conditions exist.

False wireworms have caused damage to cotton in several fields in Borden, Garza, Howard and Swisher Counties. In the first three counties the larve damaged the root system, while in Swisher County the adult destroyed plants before or soon af
