## NEGRO SCHOOL PROBLEM TO BE CONSIDERED MONDAY NIGHT

The board of trustees of the Lockney school district will have a problem on their hands when they meet Monday night. What to do about a negro school house will be the chief matter for consideration.

The board has considered the proposition of utilizing the city auditorium for the negro school, partitioning it off in rooms and also providing for an auditorium. Some opposition has been heard to this plan and they have invited members of the City Park Committee, Claude Holley, president of the Chamber of Commerce, M. L. Brewer, president-elect of the Lions Club, Lloyd A. Wofford, president-elect of the Rotary Club, Mrs. W. C. Irons, president-elect of the RFPW Club, Mrs. Burl Holt, president-elect of the Parent-Teacher Association, and Edgar H. Hays of The Beacon, to meet with them in considering of the matter.

Their problem is this: The present negro school has 30 students enrolled. They now have two teachers and only two rooms in the school house with no other facilities. When the average daily attendance reaches 47 the state will then require the district to add another teacher. It will probably reach that point next school term.

The present location of the school house is very bad. It is a low place where mud gets very deep during a rain. Smoke and dirt from the bins and the alfalfa mill cover the school and the pupils.

Obviously it will be necessary to add on to the present building. It will be desirable to move it to a better location. The board is faced with the problem of whether to spend a considerable sum of money on the present building seeking to make it adequate when the local school may be forced into integration within the next few years, or to try to provide a better place for school for the colored students at the city auditorium with a considerably smaller expenditure of money.

Those opposing the use of the auditorium point out that the conversion to a colored school will bring about abandonment of the city park, on which a considerable amount of money has been spent probable abandonment of the swimming pool and the scout hut, all located on city auditorium grounds. They point out that the city the size of Lockney needs a park, that it is used often in the summer time by groups for picnics, for family reunions and other outdoor occasions, and that it definitely serves a community need.

Mr. Nicholas emphasized that the board did not want to take any action that would be opposed by a majority of the people.

That the board has a serious problem is obvious. No one has yet offered a solution that will please most of the people, it appears.

## VOTE ON CONSOLIDATION OF LOCKNEY-LONE STAR MAY 19

### Spotted Rains Cover Area

Rains of varying amounts covered this area Monday night, brightening crop prospects and breaking a dry spell of several months duration.

In Lockney the rainfall was generally around an inch and a quarter. It was heavier in some nearby areas and lighter in others. Also some hail fell in Lockney and in the area southwest of town, causing small damage to wheat. Over in the edge of Hale county some damage up to 50% was reported. C. T. Pope, living southwest of Lockney, had an undetermined amount of damage to his wheat.

Rainfall reports in the area included these: Jack Billington, 2 miles south of Lockney, 1.7 inches; Raymond Meriwether, on Silvertown highway, .8 of an inch; South Plains, 1.3 inches; L. L. Scott, north of Aiken, .4 of an inch; Forrest Mickey, Pleasant Valley community, 1 inch; Carl Ferguson, just northwest of town, 1.1 inches; Leslie Ferguson, 5 miles north, .5 inch; Red Childers, mile south of Brick, 1 inch; W. A. McLeod, northeast of own, 1 inch; Wade Steele, south Briscoe county, 7-8 inch; Bud McGowan, east of town, .5 inch; Raymond Rucker, Pleasant Valley community, 1.3 inches; Hall Ferguson, same area, 1.2 inches.

The rain was fairly general, extending over most of West Texas. Floydada received a half inch and Plainview about the same amount.

Probably less than half of the cotton acreage in this area had been planted. Those who had planted cotton are still hopeful that they can "scratch it up" and won't have to plant over. If the weather remains clear probably a lot more cotton will be put in the ground within the week.

The rains will be especially beneficial to wheat. This crop on dry land was suffering badly for lack of moisture. Agriculture officials report that around 25 percent of the wheat crop in Floyd County has been abandoned due to insect damage and drought. Irrigated wheat is looking good and some dry land wheat is still in good condition.

precinct convention day. This is really the only "grass roots" session of the Democratic party. In these precinct meetings the average man has his opportunity to say his piece. Of course, the question to be decided this year will be whether the convention will support Governor Shivers and his States rights program or Senator Johnson, who is the candidate of the so-called "loyalist" group of Democrats. Shivers contends that the "loyalists" want to sell the state out to the national Democratic party regardless of local interests while Johnson says that we must support the Democratic nominee regardless of who he may be and that any other course is treason. Both have been campaigning in an effort to sell their individual point of view to the people.

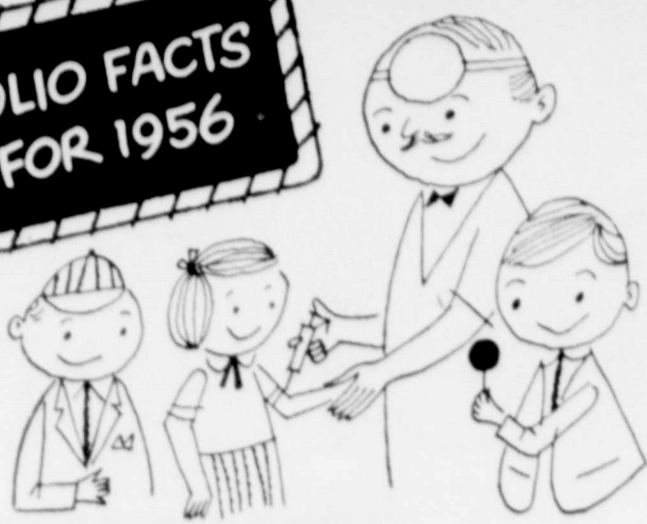
**PREDICTIONS** are hazardous at times, especially regarding political events, but we're pretty sure of one or two things concerning the Democratic conventions. One is that Floyd county will support Johnson. Shivers carried the county easily two years ago in popular vote but his supporters didn't attend the precinct conventions and therefore the county convention voted in opposition to him at that time. Probably this year only one or two county boxes will support Shivers. This is because those opposing him work harder and organize their forces in the county.

**ANOTHER PREDICTION** is that Johnson will lead the state delegation to the national convention. But it won't be Johnson or Sam Rayburn who defeat Shivers in the state convention. Johnson is not making a very effective campaign and everything that Rayburn says benefits Shivers. The thing that will defeat Shivers is President Eisenhower's veto of the farm bill. Despite the fact that Shivers himself urged the President to sign the bill, the veto will react against Shivers because he led the state to support Eisenhower in 1952. At that time Mr. Eisenhower was speaking of 100% parity and de-centralized government. But perhaps he hadn't conferred with Dr. Milton.

**THE LUBBOCK COUNTY Farm Bureau** has voted to recommend to the Texas Farm Bureau that this state withdraw from the National Farm Bureau Federation because the president, Walter Shuman, is supporting flexible price supports and praised President Eisenhower for his veto of the farm bill. It seems to us that withdrawal is not the answer. The national organization can swing a lot of weight while the Texas Farm Bureau alone would not carry much weight with the national government. Why not wage a campaign to elect officials which will reflect the views of the membership? We do not believe that Mr. Shuman's views are those of the membership of the national organization. Perhaps the Texas Farm Bureau can start a campaign that will catch fire in other states. Too often farmers sit by and let their organizations run themselves until they are hurt. Then they go into action. That's about what has happened here. If we remember right, it hasn't been over a half dozen years since the Floyd County Farm Bureau itself endorsed flexible price supports. However since that time more effort has been made to get the sentiment of the membership into policies than was made at that time.

### With Our EXCHANGES

#### PARTIES SWAP SIDES

Gov. Allan Shivers told a Lubbock audience this week that since Civil War days the Republican and Democratic parties have done almost a complete flipflop on several issues. In fact, they have practically swapped sides on some questions.

Almost any student of political history is aware of this reversal. The Democratic Party, tra-

ditionally, is the States' Rights party, while the Republican Party started out as the one advocating centralization of government. The Civil War was fought over this issue. More progress toward centralization of government was made during three Democratic administrations from 1932 to 1952 than had been recorded in all previous history.

Republicans, on the other hand, have been championing State's Rights during the past several years.

However, the division on this issue is more vertical than horizontal. Conservatives in both parties still hold to the

doctrine of States' Rights, while so-called "Liberals" in both camps advocate more and more centralization. It is the groups within the parties, rather than the parties themselves, that differ. This fact has led many observers to predict a new political alignment within the next few years, with the Conservatives on one side and the "Liberals" on the other. Such an arrangement would make more sense than the one that now exists — Lubbock Avalanche.

#### MORE POLITICS

Sam Rayburn has been selected to preside at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago in August. That is a bad selection. Sam ruined the Democrats' chances for electing a Democratic President at the last Convention. He made at least 75 percent of the delegates mad by his tactics of cramming, jamming, and ramming the wishes of a few ringleaders down their throats, and they did not like it. We were there and we know whereof we speak. A majority of the delegates were as mad as a "wet hen" when it was over and stated they were going home and work for the election of Ike Eisenhower, and we believe they did from the result of the vote over the country. Sam Rayburn is a Texas Congressman with many long years of service in the House, but he has been roped in by the political machines of the big cities, and does their bidding. He is not the independent thinker he used to be. You can lead the American people, but you can't drive them one step. — Listening Post in Petersburg Journal.

#### REVENGE

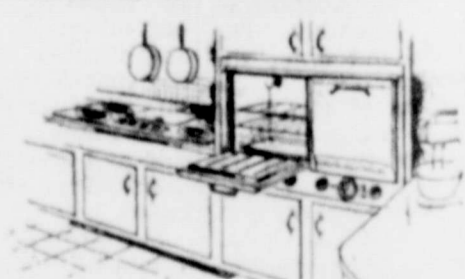

### Mrs. Peckham Gives Report To Rotary

Mrs. Elsie Peckham, Lockney school nurse, gave a report last Friday noon on her duties as school nurse to the Lockney Rotary Club. She was introduced by Supt. H. H. Nicholas. Patty Adams entertained the club with several songs preceding the report.

Mrs. Peckham told the club that the duties of a school nurse is to help in early detection of health difficulties in the school in order to minimize their educational and physical effects and to arrest and repair the physical damage through appropriate and professional attention.

She said that during the year she had tried to check every child in all the Lockney schools for defects in eyes, teeth, tonsils, and skin, and suggestive recommendations were made for abnormalities found. Most prevalent need was for dental treatment, she found.

Any child who becomes ill or is injured during the school hours is taken care of by the school nurse. If the child doesn't feel well enough to remain in school, she tries to contact the parents. If unable to reach the parent by telephone she usually takes the child to the family doctor of the patient, following this takes the child home. If no one is at home the child is returned to the hospital.

Mrs. Peckham said that gravel on the playground caused many lacerated knees, hands and elbows. On deep wounds, she attempts to see that the child has a tetanus shot. Each wound is clean and painted with mercurchrome, which does not burn. Mrs. Peckham said that to her knowledge she had never had a secondary infection on any wound treated at school.

Mrs. Peckham said that she had encountered quite a few skin infections, many on children whose parents could not afford proper medical treat-

In these cases local physicians have been helpful in treating the cases without charge, she said, and have done much to prevent the spread of communicable diseases.

The local dentist has also been very helpful in the treatment of dental defects, Mrs. Peckham said. He has been generous in treating those unable to pay.

She reported on the recent pre-school clinic in which more than 50 pupils who enter school for the first time next fall were given complete medical examinations.

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Melvin Potts, who farms 320 acres in the Irick community in Floyd county is a firm believer in soil conservation practices.

Potts began conservation farming in earnest in 1954. He planted his first vetch crop in the fall of 1954 and followed it with grain sorghums in 1955. Grain sorghums following vetch produced 1800 to 2000 pounds more grain per acre than grain sorghum on land that had no vetch. He accomplished this with less cultivation and irrigation. He planted grain sorghum when he plowed up the vetch and left most of the vetch residue on or near the surface.

He uses a rotation of one thin vetch planting about 100 acres of vetch each year. He interplanted cowpeas with grain sorghum last year, but plans to use soybeans this year. He allows vetch to grow until June 1st and follows it the first year with grain sorghum. He believes vetch should be allowed to grow until June, if maximum benefits are derived. He sows vetch on listed land and if rains come in May he plants grain sorghum when he plows up the vetch. He plans to run a tandem disk over the vetch and water it before planting.

Potts follows vetch ground with cotton the second year and expects to get an increase in production. All residue are left on or near the surface to protect the land from wind and water erosion.

In the fall of 1954 Potts did his first 86 acres of field leveling with the assistance of soil conservation service technicians. He field leveled 45 acres in 1955 and plans more leveling in the future.

To improve his irrigation, by eliminating ditch loss and evaporation Potts installed 6,940 feet of underground concrete pipe.

The quantity of water used for each irrigation is determined by the needs of the crops and the water holding capacity of the soil. The water is applied at a rate that crops can use most efficiently. In doing this Potts has achieved irrigation water management on 130 acres of land. In addition he has improved water application on an additional 150 acres by irrigating to meet the needs of soils and crops and adjusting row length.

Potts plans to continue his conservation program as a with the help of soil conservation technicians, completed a basic plan of operation for his farm. He uses the plan to guide him in using his land within its capabilities and treating it according to its needs.

## Tractor School And Contest Is Planned

At a meeting of Floydada tractor dealers last Friday night it was decided to sponsor a tractor school in cooperation with the Extension Service for Floydada County 4-H club boys, ages 12-21.

It is planned to have the school in the livestock show barn east of Floydada at 1:00 p. m., Saturday, May 5th.

Boys in 4-H who wish to enter should contact the County Agent's office. There will be openings for a few more and it is on a first come first served basis.

As a final point of the school there will be a tractor operators contest with the winner going to the district competition at Lubbock. Winners at Lubbock are then entitled to compete at the state contest at A. & M. College in June.

## Graded Border Systems Described

Randolph A. Kanz

On steeper slopes, where level irrigation is impossible without extensive land preparation, a graded border system of irrigation may be used. This method may be used on slopes up to two feet fall per 100 feet. It should, however, be used only on drilled or sown crops.

Borders should be spaced at regular intervals. The cross-slope between border levees should not exceed 0.1 foot and should preferably be level. The border height should be about six inches in order to prevent overtopping. Small temporary borders, between regular borders may be used to help take out side-fall. These borders will not ordinarily interfere with normal field operations. They should be established before the crop is sown, so that the land can be floated and the crop sown upon the borders.

Length is usually predetermined by existing field lines, but should generally not exceed a quarter mile on the deep, tight soils predominant in this county. The amount of water applied will vary from 18 to 36 gallons per minute for each foot of width between borders, according to the length run and the soil type. Farmers may obtain technical assistance in designing a system for their land through the local Soil Conservation Service.

The disadvantage of this method is that it is less efficient than level borders. It tends to cause over-irrigation in some spots and under-irrigation in others. For this reason, some skill is required to irrigate graded borders. Also, some means of handling rainfall runoff must be provided.

Don't confuse the real issue in the Johnson—Shivers fight with any other. Be sure of this: There is no connection between this fight and the final outcome of the battle over the farm program.

We only ask for a voice for Texas and her rights at the National Convention — a voice that can be heard throughout the nation and carry weight in Washington. We shall never be heard from if we demand nothing.

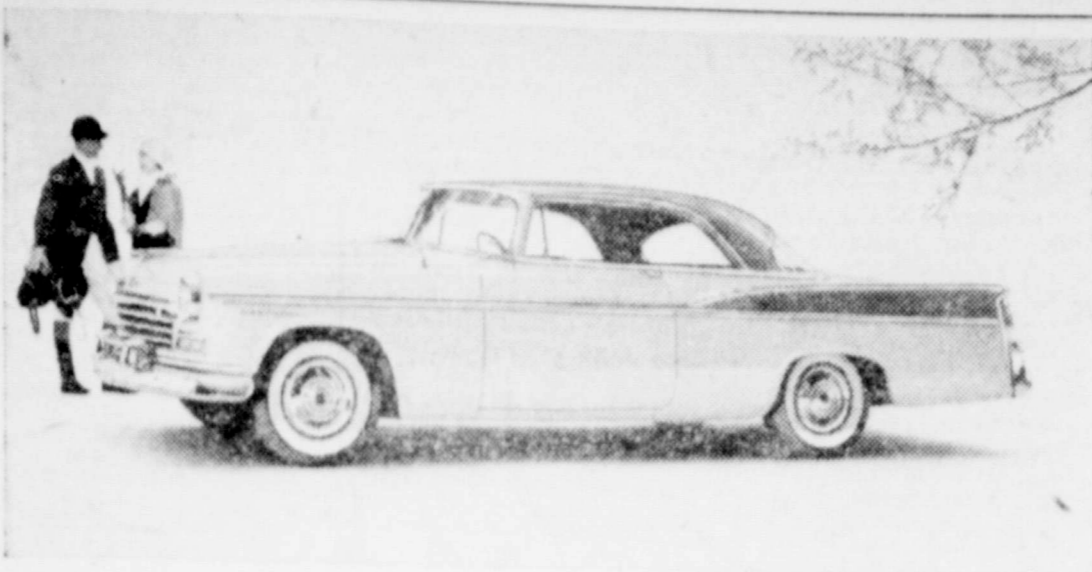

**Soil Conservation District Week To Be Observed May 6-12**

The week of May 6-12 is Soil Conservation Week in Texas. It begins on Soil Stewardship Sunday, May 6, when many churches will hold special services to recall man's duty to the land. During the rest of the week, most SCD's will present special tours, programs and field days to publicize District accomplishments and objectives. Texas has 172 Soil Conservation Districts which embrace 96 percent of the land area of the state. These Districts represent the greatest force — and the first organized, locally controlled force — for the conservation of soil, water, plants and wildlife. Each soil conservation district was organized only after landowners of the area voted to have such a district. SCDs are legal sub-divisions of state government, comparable to counties and school districts, but they have no taxing power. Each is governed by a board of five supervisors who must be landowners themselves and who are elected by farmers and ranchers of the District.

A soil conservation district helps its cooperating farmers and ranchers plan and apply conservation measures on their land. Following a master plan which was carefully prepared by farmer and rancher committees, each District works toward the goal to complete conservation for all the land in the District. Supervisors function as a co-ordinating body to stimulate and guide the efforts of local groups and individuals toward achievement of the District goal. Technical assistance is provided by various agencies, such as Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, Forest Service and Vocational Agriculture teachers.

Any landowner can become a SCD cooperator by applying to the board of supervisors. Becoming a cooperator does not involve any financial obligation. Texas SCDs now have 172,000 farmer and rancher co-operators, and the figure grows by 15,000 each year. Last year these cooperators cover-cropped 1,180,000 acres and stubble-mulched 256,000 acres of Texas land. They controlled brush on 1,322,000 acres and had 6,963,000 acres under deferred grazing. They built 10,700 miles of terraces, 7,340 miles of waterways built over 10,000 ponds and leveled 74,000 acres of land for proper irrigation. Supervisors of the Floyd County SCD are: Bert Bobbitt, R. G. Dunlap, Cecil Purcell, Fred Jackson and Gilbert Fawver. District offices are maintained at Floydada. The district has 950 cooperators.

**TEMPTING HARD-BOILED EGG DISHES**

Those hard-boiled eggs the Easter Bunny left are perfectly good eating. Any number of delicious luncheon dishes offer tempting ideas — for one, Egg Goldenrod made by slicing cooked eggs, warming in condensed cream of mushroom soup. Serve over toast points. Another is Rice Bake, in which a layer of cooked rice covers the bottom of a buttered casserole followed by quartered hard-boiled eggs, a few left-over peas or beans and over all a can or two (depending on amount of eggs and rice) of undiluted celery soup, to which two tablespoons of prepared mustard have been added.

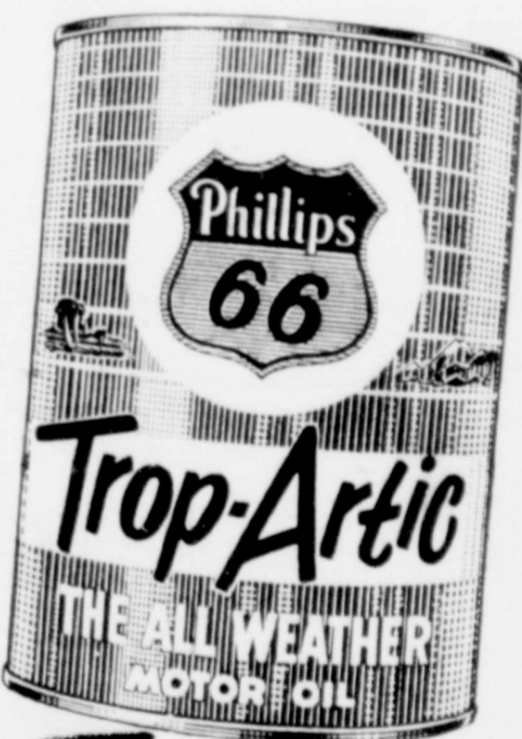
