SENATOR PRICE DANIEL candidate for governor, must be away ahead in the governor's race. Indications the past week are that the other candidates have formed a "stop Daniel" movement and have been joined by that notorious political boss, George Parr. Senterfitt, Haley, O'Daniel and Yarborough are all lambasting Price Daniel, which is a good indication that they are convinced that he is garnering most of the votes in the first Democratic primary. Now comes along George Parr and tries to give him the "kiss of death." Parr knows, as everyone else does, that his announced support of a candidate can be nothing but a drawback and a hindrance. So he comes out openly for Daniel in an effort to hurt his chances of being elected Governor. Politics is a dirty business at times.

THE FIRST PRIMARY is only a little more than two weeks

away. Elsewhere in this issue we have a complete list of all candidates for the various offices in the order in which they will appear on the ballot. We urge voters to study the list of candidates, consider the qualifications of each and vote accordingly.

OF COURSE, this newspaper is supporting Price Daniel for governor. We believe that his qualifications, his experience, his proven ability to get things done constructively, make him the logical choice of the voters of the state. For Lieutenant Governor we have four candidates. School people of the area are backing A. M. Alkin Jr., who is co-author of the Gilmer-Alkin school bill. John Lee Smith of Lubbock is a West Texas man who is in the race. Ben Ramsey is the incumbent.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S office is an important one in this state. We know of no better qualified man in the race than Will Wilson of Dallas. Mr. Wilson recently resigned as Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas to wage his campaign for Attorney General. Wilson, as district attorney of Dallas County, gained national recognition as a racket-busting official. Wilson has vowed to enforce the law "without favor to any individual, organized political group or clique" if elected. Wilson will make a good attorney general.

MARTIN DIES, for Congressman-at-large, certainly deserves the support of the voters of this state due to his past record of outstanding service to his country in fighting Communism and crime. He is a good man. There is one state race that will present a dilemma to the voters of Texas. It is the race for state treasurer in which Jesse James is running against Warren G. Harding. Of course this Jesse James is not the famous outlaw and this Warren G. Harding is not the Republican president. But the situation does have possibilities for a pun it seems.

INTEGRATION has been a much-discussed subject in this community since the school board's action of last week integrating the white and colored schools. Only time will tell whether or not the decision was a wise one. Talk indicates that many people of the community were not ready for the move. Whether they would ever be ready and whether the local schools would at some future date be forced to integrate anyway are questions no one can answer. Perhaps it is best to go ahead and get it over with, or perhaps it would have been best to vote a bond issue and build a suitable school for the colored students with the hope of avoiding integration altogether. We're sure neither course would please everyone. The school board has worried with

MAKING COMMIES
As a leader, Bishop Pickett has often been in violent conflict with the foreign policies of his own country. Here in agricultural West Texas, we have known for a long time that Secretary of Agriculture Benson had everyone but the interests of the farmers at heart. Now we learn that President Ike's choice of foreign secretary is just as bad or worse. In the Bishop's own words, "Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has made more Communists in India than Krushchev and Malenkov can ever hope to make." Being rather started at this report as we had thought foreign affairs was one department in which the Administration was doing rather well, we asked the Bishop in private conversation just how this was happening. Dulles is a dictator in spirit, said the Bishop, and has repeatedly attempted to tell Nehru what to do in India. At one time, he said, Nehru told Dulles that after fighting the British for so many years to gain their independence, India had no intention of turning over their sovereignty to the United States. And personally, we don't think the people want them to. And, said the Bishop, even though the President was a personal friend of many years standing, if it is a choice between Eisenhower and Stevenson, he will vote for the latter. — Trends in Crosbyton Review

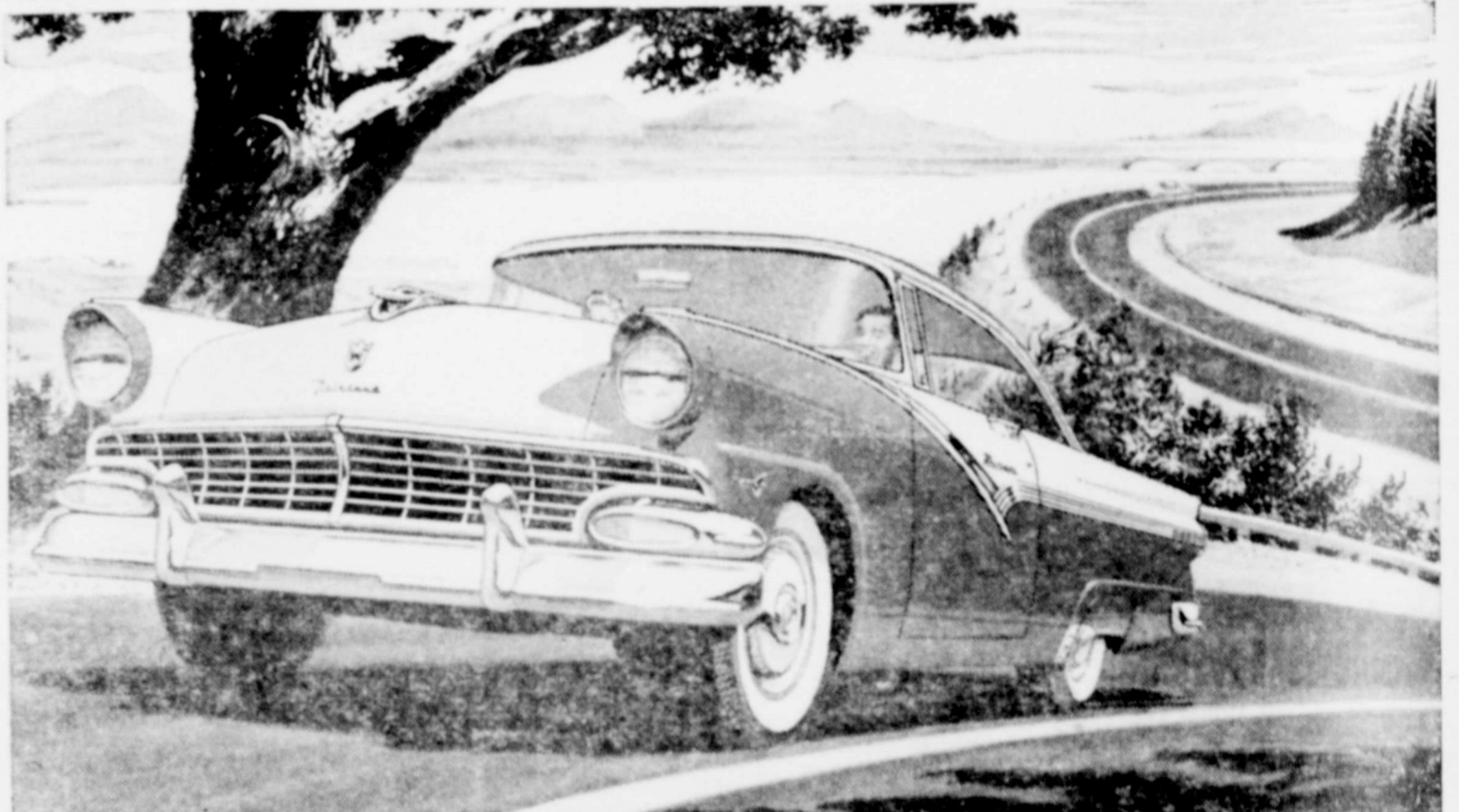

Civil Defense Has Key Role in Peace

Natural disasters can strike anytime, anywhere.

From pioneer days to the present, neighbors have always helped each other in times of distress. But often, the power of a great hurricane, flood or tornado completely outmatched the valiant but disorganized efforts of untrained volunteers.

TODAY THE UNITED STATES has a form of disaster insurance—civil defense. Like any other insurance, it doesn't guarantee that disaster won't occur.

But by executive order, the Federal Civil Defense Administration does have the responsibility for coordinating all disaster relief efforts under Public Law 875. This guarantees that the resources of the entire nation can be marshaled against nature on the rampage as required.

It's a job which requires the skills of many specialists, such as the Army Corps of Engineers, the National Guard and the American Red Cross. Trained civil defense workers in the general disaster area put their rescue, traffic control, first aid and other skills to practical use.

President, Dan Duham, Oregon, the Illinois Student Council President, Don Campbell and a guest singer, Jake Engles, Arkansas, who sang very much like Eddie Fisher.

Friday afternoon at 4 p. m. we started our happy journey home to Dear old Lockney. This was a very wonderful experience for us to attend this convention, but we still say, "there is no place like home."



Floydada To Have Dial Phone System

Floydada's new dial telephone system will be placed in operation at 12:01 a. m. July 22, announced J. C. Oakley, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager.

Final preparations for the cutover to dial are now being made, Oakley said. Installers have placed most of the equipment in the new dial building on west California Street.

Meanwhile, many additional tasks remain to be completed. New dial telephone numbers are being assigned to every telephone in Floydada. Each telephone will receive a two-letter and five-number dial telephone number. All Floydada numbers will have a central office prefix "YUKON 3" followed by four more numbers.

New telephone directories listing all the new dial numbers will be distributed soon in Floydada.

Oakley said the actual cutover operation would take only a few seconds. At 12:01 on Sunday, July 22, the cables leading to the old manual switchboards will be cut and the installation workers will remove a series of blocks from the new dial equipment at a given signal.

When the signal is given, Floydada subscribers will be provided with modern dial telephone service.

I promised my friends that when I was settled here in Canada I would let them know how I made out and something about the fishing.

We departed from Plainview about seven o'clock in the morning and had a very nice trip all the way. We stopped at Cheyenne, Wyo., Great Falls, Mont. and then to Edmonton, Alta., arriving here at seven-thirty in the afternoon. When I say afternoon I mean just that as the sun has just passed the one hundred thirty-five degree orbit (reference to the full daylight hours) and it is light until much later.

The temperature is surely great as compared to the hot weather on the Plains of Texas. We have had some days that were on the cool side, days in or near seventy to eighty degrees. The nights are nice for sleeping with the cover well up around the chin (thirty to forty-five degrees).

The fishing as you may know is my favorite pastime, and it is all that anyone could desire. We went out to one of the many lakes that they have here and settled for some twenty or more great northern pike, and three days later I went to another lake that has nothing but perch and we had sixty or seventy in slightly more than one hour. Now don't accuse me of handling the truth in a careless manner as I have witness to prove my numbers. We fished this perch lake at another time and three of us were able to catch two hundred seventy odd in less than three hours. Just as fast as you can get the fish off the hook and it back in the water. Now I call that good fishing. The walleyed pike are just as fast but it takes a little coaxing to get them to come in so you can net them. The great northern pike can sure give you plenty of exercise too. In fact you hesitate to throw out the line for you know that you will have a tussel on your hands. (This after you have fished for 30 minutes or so).
