Floydada, Spur Will Play Here Next Week

Going into the final round of basketball play in District AA, both Floydada and Spur high school teams will come to Lockney next week. Spur will play here Tuesday evening and Floydada teams will be here on Friday evening of next week, Feb. 8. The Longhorn basketball team defeated Spur at Spur in the first round but lost to Floydada at Floydada. Floydada is leading the district standings with no losses but while all other teams have lost at least two games. On Friday evening of this week the Longhorns have an open date in district play but will go to Idalou for a practice game.

The Longhorns broke even last week, dropping a game last Thursday evening to Takoka and winning a whizzer on Post in the local gymnasium night. At Takoka, the Longhorns didn't hold down the high scoring Bulldogs and dropped at game 72 to 63. Roy Kidd led 19 points while Morris Meriwether made 15 for the total team. Gurdy of Takoka took 15 points.

The Longhornettes broke into the win column at Takoka with a high-scoring Nelda Widener making 36 points for the local team. The final score was 51-41. High scorer for Takoka was Woods with 21.

Morris Meriwether's set shot on the corner with three seconds left to play enabled the Longhorns to edge Post on a home court Tuesday evening. The final score was 54 to 47. The final few minutes of the game had the fans on edge as the lead changed back and forth. The Longhorns had a 4-1 lead with two minutes to go but the Antelopes came back to gain a one point advantage with 45 seconds left. With 10 seconds remaining Coach Troy's boys took time out, set a strategy to break Meriwether into the clear and it worked perfectly with the set shot falling nicely through the hoop. The Antelopes had a nine point lead at halftime but were led in the third period enabling the Longhorns to pull up. Meriwether made 24 points and Frizzell made 10 for the Longhorns. Cartnell of Post was high for his team with 17 points.

The Longhornettes dropped their game by a score of 57 to 47 after pulling to within one point of their opponents in the third period. Nelda Widener made 27 points while Martin made 20 for Post.

The Longhorns have won four of their last five games in district play while the Longhornettes have won one and lost six.

Wayland College International Choir Will Sing Here Feb. 7th

The Wayland College International A Cappella Choir will be presented in the Lockney High School auditorium on Thursday evening, February 7th at 7:30 it was announced this week. The Lockney Band Parents Club is sponsoring the choir's appearance here.

The Choir is one of the most famous and most traveled musical groups in this area. Last fall the group covered some 3,000 miles in one trip which took them as far north as Wisconsin. They sang in Chicago, Kansas City, and St. Louis.

The 37-voice choir has been under the direction of William E. Steward for the past three years and has developed many small ensembles which are in demand over a wide area for banquets and other programs, besides the full choir concerts. The colorful costumes of the band add to their program's attractiveness.

Two outstanding performances were given in Plainview during pre-Christmas days by the choir in the community-wide "Messiah," and the second year performance of "Amahl and the Night Visitors," a Christmas opera.

Members of the choir are selected by audition and must rehearse five times weekly. To be a member of the choir is considered a top campus honor. Admission charges will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students. Children under 6.

Cooper Baby Dies Tuesday

Little Teresa Kathelene Cooper, 1 1/2 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Wayne Cooper, died at noon Tuesday in a Wheeler hospital of bronchial pneumonia. She had been ill less than two days.

Funeral services are set for Friday afternoon at 2:30 at the First Baptist Church in Floydada, former home of the parents. Services were delayed awaiting the arrival of Mrs. Cooper's mother from California.

The baby girl developed a cold Sunday afternoon and was given treatment but the attending physician did not believe the illness was at all serious. The mother was awakened about 4 a. m. Monday by the baby and found that croup had developed and the baby was having serious difficulty breathing. All medical aid failed to bring improvement in her condition and death came Tuesday.

The baby girl was the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Cooper of Lockney. The parents formerly lived at Floydada where Eddie Wayne was employed in the ASC office. In December he was transferred to the Wheeler ASC office where he is employed. The father was reared here and graduated from Lockney High School. Surviving grandparents in addition to the Coopers are Mr. and Mrs. Tom Faires of Arcada, Calif.

Rev. Ed Bowles, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Floydada and Rev. R. E. Wiley, pastor of the Lockney church, will officiate at the funeral services.

Teresa Kathelene was born July 27, 1955 at Floydada. The Coopers have another child, Marvin Earl, age 3 years.

Vegetable Growers Meet In Floydada

Floydada — Marketing was listed as the No. 1 problem of the vegetable growing industry in the South Plains area at a meeting attended by 75 persons in the district courtroom here Friday afternoon.

Other problems of vegetable growing were discussed by Texas A & M College extension specialists at a meeting presided over by Floyd County Agent Bill G. Rodgers.

Joe Cole, Extension Service horticulturist from Lubbock, substituted for B. G. Hancock of College Station in discussing the production and varieties of vegetables grown in this area last year. He pointed out that numerous vegetables grow well on the South Plains.

Other speakers included Dr. Harlan E. Smith, plant pathologist, who discussed plant diseases and control; C. F. Garner, assistant entomologist, who discussed insects and how to control them; and J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist, who talked about the big problem of getting South Plains vegetables to processors.

Lockney Telephones Will Have Two Letters, Five Numbers

Patrons of the Lockney exchange of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. received circular letters this week announcing that in July local telephone numbers would be changed to include two letters and five numbers in line with a nation-wide plan of standardizing telephone numbers. The exact date in July of the change-over was not announced.

Lockney's prefix will be "Oldfield", a name that isn't considered likely to please very many people here but one that fits into the nation-wide scheme of things. Thus Lockney will dial the two first letters of the prefix, "O-L" and then the five numbers in order to get their connection.

Rumors of the change had been in circulation here for some time but The Beacon had been unable to verify the rumors. Telephone officials simply said, when asked about it, that a change was in process but "nothing definite" is available as yet. Therefore the circular letters came as a surprise to many people.

A new edition of the telephone directory, listing all the new "2-5" numbers, will be delivered just before the new numbering plan goes into effect. The telephone company promises to notify patrons of their new numbers as far in advance as possible.

The two letter, five number system will eventually be used in every exchange in the nation and the system is designed to eliminate the work of telephone operators in the making of long distance calls. Thus a Lockney patron may pick up his telephone and dial the number of a relative or friend in Dallas and get him without bothering to wait on an operator.

Floydada and Plainview both have the new system of telephone numbers.

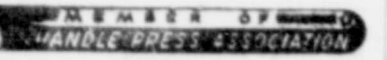

Duval Plunderbund Plucked \$7,187 From Benavides Schools in One Day

SAN DIEGO, TEX.—One of the Federal Government's experts working on the sticky financial morass that is Duval County figures the cost of operating a political machine such as this at about \$1,000,000 a year.

This doesn't include what goes into the pockets of leaders through big "deals" which otherwise wouldn't have been possible. John Ben Shepperd has estimated the total of "money diverted from intended, lawful purposes" in Duval County has been four or five million dollars a year for the past ten years.

That's a lot of money even for Texas where millionaires are supposed to hide behind every hush-hush bush.

Political machines fall apart when something interferes with the free flow of cash. Attorney General John Ben Shepperd and District Attorney Sam Burris have turned off the faucet in Duval.

Donato Serna, a determined little Latin-American who can spot a crooked ledger a mile away, now sits in the Courthouse at San Diego as County Auditor. Serna doesn't like George B. Parr one little bit. And for good reason.

Parr once gave him a thorough going over with a five-cell flashlight, a beating so severe that one of Parr's then deputy sheriffs, Manuel Amaya, was forced to intervene and disarm the Boss.

"Our county is not in a very good financial condition," says Serna.

Only one county in Texas has a higher tax rate than Duval. The county, with a population in the neighborhood of 12,000, has a bonded indebtedness of \$3,113,000 and a \$2.55 tax rate.

The adjoining county, Webb, another political hot spot, has a \$2.65 rate.

In contrast, Val Verde County has a 58 cent rate. Perhaps the avenging shade of Judge Roy Bean, "the law West of the Pecos," who held court in a Val Verde saloon, keeps sticky fingers out of the public till. There's nothing like a little fancy embezzlement to shoot a tax rate sky high.

Beside my typewriter are two documents, Donato Serna's current annual report on Duval County finances and an affidavit signed by Diego Heras, former acting secretary to the board of trustees of the Benavides Independent School District.

The two documents complement each other perfectly, the latter providing a good picture of the financial shenanigans responsible for the "not very good financial condition" of the County of Duval.

In just one day, October 19, 1950, nimble fingers lifted \$7,187.80 from the school district treasury.

The chubby Mr. Heras lists 101 checks made out to fictitious names, the whole batch amounting to \$67,414.17. His affidavit makes interesting reading.

"I know George B. Parr of San Diego, Duval County," Mr. Heras swore. "Although he has dominated the Board of Trustees for many years, and has taken it upon himself to countersign all vouchers issued by the District, Mr. Parr has never within my knowledge been an employee of Benavides Independent School District. W. M. Benson of San Diego, who keeps Mr. Parr's books, and who offices in Mr. Parr's office across from the Courthouse in San Diego, has served as 'auditor' for said Benavides School District for many years.

"W. Milligan is Superintendent of Schools in the Benavides Independent School District, and W. F. Reed is Principal of the Freer Schools in said Benavides District. During the years I worked for the Benavides District the method of handling Teacher Retirement moneys was to make up the teacher contribution lists from the payrolls, and then to issue vouchers against the School District to Mr. Milligan or Mr. Reed for the amount of the Teachers' contributions. These men in turn were to purchase cashier's checks to be remitted to Teachers Retirement System.

"I have carefully examined annual report of School Funds to Texas Education Agency submitted by Benavides Independent School District for the year ending August 31, 1950, and have also examined a like report submitted for the year ending August 31, 1951. These reports were prepared and submitted by the Texas State Bank of Alice, the depository for Benavides Independent School District. In these reports I have found many irregularities. On Exhibit A to this affidavit, I have listed a number of vouchers issued by Benavides Independent School District to fictitious persons. The persons so listed as fictitious are actually fictitious, never existed, and of course never performed the services for which the vouchers purportedly were drawn. Many of these vouchers were issued at the express direction of W. M. Benson. At times I would deliver the vouchers to Mr. Parr or Mr. Benson. At other times, I would present them at the depository bank, where I would be handed an envelope containing money. This envelope would then be delivered to Mr. Parr or Mr. Benson.

"On Exhibit B to this affidavit, I have listed another group of vouchers which were issued in the same manner and under the same direction, to actual persons. However, none of these listed persons who are payees in the listed vouchers ever performed the services for which the vouchers were purportedly issued, and these persons did not receive such vouchers. Such vouchers were handled in the same manner as those issued to fictitious persons.

"On Exhibit C to this affidavit, I have listed another group of vouchers which were issued, in the same manner and under the same direction, to actual persons. However, none of these listed persons who are payees in the listed vouchers ever worked for said Benavides District.

There you have it. And this sort of thing has been going on in Duval County for half a century.

The Diego Heras affidavit tells but a small part of the story of how the plunderbund operated in one school district during one short period of time. More of the Benavides story can be found in the transcript of the trial of D. C. Chapa, tax assessor and collector for the district. Chapa is now free on bail pending a hearing on his appeal from a five year prison sentence.

Equally enlightening facts can be seen in the official transcript of the trial of R. P. Donald, former cashier of one of Parr's banks put out of business by Shepperd in 1955. Donald, too, recently was given a five year prison sentence for conspiracy to steal Benavides school funds.

It is no wonder that evidence-destroying bonfires blazed like a Fourth of July celebration all over Duval County when Attorney General Shepperd arrived on the scene with a small army of assistants, including State Auditor C. H. Cavness. County records vanished in all directions.

A political boss on plunder bent must have a machine so well armored that no dent can be made in it. But machines grow old and rusty and the engineers sometimes get careless. This happened in Duval. Some of the thick rust crust flaked off, revealing the bright metal of loot beneath. It is no wonder that the Parr machine fought with every legal and semi-legal weapon at its command to keep an honest auditor out of the Courthouse in San Diego. It took the full power of the State of Texas thirteen months to put Donato Serna into office in Duval.

The result, according to Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, is the first honest audit of Duval books in more than half a century. And, to quote Shepperd, "Nobody can steal anything else in the county without getting caught."

Wayland Offers Scholarships To Hungarian Refugees

Plainview. — Wayland Baptist College has offered international student scholarships for three Hungarian refugee students in answer to an appeal from World University Service, a non-denominational organization, according to Dean Bryan Robinson, international student adviser.

In the statement issued jointly by World University Service, Institute of International Education and the International Rescue Committee, President A. Hope Owen was informed that between 1300 and 1500 university students, largely male, are among the Hungarian escapees who have fled from their homeland into Austria. A conservative estimate has been made of 300 to 400 students who will seek to continue their education in the United States with most of them wanting to study medicine, forestry, engineering.

Further information about the possibility of students who may want to continue liberal arts courses in a liberal arts college will be sent to Wayland after the students have been screened. These students are being screened at Camp Killmer, New Jersey, along with other escapees.

A North Carolina Baptist college has given a leave of absence to a Hungarian Baptist who is a member of its faculty so that he may help place refugees in the United States. It is expected that he will be of assistance especially to those of the Baptist denomination who have sought refuge in this country. Although Hungary is largely Catholic, Baptist mission work through the years has resulted in the establishment of Baptist churches in many sections prior to Communist occupation.

Any students recommended to Wayland College will have to meet the standards for admission just as all students coming under the program which was set up 10 years ago to attract students from other lands to the campus.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Plainview Production Credit Association is scheduled at the Plainview High School February 2.

Several hundred farmers, ranchers and their families from the eight-county Plains region served by the association are expected for the luncheon at 11:30 and the business session to follow.

W. N. Stokes, Jr., president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, will address the gathering in a discussion of the rising cost of money and the possibilities of an adequate supply of money to meet the credit needs of agriculture.

Association Directors Henry Hayes, Plainview; L. R. Durham, Lockney; and Cecil A. Davis, Muleshoe, will discuss the financial condition, loan committee activities and membership phases of the Plainview Production Credit Association.

Two directors will be elected at the business session in the high school auditorium. Nominated as candidates to succeed Thurlio Branscum of Muleshoe and D. S. Anderson, Muleshoe, are J. A. Streety, Littlefield. Nominees for the place on the Board occupied by S. J. Payne of Tulla are A. H. Jennings and G. L. Sadler, both of Tulla.

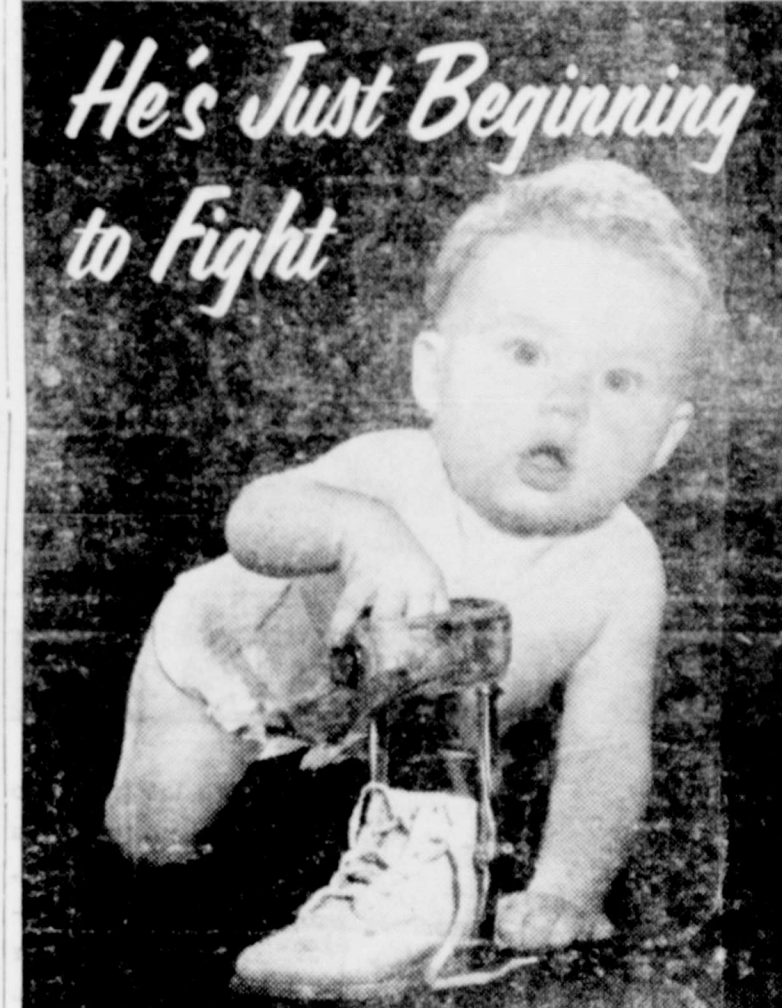

Dr. Johnny Davis, associate head of the High Plains Station stated that "We're getting started later than we had hoped to, but until the lease agreements on the land were signed, we could do no land preparation. Now that we are underway and have two tractors, the land preparation will go much faster. We hope to obtain a third tractor so all our research can be done on schedule."

The tractors and farm equipment used on the research farm at Halfway are supplied by the Farm equipment Manufacturers on a lease basis rather than purchase.

Dr. Lundell Here
Dr. C. L. Lundell, Director of the Texas Research Foundation met with groups of the leading business men and farmers in Amarillo, Lubbock and Plainview during his inspection of the new High Plains Station.

Accompanying him on the tour were R. V. Payne, Hale County State Bank, Chairman of the Big Gifts Committee, Frank Moore, farmer, Area Chairman, and Dr. T. C. Longnecker, assistant director of the Texas Research Foundation and head of the High Plains Station.

Hosts for the group were S. B. Whittenberg, Amarillo, George B. Kaykendall, Lubbock and Clay Henry, Plainview.

Dr. Lundell expressed his satisfaction on the progress being made in financing the project with nearly 50% of the 5 year budget already pledged or underwritten. Approval was given the plans for research for 1957 now under way. He announced that additional facilities to expedite the program will soon be provided.

Sorghum Stubble Proves Aid To Soil

Floyd County has had very little damage this season from wind erosion, but the most dangerous part of the season is upon us, according to the Soil Conservation Service.

Where stubble or other residue are inadequate to control wind erosion they should be supplemented with chiseling or listing to roughen the soil. If indications are that present residues will be effective in controlling wind erosion they should be left undisturbed as long as possible.

If blowing starts use one or two light chisels between the rows to supplement the residues. A second chiseling later in the season using a larger chisel with greater depth will provide control over a longer period of time. This will also provide for one more effective operation with a lister if blowing becomes more severe.

Stubble and clods will also help hold any snow or moisture which happens to fall during the winter. Local farmers will recall last years snow which was accompanied by high winds. Rough, stubbled fields received the benefit of this winter moisture, while smooth fields were bare by the strong winds.

Studies made last year during the snow of the effectiveness of different field conditions for catching and holding snow showed: chiseled sorghum stubble 7 inches depth of snow; listed sorghum stubble, 6 inches; listed cotton land 4 1/2 inches; flat broke land, 4

South Plains Stock Show March 18-20

Dates for the 24th annual South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show to be held at the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds were set by the Show's Steering Committee at a meeting January 23 at the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. The show will be held March 18-19-20, 1957. O. L. Byrd of Ralston Purina in Lubbock was named General Chairman, with Dixon White of Lubbock Cotton Oil Co. as Vice-Chairman.

The South Plains show has become one of the finest regional exhibitions of livestock in Texas, with nearly 1,200 animals shown last year. The number of hogs shown in the 1956 show was the largest outside of the State Fair's show in Dallas. More than 700 4-H and FFA youths from a 29-county area showed barrows, lambs, and steers in the 1956 show.

Bill Would Give Three District 19 Counties To 13th

Austin — Three counties would be removed from the 19th congressional district, under a bill introduced by Sen. William Fly of Victoria. This means U. S. Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock would represent just 22 counties, instead of his present 25.

Three counties at the eastern edge of the present 19th district — King, Stonewall and Haskell — would be added to the 13th district under the Fly proposal.

Purpose of Fly's bill is to create a new district in South Texas, to otherwise take care of population shifts within the state, and to create a district for the congressional seat now filled on a state-wide basis by U. S. Rep. Martin Dies.

Fly's bill would mean these counties would be in the 19th district: Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cochran, Hookley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Gaines, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Andrews, Martin, Howard and Mitchell.

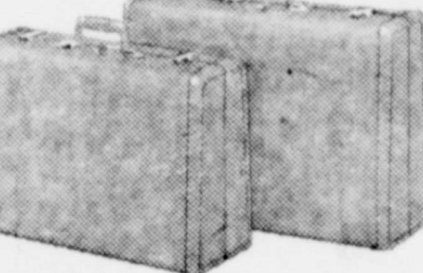
Sen. Fly said the bill as introduced is the same as that which passed the House of Representatives in 1951, but was filibustered to death in the Senate by Sen. Search Bracewell of Houston, who contended that Harris County (Houston) should get the new congressional district.

Sen. Bracewell has again introduced his bill to leave all congressional districts as they are, but to give the seat now filled state-wide by Dies to one half of Harris County.

The Fly bill and the Bracewell bill have been referred to the Senate Committee on Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts of which Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, who represents Floyd County, is vice chairman.

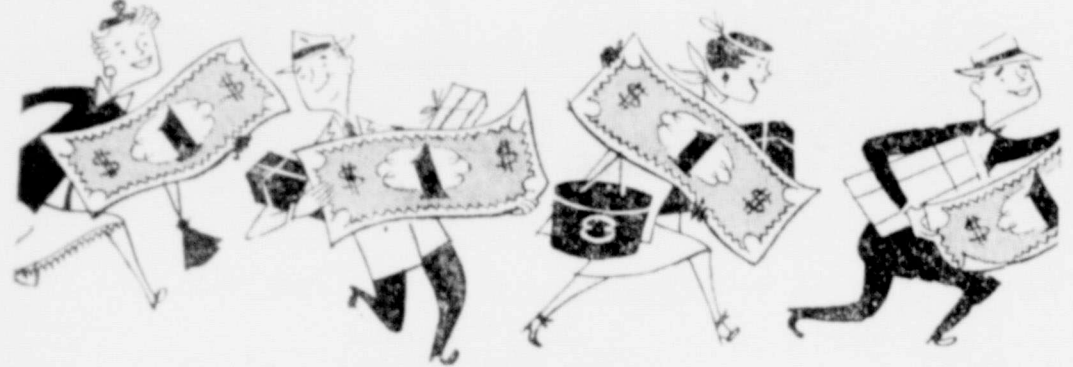

GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY.

Mahon Reports On Aspects Of Farm Supports

In an open letter to ASC committee county agents, farmers, Congressman George Mahon of the 19th district gives a briefing on some aspects of the agricultural support outlook for his year that will be of general interest. Says Mr. Mahon:

No important decisions have been made in Washington on the farm front since the new Congress convened on Jan. 3. I listened to Secretary Benson testify before the House Committee on Agriculture in regard to the status of the soil bank program. Nothing unusual developed.

Mr. Benson did say that he would soon recommend a change in the program for corn and that he felt it was impractical to disregard other feed grains in working out a program for corn. This may prove significant in connection with the grain sorghum program for 1957.

In 1956 we tried to tie grain sorghum to corn in the farm bill, but Secretary Benson then opposed the proposal and it was defeated.

Under the present law, the Secretary in 1957 can decline to provide a support price program for grain sorghum or he can support it at any level between zero and 90 per cent. In 1956 the law required that it be supported at 76 per cent of parity.

I think there will be a support program on grain sorghum this year, but I doubt that it will be announced prior to a decision on what is to be done about corn. The new legislation will, no doubt, affect both crops. The House Committee on Agriculture will soon conduct hearings on new proposals as to corn, and grain sorghum will be a very definite part of this picture.

Representatives of the Plains Cotton Growers Association have been in town for several days. (The group had been empowered to represent all farm groups in the area on certain projects.) I have joined them in various conferences with Agriculture officials in regard to cotton classing improvement programs in West Texas, a special loan on light spot cotton, etc.
