## Plant's Will Celebrate 20th Anniversary

Plant Grocery & Market will celebrate their 20th anniversary business in Lockney this week with a special anniversary sale. A full page advertisement elsewhere in this issue of The Beacon gives all details.

In addition many valuable prizes will be given away. ## 17 Teachers To Receive Medals Friday Evening

Seventeen teachers and other employees of the Lockney Independent School District will receive medals at the First Annual Teacher Appreciation Banquet set for Friday evening at the High School Auditorium. The affair begins at 7:30.

Supt. H. H. Nicholas will present medals to the principals who have served the local school at least five years. The principals of the three schools will then present medals to teachers and employees who qualify by length of service.

Principal speaker for the program will be Charles Matthews, superintendent of the Plainview Schools. He will be introduced by Supt. Nicholas. Musical numbers will be presented by a local men's quartet composed of J. D. Copeland, J. B. Seale, Arthur Barker Sr. and Cleatis Jeffcoat.

Expected to attend the banquet will be teachers in the local school system and members and wives or husbands of the four local clubs sponsoring the banquet. The clubs are the Rotary Club, the Lions Club, Toastmasters and Business & Professional Women's Clubs. The clubs have shared the expense of the medals and other expenses of the banquet.

## Big Onion Crop Being Planted In This Area

A big onion crop, estimated to be around 700 acres, is being planted in the Lockney area. More than half of the crop has been planted and work is underway on the remainder. Most of the crop is plant settings but some onion seed has been planted.

The Wiley & Duncan vegetable firm will have between 500 and 600 acres in the Lockney area and probably 750 acres in all including some acreage in the Levelland, Littlefield and Plainview areas. M. W. Wiley told The Beacon Wednesday.

A little more than 100 acres will be planted by members of the Lockney Vegetable Growers Association, according to Dick Whiteley, Chamber of Commerce manager.

Mr. Wiley said that the acreage could be considerably larger but for the fact that plants are scarce. Poor germination in the last crop is bringing a scarcity of the plants.

The white and yellow Grano and Granex is the type onion being planted for the most part though some Spanish Sweets are also being planted. The Grano and Granex are large global type onions. Some 85% of the plants are yellow onions.

Miller, 40 acres; Orba Miller, 20 acres; Joe Taylor, 19 acres; Horton Howell, 10 acres; Milton Ashton, 17 acres; F. L. Vanek, 15 acres; Clarence Savage, 15 acres and John Bill-brey, 15 acres.

Some of the members of the Lockney Vegetable Association and their onion acreage are: Hubert Frizzell, 10 acres; J. H. Widener, 6 acres; Bruce Whitlock, 5 acres; Bill Whitlock, 5 acres; Hugh Marble, 5 acres; Hugh Counts, 10 acres; R. H. Tinsley, 10 acres; O. D. Tarpoley, 7 acres, all setting plants. In addition the following are planting onion seed: Elmer Thornton, 8 acres; Bob and John Walker, 24 acres; Joe O'Neal, 15 acres. The reason for planting onion seed is that the cost of planting is some \$40 per acre cheaper. Whiteley said, though the farmer must take a chance on getting up the plant, a risk he does not have when the plants are set out.

The Lockney Vegetable Growers Association will meet next Tuesday evening at 7:30 in a class room at Lockney Junior High School, Whiteley said this week.

### Research Station Ice Moved To Highway Recently

The office of the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Station is now located just west of the research station in Halfway. The staff of the station moved from their temporary office at 704 1/2 W. Plainview, on February 19. Increased tempo of activity at the 310 acre research farm led to the early move necessary.

An acre of land just west of the station was purchased from Edwin Dean in February. A fence has been converted into an office. As soon as funds become available a headquarters building will be erected on the south side of Highway 310 just west of the Highway.

Baptist Church. The present office will then become the residence of a station employee. Construction of an equipment storage barn is underway on the new acre site. The second irrigation well is being drilled on the east side of the 310 acre research farm. All the land has been plowed and is being floated, getting ready for the first year of research. Leases on the site were completed January 9th. This late season start is compelling the scientists and staff to work at high speed to "catch up."

### Rep. Whitten To Speak At Plains Cotton Meeting

Rep. Jamie L. Whitten, (D. Miss.) Chairman of the powerful House Agricultural Appropriations Committee, will make the keynote address at the annual meeting of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., March 18 in Lubbock, J. W. Payne of Crosby County, Director, said today.

W. O. Fortenberry, President of the Plains Cotton Growers, told directors last week that Whitten had accepted an invitation to visit the South Plains and speak here.

Whitten will speak on "The Farm Problem," at the afternoon session of the PCG annual meeting. Cotton producers and industry representatives from throughout the 23-county area served by the PCG will attend the annual meeting to be held in the Municipal Auditorium on Texas Tech campus.

The Mississippi Congressman played a major role in getting the present cotton export sales program at competitive prices passed and has always been interested and active in cotton legislation.

Whitten believes there should be no acreage restrictions in cotton and that farmers should be supported only on domestic sales based on history and be permitted to plant all the cotton acreage they wish for world market competition.

He has publicly stated that he believes U. S. Agriculture is on the wrong road in reducing cotton acreage and he believes Sec. Benson's policy of lower prices has not increased the domestic consumption in this country, Fortenberry said.

The PCG annual meeting will begin at 11 a. m. March 18. In addition to Whitten's talk, Pres. Fortenberry will make a report on activities of the PCG to date and give a financial report.

George W. Pfeiffenberger, executive vice president, also will make a report and explain plans for the coming year. Another national speaker on cotton promotion also will be in Lubbock for the meeting if arrangements can be worked out, Pfeiffenberger said.

Additional details of the annual meeting will be announced later, Pfeiffenberger said.

## Plains Station Council To Meet Saturday Noon

The Regional Council of the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation will meet at the Hilton Hotel at 11 a. m. Saturday, March 16th. After a luncheon they will visit the station at Halfway, just 9 miles east of Olton. Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Council is host to the meeting.

This is the first meeting since the Council was organized in October 1956. At that time they set up the High Plains Station and made plans to secure the 313 acre site at Halfway and accepted a budget of \$550,000 for the first five years of operation.

At this meeting the Council will review the plans made at the organizational meeting for research at the station. Among the matters to be presented will be the new crops to be evaluated in the evaluation nurseries for their adaptation to the soil and climate, soil and water management practices to be studied of present crops to be tested for their desirability. Tests and demonstrations with grasses and legumes for soil improvement, cropping systems, rotation and water conservation.

Among the items to be discussed will be the priority of research projects in relationship to the available funds. Just over 50% of the 5 year budget has been raised. Additional staff members and equipment will be added as the 5 year goal is approached.

### Local Traveler Tells Of Trip To Historical Area But Complains Of Lack Of Pictures In Beacon

Editor's Note: At the request of the editor and several other people R. E. Patterson tells here with a humorous and entertaining way of a 22-day cruise which he, Mr. Patterson and several other Lockney people took recently. We know you'll find it interesting.

To Editor, Lockney Beacon: Believe it or not, Mr. Editor, one of your readers requested I to a piece in the 22 day cruise. I have a few of your fellow townsmen engaged recently. And this request came from one who read my stuff at an eleven day cruise in the Caribbean four years ago. So with all this encouragement, not to say insistence — how can I deny the clamor of my own inclination to get — Gee, I hope I don't end up being like some garrulous old man. I've got it.

Well, to get along, we didn't "put to sea" in a beautiful green boat" but it sure was a nice shiny white one—one and one half city blocks long and sixty feet wide. One of the ships of the United Fruit Co., "Great White Fleet" — S. S. Chicago.

Of course, one who embarked at New Orleans has about 200 miles of smooth gliding along the Mississippi to the Gulf. This might seem like the ideal but it was very uncomfortable, but "all was well" at Santiago Cuba.

Naturally, we had to go a shore there in order to make this charge again. Our first stop was at Key West, Fla., and then on to the "Great White Fleet" — S. S. Chicago.

And if you recall your Spanish-American war, as I did, you'll remember that in the 9th year and immediately after all about it is possible to look at the map of the entire Spanish fleet in American waters. I mean, Lt. Hubson and seven or eight men tried to knock the end of Santiago Harbor to battle up to Cervantes' fleet. But in spite of their heroism in scuttling the old S. S. Merrimac under the name of Spanish galleon, we seemed to one side and let the Spaniards escape — to their doom. Commodore Schley took every last one of them in a running battle — then a bigger battle began as to who deserved credit for the victory — Schley or his superior, Admiral Sampson, who arrived at the scene about the time the smoke

cleared away.

Enough of a tiny skirmish that is forgotten and unimportant compared to events of recent years. But if you care to you can go to the top of the hill, our boys so gallantly stormed and to the trees where our boys were arranged in a line you can see a lot of the prizes of battle and read of others of the poor people who lost in the battle of Santiago.

That was with the ladies and to have the usual shopping tour indulged in at all ports of debarkation to see exotic droppings items and some of the most sought water goods — heard run for example — and the best Havana cigars, each tourist being permitted to re-enter the port of S. S. with \$200.00 worth of duty-free goods.

Under way again the crew must agitate as we rounded the windward end of Jamaica Island — said agitation continuing a good growing worse after departure from Kingston until a most menacing coming up saw but little died going down — John and I were the only ones who ate at our table with the usual relief — being out of the way, at least, and better — Java, at our present dining table from Memphis dropped it out, he says the main in form of a breakfast emergency. But after that one day and night it was after that we I used out the heavy fat from our about the thing of the water and floundered about with my open and water in sea and might have gone over the side if a time heaped pad had not grabbed me for me. Whether they would have floundered off or not the good lady showed me when she put them in a deck chair and they were full of salt water. The sailors pretty soon emptied the pool and stopped the bathing for fear someone got slammed too hard against the side of the pool.

But to return to Jamaica for a moment, we spent that part of an afternoon that tight and the next day went across the island by road to the Tower Line Road where the Caribbees permitted their picture to be taken by a representative of the Hotel to send back for advertising purposes. And by the way the same photographer took another picture of the bells and the Pattersons and so far it has not been published. Wonder if a slight difference in age and good looks had anything to do with which picture the hotel decided to use in their public campaign. Well, if so, John and I just say there ain't much in this flower like place any way. Oh, they had a nice looking joint all right with a beach just out of the world covered with lounge chairs, the best of the best I ever saw. It's the only one I ever saw. I suppose and how can those Japs and black boys in some fancy jackets and fancy — possibly they can do. And also this one picture didn't show up in the Beacon, well, they did have piles — possibly heavy loads of food or even a kind served at luncheon, buffet style on the open terrace. In reading your piece your conscience and the whole line very the only limiting factor. If I say much more you'll think I'm second-guessing the morning paper. Arthur Barker spent sometime at this place last December and he says after you see there a number, a constant thing in the case "30 bucks a day".

Twenty five or thirty more years shouldn't detract much from a fellow's appearance. An idea has just struck me. The older people in the main are the ones who travel. That's the way it is in younger people. I know that there is fat as well as expense in traveling. I am reminded of Anne and Wary — Anne and Wary, 75 and 80 years of age, widows of course. Wary had seen that beautiful lake high up in the mountains in Guatemala — and she had to bring Anne down to see it. Now — paying all the expenses to have her come. The most delightful party of the cruise — everybody made over them, stopping to get with them on the way out of the dining salon — especially mornings. My favorite greening was "El Edie". They were in on everything. Wary had been from Baton Rouge where she was Dean of Women at L. S. U. for 22 years until Wary gave her the axe. The way she illustrates it, she said, "I went out when Wary Long came in" and made that suggestive motion of the knife across the throat.

Our Memphis friend — who something to other Tennessee people abroad, was quite wealthy and widely traveled — when asked by one of our party what he thought of Luke Autbelly as compared to some of the famous lakes in Europe, Luke said, "Oh, it's just another lake." Wary is proud to have so much dough to spend it.
