New Judicial District Has Three Counties

Plainview — The 64th Judi-
cal District, created 52 years
ago to include 11 counties, will
be reduced to an area of three
counties on Sept. 1.

Attorney General Will Wil-
son has advised 64th District
Judge E. A. Bills of Littlefield
and District Attorney Joe Cox
of Plainview that the law di-
viding the six-county district
will take effect on that date.

The 64th District was created
by legislative act on Feb. 8,
1905, from the 50th District. In
1929 the 64th was reduced to
seven counties, the present six
plus Floyd which in compar-
atively recent years was added
to the 116th.

A flaw in the legislation di-
viding the present 64th holds
Bailey and Swisher counties to
a single regular term of court
in 1957 in opposition to the re-
quired minimum two terms an-
nually but that can be reme-
died by calling special terms in
those counties, the attorney
general ruled.

Chandler Wrote Opinion

Some attorneys had felt that
the effective date of the new
law would have to be delayed
until Jan. 1, to cure this defect.

Asst. Atty. Gen. H. Grady
Chandler of Austin, former
president of the state bar,
wrote the opinion for Wilson.

The action clears the way for
Gov. Price Daniel to name a
new district judge for Hale,
Swisher and Castro counties,
and a new district attorney for
Bailey, Parmer and Lamb, the
counties which are being re-
moved from the 64th district
and set up in a new 154th dis-
trict. Judge Bills remains the
judge of the new 154th, and
Dist. Atty. Cox remains in the
64th district office.

T. B. Hill Jr. Turns Novelist

Thomas Barlow Hill, Jr., has completed arrangements for publication of his new novel, "The Pearl Of Maui Aroe." This provocative story, now ready for press, will be released by mid August or early September, 1957, by Mathis Van Nort & Company, Inc., book publishers and manufacturers of Fort Worth.

Barlow Hill was born at Lockney in 1929, where he spent much of his childhood. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. B. Hill who are now living at Wichita Falls, Texas. The Master of Education degree was conferred by the Graduate School of North Texas State College at Denton, where Hill is currently undertaking an additional graduate work required of a doctorate.

Hill's academic efforts suffered a period of interruption during 1951-'53 while he served a tour of duty with the U. S. Army field artillery assigned to the 40th Division in Korea. Wounded in action at Kong Kong in 1952, Hill has received the Purple Heart award and two Battle Stars.

After receiving his discharge from the Armed Forces in January 1953 the author was a member of the faculties of the public school systems in Amarillo and Archer City, Texas where his duties included

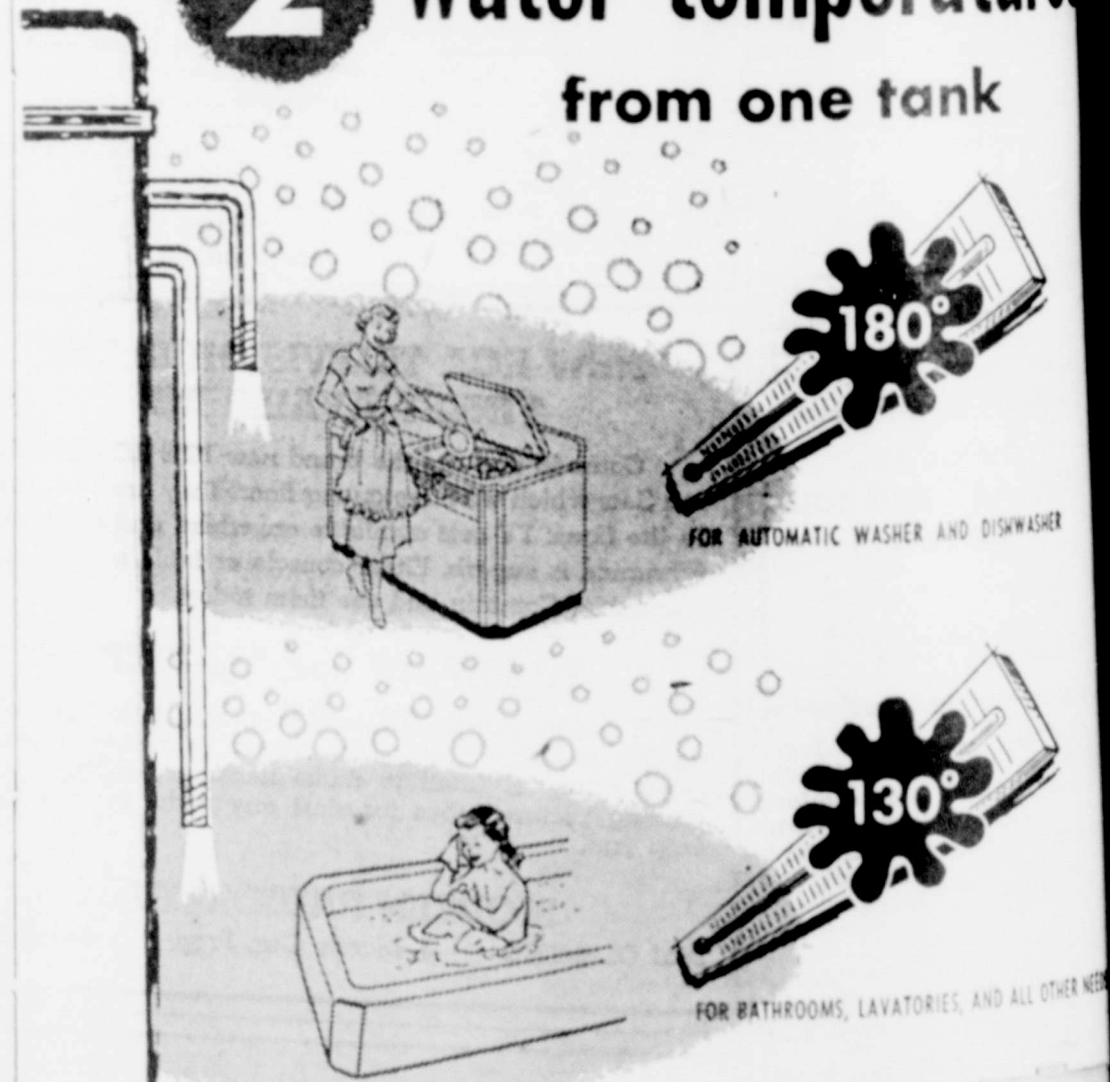

who would be more prosperous if so many of us didn't follow his lead and spend a good deal of our money with roving peddlers, city stores and mail order houses?

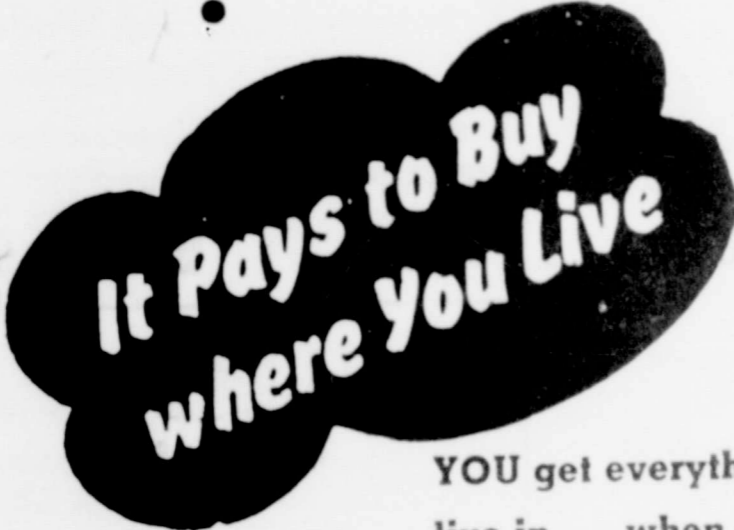
But the real joke may be on those of our children who grow up to find we have no place for them here . . . because we don't keep our trading dollars at home to make jobs for them.

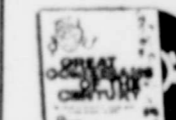
