1957 Cotton Has Longer Staple Length

ng data from the U.S. Depart nent of Agriculture's Lubbock office as of cotton classed though October 29, 1957, show the average staple length this year is significantly longer than that of cotton produced either in 1955 or 1956.

Executive Vice-President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. said that the staple length this vear as of October 29 averaged full inch. This compares to a shy 31-32 of an inch for the 1956 crop and to just under 15 16 of an inch for 1955.

"In dollars and cents this reresents a gain of something ke \$3.25 per bale, offsetting some degree the losses in rade caused from too much ainfall in October and lat plantings," Pfeiffenberger sald While these figures may no hold for the remainder of the 1957 season, it is significant that a gain is evident. These

In June 1957 when the figures were taken, 39,706 farms were listed as being irrigated. Only 10 counties in the state reported no irrigation. The number of irrigation wells rose from 42.674 in 1955 to 54,994 in 1957. The number of sprinkler systems in use almost doubled during this same
