## **NOTICE TO HOME BUILDERS** WITHIN THE CITY OF LOCKNEY!

The City of Lockney has electrical wiring and plumbing regulations designed for the protection of the citizens of the city, which result in lower fire insurance rates within the city limits and work for the good of the general public.

These regulations, which apply to new building, have been overlooked by some, especially those who have moved ready-built houses into the city.

To familiarize you with these regulations, we quote them here:

"CONCEALED WIRING: All wiring which is to be hidden from view shall be inspected before it is covered against ready access, and any person, firm or corporation installing such wires, shall notify the electrical inspector, giving him twenty-four hours in which to make the required inspection before the wires are concealed."

"SECTION 8. No soil, drain or vent pipe shall be covered from view or concealed until after work has been tested or examined and approved by the plumbing inspector, and the plumbing inspector shall be notified when the work is ready for inspection and said plumber shall prepare the whole system of plumbing for the plumbing inspector to make a proper test of same by filling the pipes with water or an air pressure of five pounds to the square inch."

To save yourself trouble, we ask that you consider these regulations when building or moving a house into the city limits.
