choices.
Voters in the Sunnyside area
won't have to drive all the way to
Dimmitt if the plan is approved.
Voters lost their box in Sunnyside
after balloting stations were re-

Pct. 1 voters, but the precinct
doesn't come into the city. It stops
at the southeast comer of town near
the intersection of US Highway
385 and State Highway 194 .
In Pct. 2, voters will go to the
Catholic Church or to Flagg Ferti-
lizer. There will no longer be vot-
ing in the driver's license office at
the courthouse if the new plan is
approved.
In the county, the new lines
generally follow the two major
highways in the county. Pct. 3 is
bounded on the south and the east
by the highways outside the Dim-
mit City limits, while Pct. 2 is
bounded on the north by SH 86 and
follows US 385 for several miles
south of Dimmitt.

All of Dimmitt's seniors will be graduating with full colors Friday after all seniors passed all sections
of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test.
The test measures abilities in math, English and writing. Statewide, only $90 \%$ of seniors
had passed the test's three sections had passed te test's three sections
with one testing in early May not yet graded. All sections of the test must be passed before students re-
ceive a diploma. Many who failed ceive a diploma. Many who failed
the test in March across the state the test in March across the state
also did not have the minimum 21 credits needed to receive a diploma, so they wouldn't be eligible to
graduate even if they had passed the test.
"This is the first time we have "This is the first time we have
had all of our seniors pass all sections of the TAAS before graduations," said Supt. Les Miller. "I think that's a credit to our school staff and faculty, from Kindergarten through 12th grade. The students and teachers have done an excellent job, and with tutorials and
TAAS study classes and the efforts of our staff and students, it's paying off for us."
More juniors than usual have passed the exit-level test in Dimmitt and statewide, according to
Dimmitt administrators and the Dimmitt administrators and the
Texas Education Agency. At Dimmitt High School, $87 \%$ of all juniors have passed all tests taken, compared to the $86 \%$ last year. Statewide, $76 \%$ of all juniors have
passed the tests, compared to $69 \%$ passed the
last year.

## The price of 'public' info

Whose information is it, anyway? That is the real
question lying at the heart of the discussion about question lying at the heart of the discussion about access to public records. And recent developments have been disturbing
As I write this, FO
As I write this, FOIFT board member Laura House has just testified at a public hearing on proposed
guidelines set by the General Services Commission for copies of public records. One of the guidelines defines "readily available information" as that which takes no more than 15 minutes to locate. I've never met a bureaucrat yet who couldn't chew up at least that
much time poking through various file drawers for a requested document.
As Attorney General Dan Morales pointed out in a letter to the GSC, a 20 -page document that costs $\$ 2$ to locate and copy under present rules would cost $\$ 11$ under the proposed guidelines-an increase of more variance with the expressed provision of the Open Records Act which states that a governmental body SHALL furnish records without charge or at a reduced charge if it is in the public interest.
The guidelines would give the body discretion to the information would clearly benefit the public. A

On the other front, The Dallas Morning New reported that the state attorney general has sealed the amounts of payments in 32 civil lawsuits concerning
such issues as civil rights, discrimination and medical malpractice in which the state was a party. Only tw mach settlements have been forced open through lega challenges, one by The Morning News and the other by the Amarillo Globe-News. This is taxpayers' money, being spent to settle lawsuits that allege wrongdoing by public officials,
the taxpayers don't have a right to know about it? the taxpayers don't have a right to know about it?
And now we come to the third development. Hous Bill 2749. Never heard of it? You will, the next time you want a copy of a public document from your local county clerk. It'll cost you \$1 a page, thanks to this
bill, which tiptoed right past everyone's notice and bill, which tiptoed right past everyone's n
into law in the last session of the Legislature.

The bill's sponsor was Rep. Jim Tallas, R-Sugar Land. When the Amarillo Globe-News's Austin burea chief asked Rep. Tallas if he thought the bill put too high a price on public information, his response was
"Let your publishers pay for it and charge it back through subscriptions. That's what they always do anyway."
A common threat running through all of this is a
sort of blithe disregard for the fact sort of blithe disregard for the fact that taxpayers have already paid for this information. Taxes pay the people who gather and sort and store the information; taxes
buy the computers, the filing cabinets, the photocopiers, the paper and floppy disks.

A shortage in the plant can be caused by not enough phosphorous in the soil or the fertilizer band; soil
cold and either cold and either too wet or too dry; soil compacted enought to restrict
root growth; roots pruned by cultivator or fertilizer sidedressing knife; if soil conditions are favorable, look for root-feeding insects that cut down the number of absorbing roots.
The phosphorous deficiency symptoms nearly always disappear
even in low phosphorous soils even in low phosphorous soils
when the plants get 24 to 40 inches tall. If applied phosphorous was adequate, wait for warm, dry adequate,
weather.

Much of the irrigated cotton will be planted somewhat later than optimum, so earliness will be criti-
cal. At this time of the year sead cal. At this ume of the year, seed
treatment fungicides and moderate plant populations are the best tools to promote earliness. Dense or very thin stands (greater than 60,000 or
less than 20,000 ) can suffer delayed less than 20,000) can suffer delayed maturity under irrigated conditions.
Furrow irrigated cotton should have sidedress nitrogen applied by first square. Producers with centerpivot systems have a variety of nitrogen application and timing options available. Producers with
yield targets above 112 bales per
acre should consider plant mapping and petiole monitoring as a means of predicting nitrogen applications during the bloom period Because of the dry weather over the last six to eight months, the potential for greater - than - normal
herbicide carryover exists. Herbicides applied last season such as atrazine in com and propazine in sorghum may cause cotton injury.
Injury symptoms would include Injury symptoms would include
chlorosis (yellowing of leaves) and chlorosis (yellowing of leaves) and
stunting. Preplant herbicides used in cotton last season may still be present in the soil in quantities sufficient to injure corn or sor-
ghum ghum.
Because of low rainfall for the area the last several months, the weed hosts necessary for initial appearance of squares will be in appearance supply. This tiny square robber should not be of major concern this season, but don't eliminate scouting for this potential pest. 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## Seeking new ways to clean up chicken droppings

## Associated Press Writer

WASHINGTON (AP) - Agriculture Department scientists are devising ways to clean up chicken droppings.
They are adding alum, an astringent long used to stop bleeding, to poultry litter, the smelly material made up of bedding and manure that remains on poultry house floors
after the chickens have gone to market. "After the chickens are taken out, the litter is removed from the poultry houses," says Agriculture Research Service soil scientist Philip A. Moore Jr. of the ARS Poultry Production and Product Safety Research Unit in Fayetteville, Ark.
"That litter is usually applied to land as fertilizer, since it contains substantial amounts of nitrogen, phosphorus, and other
essential plant nutrients," he said But this cheap, handy fertilizer carries an environmental cost. While still in the chicken house, its nitrogen content evaporates into ammonia, leaving all of the phosphorus.
"The grain that the birds eat has a ratio of about eight parts nitrogen to one part phosphorus," Moore said in this month's issue of Agricultural Research magazine. "But when nitrogen volatilizes, you wind up with a
ratio of two to one, or occasionally even one to one."
Chicken litter fertilizer is applied to land at rates based on its nitrogen content. Spreading enough litter to provide enough nitrogen carries along with too much phosphorus.

Phosphorus is the number-one element for accelerated growth of algae in streams and rivers," Moore pointed out

## Recent reports seen as cotton market friendly <br> uncertain and may make major moves in either

The latest supply/demand reports were friendly to the market
Estimated U. S. exports for the 1993/94 crop were increased 200,000 bales, carryover stooks decreased a like amount, and the estimated world crop decreased 950,000 bales to 76.75 million. With world use at 84.81 million, the drawdown in ending stocks is 8.0 million.

That places world stocks/use ( $\mathrm{s} / \mathrm{u}$ ) at $36 \%$, a sharp drop from $48 \%$ two years ago. The market sharp drop from is on weekly export shipments that would confirm increased exports and weather conditions affecting new crop prospects. The weekly export report on Thursdays indicates net new sales commitments and export shipments.

It is shipments that need to be stronger from now to august to reach the 6.7 million bale export target. The market is also concerned about the yield and subsequent size of the 1994/95 crop Planting intentions of 13.8 million acres would be more than adequate to produce enough cotton to meet potential usage of around 17 million bales. However, dry weather across 2 to 3 million acres of West Texas dryland production is of growing importance to a possible setback in the 1994 Texas

In other words, the market is sensitive to weather conditions because of tight foreign stocks and expectations for increases exports from both th 1993/94 ;and 1994/95/ crops.

Also, in addition to the dry weather threat, a stormy and wet weather threat near harvest, especially in the Delta, could cause considerable bullish market excitement in August and September.

This is the largest acreage contracted since $8 \%$ at the same time in 1991. Contracted acreage was $31 \%$ in the Southeast, $14 \%$ in the Delta, $9 \%$ in the Southwest, and only $2 \%$ in the West. Important dates to remember are the May 10 supply/demand report when USDA first makes projections for the 1 994/95 marketing season. The following supply/demand report will be June 12 and planted acreage on June 30. Because of dry weather the planted acreage report and expected harvested acreage will be greatly anticipated by the market in June.

SYRUP
(Serves 6-8)

2 limes
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon peeled and minced fresh ginger 1 small cantaloupe seeded
3/4 honeydew, seeded

With vegetable peeler, cut two 2 -inch strips of green zest from 1 lime leaving white pith beneath. From other lime, cut 1 tablespoon of zest into julienne; reserve. Squeeze lime juice, about $3 / 8$ cup, and add enough water to bring liquid to $1 / 2$ cup. Put in small nonreactive saucepan with sugar saucepan with sugai and let boil until buga and lissolved until sugar is dissolved, about minutes. Add strips of lime zest to steep in syrup as it cools. When cool, strain lime syrup into bowl and discard
solids. Add reserved juli enne to syrup. Cut melon balls from 3 melons, about 3 cups of each. To make round balls, press melon baller deep into flesh until juice comes out hole in bottom of melon baller. Twist to cut a whole ball and remove. Use smaller scoop in shallow flesh to avoid getting rind. Carefully remove or avoid any watermelon seeds. Put melon balls into syrup and toss gently. Cover and chill for a few hours. Just before serving, gently toss again and spoon melon balls into glass bowls or saucer champagne glasses.

Friedman (Basic Books); "Case Closed: Lee Harvey Oswald and the Assassination of JFK" by Gerald Posner (Random House), and "Kandom House), and Southern History" by Joel Williamson (Oxford University Press).
Seymour Topping, the administrator of the prizes, said, "The board in this case was simply not comfortable giving the award to any of the three nominees.
Michael Kammen, a Cornell University professor who was the chairman of the history jury, called the board's deision "a grave injustice."
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
