

FROM THE County Agent's Office By Cecil Lewis and Harold W. Ellison

Flea Beetles

Flea beetles are still attack ing seedling wheat throughout the county and causing economic damage. This small insect over winters in the adult stage and may cause damage during the winter on warm days.

Spraying should be done after the wheat is up so that there will be leaf area to hold the poison. The use of 11/2 quarts of toxaphene, 1 quart of heptachlor, and 1 1-3 quarts dieldrin is recommended for the control. This should last from 5 to 7 days. Successful control has been received in using these poisons.

Where will it all come from? Burleigh says enough water is now being wasted to meet that demand. Problem of saving it is up to engineers to solve. Needed is a simple low-cost means of capturing run-off water now flowing into the Gulf of Mexico and delivering

it to points where it is needed. Burleigh was one of 10 speakers at a water conference ponsored by Texas A&M College. Gov. Price Daniel praised the recently adopted statewide water program and urged against sliding back into apathy as a result of recent droughtbreaking rains.

More Nitrogen May Be Needed On Wheat

College Station — The heavy stubble from last year's wheat for getting the results crop is responsible for a situation which makes the use of ritrogen fertilizer more important for this year's crop. The situation, says W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, means that more of the soil nitrogen will be tied up in the process of decomposing the heavy stubble and a nitrogen Hortage

This shortage would result in a reduced growth rate for this year's wheat crop during the fall and winter months, says Bennett. The nitrogen needs will vary depending upon the amount of stubble and present level of soil nitrogen. Nitrogen needs at planting time, believes Bennett, will generally vary from 20 to 50 pounds an acre. A soil test can be used to determine the a-
