EPICUREAN POACHED EGGS Chicken broth, milk, tomato lice, cream, wine, meat stock, onsomme and thin soup may ce used for poaching eggs in place of water. Allow 1 quart of liquid for 4 eggs. Bring the liquid to a fast boil over a high flame. Drop the eggs into the bubbling liquid and turn the flame to simmer. Cover the sauce pan and cook the eggs 3 to 5 minutes or until the whites are firm. Use a perforated ladle or spoon for removing the eggs, and trim off ragged edges. The poaching liquid may be thickened with a little cornstarch or flour and served over

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

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


