"The general rule is that anyone who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 is eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum," the Chairman explained. "This, of course, would include all persons-whether owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper - who had an interest in the 1958 up-

"For instance, any grower who had a 1958 cotton allotment for his farm but who produced no cotton this year is also eligible to cast a ballot on 1959-crop quotas.

"These are the principal classes of persons who are defined as 'eligible,' " the Chairman stated, "but persons may also qualify to vote as a guard ian, administrator, executor, or trustee for another person. In such a case the person for whom he is acting may not also vote.

"Each individual's rights to vote depends upon his or her own qualifications," Chairman Ferguson concluded, "and this applies to husbands and wives, as well as minors who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1958."
