Dr. Wilford L. Cooper of Lexington, Kentucky, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Carl McAdams of Lockney, is one of the 72 college senior football lettermen of 1933 who have been nominated by their alma maters for the 1938 Silver Anniversary All-American team of Sports Illustrated.

Dr. Cooper was an outstanding athlete at Childress High School and starred as a tackle on the football team at Abilene Christian College. He was called "Curley" during his school days. He also lettered in track and baseball at ACC, and was president of the lettermen's club his senior year.

Dr. Cooper received his M. D. degree from the University of Texas Medical School and

studied at the University of Minnesota and Mayo Clinic, receiving his M. S. degree at Mayo in 1944. At present he is head of the Department of Proctology at the Lexington Clinic and attending proctologist at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington.

He is active in Little League, Boys Scout work, YMCA and P. T. A. work there.
