### Kenneth Pinner Dies In Traffic **Accident Dec. 26**

Kenneth Wayne Pinner, 21 was killed instantly last Friday morning when the 1955 Chevrolet sedan he was driving collided with a Dodge panel truck VOLUME 57 at an intersection in Springdale, Arkansas, where he lived.

The parents had left here at 6 a.m. Friday going to Arkansas to visit their son and his family and knew nothing of the accident until they arrived at Springdale. The accident happened at 7:55 a.m. only about a half mile from young Pinner's

Relatives said that Kenneth had just left home going to his work and was traveling east on Highway 68. The panel truck was coming in the opposite direction and turned off to the left to take a cut-off to another highway when the two vehicles collided. Two brothers in the truck were cut and bruised but not seriously injured. Kenneth suffered a crushed chest and a broken neck in the collision.






