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



Under Public Law 180 - 84th Congress, approved July 26, 1955, Section 503 was amended to provide making claim on or before July 15, 1956.

Public Law 85-638, approved August 14, 1958, now changes the July 16, 1956 date to July 16, 1959 for veterans to make their claim. It is possible that some men were placed on the retired list by reason of physical disability, and knew nothing of their entitlement to this mustering out payment.


